Entry to Lower, Middle and Upper Schools

The entry process for each year group may be subject to change this year and we will notify all those who register of any changes and update the website.

Entry to Dulwich College Each year around 70 boys join the College in Year 7 and another 90 join in Year 9. Usually those who join in Year 7 come from primary schools or prep schools which end at Year 6. The boys who join in Year 9 largely join us from prep schools which end at Year 8 and a few join from secondary schools.

Entry to Year 7 2024

This is for boys who are in Year 6 in the academic year 2023-2024. Online registration is open and the deadline for applications is midday on **Monday, 30 October 2023**.

The entrance exam will be held on Friday 8 December. All applicants will sit an online Mathematics, English and Reasoning exam and complete a Creative Writing task.

160 boys will be invited back for interview at the College between Wednesday 24 January and Wednesday 31 January 2024.

Parents whose sons are not being invited back for interview will be informed by email. The final results will be posted on Thursday 8 February 2024.

There are no separate scholarship papers. In terms of CAT scores as a guideline, applicants score 120 and above. Music Scholarships are awarded at 11+ and pupils who are at the College, as well as external applicants, can apply for Music, Art and Sports scholarships at 13+.

Entry to Year 9 2024

This is for boys who are in Year 8 in the academic year 2023-2024. Online registration is open and the deadline for applications is midday on **Monday, 30 October 2023**.

The entrance examinations will be held at Dulwich College on Saturday 13 January 2024. Full information will be sent to registered candidates in December.

There will be 30 places available via this examination.

All those who sit the entrance examinations are considered for academic scholarships, There are no separate scholarship papers,

and they should be looking to achieve around 70% in the Mathematics and English. In terms of CAT scores as a guideline, applicants score 120 and above.

Boys can also apply for Art, Music or Sports Scholarships into Year 9.

The interviews for selected candidates will be held on Tuesday 23 January 2024.

The results of interviewed candidates will be posted on Thursday 8 February 2024.

Deferred entry to Year 9 in September 2026

Boys at 13+ Prep Schools in the UK can apply for deferred entry when they are in Year 6 in the academic year 2023-2024. Online registration is open and the deadline for registration is midday on **Friday, 29 September 2023**.

The entrance examinations will be held at Dulwich College on Wednesday 6 December 2023. All applicants will sit an online Mathematics, English and Reasoning exam and complete a Creative writing task. 120 pupils will be invited back for interview. 60 places will be filled at this time.

Interviews will be held between Monday 15 January and Friday 19 January 2024.

In terms of CAT scores as a guideline, applicants score 120 and above.

Offers of deferred entry places will be posted on Thursday 8 February 2024. These offers are conditional on boys remaining at their prep school for two further years. Those who accept places will have the opportunity of sitting for an Academic Scholarship when they are in Year 8. They can also apply for Art, Music or Sports Scholarships which will also be assessed when they are in Year 8. An additional 30 places will be offered to boys in Year 8 in the academic year 2025-2026 who sit the entrance examinations in January 2026.

Entry to Year 12 2023

Each academic year, around 35 new pupils enter the Upper School into Year 12. The great majority of these are international boarders who join the pupils moving up from Year 11, making a year group of around 250 pupils, divided into 23 forms. A small number of day pupils also join us and these applications are considered on a case-by-case basis; please contact the Upper School Registrar for more information.

Music scholarships are available and for exceptional candidates, Sports scholarships.

Applicants are asked to sit entrance examinations in the subjects that they want to study at A level. For some subjects (e.g. Theatre Studies, Art, Design & Technology) assessment is by interview. Those who are not native speakers will also be required to sit an English test.

Boarding applicants at schools in the UK will be invited to sit our entrance examinations at Dulwich College on **Saturday 11 November 2023**. If the applicant lives overseas, we will arrange for them to sit the tests in their country of residence. Where we do not have representatives who can invigilate the papers on our behalf, we use the British Council.

Those applying for day places will be invited to the College to sit our entrance examinations on **Saturday 20 January 2024**.

Applicants who perform well in our entrance examinations will be invited for an interview either at the college or online.

For all candidates, places are offered on the basis of their performance in the College's entrance examinations and at interview. For day place candidates currently studying GCSEs, we also require 14 points as a minimum entry requirement, where Grades 8 and 9 = 3 points, Grade 7 = 2 points and Grade 6 = 1 point. We would expect candidates to achieve significantly higher than our minimum grade requirement. GCSEs should include (i) English Language, (ii) Mathematics and (iii) a grade 8 in the three subjects to be studied at Advanced level, where appropriate. The results of the entrance examination and interview are usually published within three weeks.

The deadline for online application is **Friday 29 September 2023**.

Extra Time in Entrance Examinations

Additional time is available for pupils who have an Educational Psychologist's report that shows they have below average scores for speed of cognitive processing. Use of a computer is available for pupils for whom it

is the normal way of working and where it is appropriate to their needs. Please make the Admissions team aware of this at the time of application and send relevant supporting documentation.

Day pupils fees up to and including Year 8, also include the cost of lunch, which is compulsory. Lunch for pupils in the Middle and Upper School, is not included within the fees.

