BOOK SELECTION DO'S AND DON'TS

DO

- ✓ **Do** select a book that is **fiction**.
- ✓ **Do** select a book that is interesting to you.

DON'T

- ✓ **Don't** select a book that is not approved by your parents.
- ✓ **Don't** select a book that you have already read.

DIRECTIONS: Once you've selected a novel, create an attractive **tri-fold** poster board **OR** a Google Slideshow **USING THE RUBRIC** on the back of this page as your guide. There will be a writing assignment on your book the first week of classes.

This project will be due on the first Friday we are back at school. Of course, you are free to turn in your project early! Simply share your slideshow with your teacher on Google Drive (use your BCS Google account only) or drop off your poster board at the office during summer business hours.