For all pupils in Middle and Upper School the cost of entry for public examinations is not included within the fees and is billed separately.

The Governors reserve the right to review fee levels at any time.

Deposit

The following are payable on acceptance of a place at the College.

Day Pupils: A non-refundable deposit of **£2,100** is payable which will be retained in full until the pupil leaves, when it will be refunded less any balance owing to the College.

Boarders: A non-refundable deposit of **£4,200** is payable, which will be retained in full until the pupil leaves, when it will be refunded less any balance owing to the

College. In addition to this deposit, a full term's tuition and boarding fees is also payable. This payment will be credited on the invoice for the first term's fees.

If the pupil is withdrawn after acceptance, deposits are not refundable.

Payment of Fees

Fees are due and payable in full by direct debit, on the day before the first day of the College term to which they relate. Parents who pay fees after the due date will incur a 1% late payment surcharge billed one term in arrears.

Fees must be paid by direct debit unless Parents live outside of the United Kingdom and do not have an account with a bank or building society within the UK. In such cases Fees may be paid by bank transfer (subject to satisfactory completion of the College's additional certification requirements).

There is a facility available through a third-party credit provider School Fee plan regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority, to enable fee payment by monthly direct debit

In order to comply with regulatory requirements, the College does not accept payments in cash, crypto currency or by cheque.

The College reserves the right to suspend a pupil while fees remain unpaid, by giving the parents not less than 2 days' written notice. If

Parents default on Direct Debit payments the full fee will be payable immediately. Parents who have paid fees late or whose fees are overdue may be asked to pay one term's fees as an additional deposit. If necessary, the College will instruct solicitors to recover unpaid fees with interest and all costs incurred will be recoverable in full.

The withdrawal of a pupil requires one full term's notice given in writing to the Master, or payment of one full term's fees in lieu of notice.

All pupils are included in a Personal Accident Insurance Scheme which offers cover for permanent disability resulting from an accident. This includes dental injury and emergency dental treatment. In addition, parents can opt-in to a Pupils' Absence Insurance Scheme (at their own expense) to cover absence through personal illness or injury. Full details of both schemes will be supplied on entry or are available at any time from the Fees Administrator.

Advance Payment of Fees Scheme

The College runs its own scheme for advance payment of school fees. Under this arrangement parents are able to pay a lump sum in advance to purchase credits against future tuition fees, and receive a discount on the amount of credits purchased. Such sums can be paid prior to entry (once a pupil has been offered a place), on entry, or at any time during a pupil's career at the College.

Scholarships and Bursaries

Academic Scholarships

For entry to the Lower School (Year 7) and Middle School (Year 9)

Academic Scholarships are awarded to those boys who perform exceptionally well and score the highest grades in their examination and interview. For entry to **Years 7 and Year 9 (late entry)** all boys who sit the entrance examinations are automatically considered for an academic scholarship.

The pupils who join us through the **Year 9 deferred** entry route will sit the entrance examinations when they are in Year 6 and will have the opportunity to apply for Academic, Music, Art, and sports scholarships when they are in Year 8. Parents will be sent full information and the applications form in the summer term when their son is in Year 7.

Scholarships may be held by day boys and boarders and will be continued until the holder leaves the College, subject to satisfactory progress and conduct.

Scholarships are not means-tested. Scholarships range in value from 10% to one third of tuition fees.

Entry Bursaries

For entry to the Lower School (Year 7) and Middle School (Year 9)

A number of means-tested bursaries are awarded annually to new pupils where parents are unable to pay the full tuition fee.

Applicants will be considered on the basis of their performance in the entrance examination and interview. Parents will be asked to complete a confidential statement of financial circumstances which, if they are offered an award, will be reviewed annually.

Music Scholarships

For entry to the Lower School (Year 7), the Middle School (Year 9) and the Upper School (Year 12)

Candidates should ideally play two instruments, with the first study instrument being an orchestral instrument.

Candidates with exceptional ability (Grade 8+) on any single instrument will be positively considered on an individual basis.

Music Scholarships of up to one third of the tuition fee are awarded annually. In addition, successful candidates will receive instrumental tuition on two instruments.

Music Exhibitions may also be awarded enabling the holders to receive tuition on two instruments.

All award-holders are expected to contribute fully to the musical life of the College.

The audition for Music Scholarships is intended to discover musical aptitude and promise. As a rough guide, candidates in the 11+ age group are expected to be at Grade 5 standard in their first instrument, while the 13+ candidates should be at Grade 7.

Auditions for selected Year 7 and 9 candidates will take place on Saturday 13 and Saturday 20 January 2024 respectively. They will be required to:

- play two contrasting pieces on their first study instrument
- play one piece of their second study instrument, if offered
- respond to aural tests

Upper School applicants will be notified of their audition arrangements separately.

Choral Scholarships and Organ Scholarships

Vacancies occur annually in the College Chapel Choir which sings choral services in the Chapel of the Foundation, Christ's Chapel of God's Gift, in Dulwich Village.

Choral Scholarships provide tuition in singing and one instrument, and are awarded on the basis of auditions held annually in June.

Choral Scholarships are available for boys with treble voices generally from Years 7-9 and with alto, tenor or bass voices when vocally and musically ready.

Choral Probationerships (providing vocal tuition only) are available for boys generally for Years 5-6.

An Organ Scholarship is also available to boys who play the organ to around grade 7.

The Director of Music, Mr Richard Mayo, is always pleased to see prospective scholars and their parents at the earliest opportunity, to give advice on preparation for the audition and information about the musical life of the College.

Art Scholarships

For entry to the Middle School (Year 9)

At least one scholarship of up to 10% of the tuition fee for excellence in art will be offered for September 2024.

Candidates are required to write, in their own words, a short paragraph about their work, artistic interests and exhibitions they have recently visited.

The assessment for the Art Scholarship is intended to discover artistic ability and exceptional potential. The successful candidate is likely to be one who, besides showing promise, is able to demonstrate that art is a predominant interest in his leisure time. Accordingly, candidates are required to submit a digital portfolio which can include a range of drawings, paintings, photography, animation and/or film and photographs of three dimensional work.

These should be clearly divided into two categories:

- work carried out under supervision at school and

- work carried out in the candidate's own time

Applicants for an Art Scholarship will be invited to attend for interview on **Saturday 27 January 2024** when they will be asked to carry out an objective or imaginative drawing or painting test in a specified time.

Candidates will be asked to submit a digital portfolio and details will be sent post application. We are looking for evidence of the creative process, risk-taking and enthusiastic approaches using a variety of media.

Sports Scholarships

For entry to the Middle School (Year 9) and Upper School (Year 12)

Scholarships for sport are awarded at entry to the Middle School (10%) for boys who demonstrate suitable athletic ability, skill, determination, enthusiasm and the potential to become elite athletes in their chosen sport(s). External candidates for Sports Scholarships must also pass the academic entrance examinations before being considered for an award.

The Year 9 assessment is intended to confirm sporting ability and exceptional potential. Candidates are required submit an application form outlining achievements, provide relevant references and attend the interview session on Friday, 26 January 2024.

The interview session will consist of the following:

- Assessment in two sports
- Interview with a member of the Sports Department
- Athletic tests

Pupils who are awarded a Sport Scholarship are expected to:

- Contribute fully to the sporting life of the College
- Lead by example, acting as role models for their peers and as ambassadors for the College
- Maintain high standards of conduct in training and competition
- Be committed to contribute to sport for three terms, including any periods of study leave

Sports Scholarships are available in **exceptional circumstances** to Year 12 candidates wishing to join the Upper School. Award of Bursaries to supplement Scholarships

A College Scholarship may be supplemented by an entry bursary if there is genuine financial need. Such bursaries are means-tested.

The Curriculum

The basic aim of our timetabled curriculum is to develop pupils' knowledge and skills, and their understanding of concepts, attitudes and confidence. We seek to provide a secure, yet challenging environment that encourages participation, curiosity and enquiry. In designing the curriculum we identify five key factors which address these objectives.

Breadth - so that pupils are exposed to a wide spectrum of areas of learning (linguistic, mathematical, scientific, technological, spiritual, moral, physical, cultural, creative and social).

Balance - so that pupils develop in all these areas.

Relevance - so that pupils will see reasons for learning.

Flexibility - so that at the highest levels of the College, where they must eventually specialise, pupils will be offered a wide choice of subject combinations.

Resourcing - so that pupils are taught in groups of suitable size in appropriate accommodation by well-qualified teachers supplied with all the necessary aids, equipment and apparatus.

While we attach importance to a pupil's intellectual development, we are no less concerned with their personal qualities, which we seek to develop through every facet of their activity at the College, inside and outside the classroom. An impression of the scope of our Free Learning programme can be gained from the College website.

The curriculum is reviewed regularly and is therefore subject to change. The following notes refer to the College curriculum from September 2023

All pupils at the College are set prep on each of the five school days. For the youngest, the prep should be about thirty minutes, increasing to one hour in Year 7 and one and a half hours in Year 8 and Year 9. The prep expectation increases to two hours in the last two years to GCSE. In the Upper School prep averages two to three hours each evening.

Day Houses and Games

All pupils (whether day pupils or boarders) are allocated to one of eight Day Houses, each of which has House Masters at Junior, Lower, Middle and Upper School levels. There are inter-House competitions in

numerous sports and cultural activities including Music, Drama, Art, Chess and Debating. Games take place as a timetabled activity and are compulsory for all who are physically fit.

The Lower School

Years 7 and 8

In Year 7 pupils follow a curriculum comprising the subjects listed to the right. In Year 8 pupils continue with French or Spanish and have a choice of studying Latin, Chinese or German. In addition all pupils have two Games sessions.

The Middle School

Year 9

A broad based curriculum is continued. All Year 9 pupils study the subjects listed to the right, plus ONE of Latin, German, Spanish, French and Chinese. There is one Games afternoon.

The Middle School

Years 10 and 11

These years provide the final preparation for GCSE/IGCSE examinations. The scheme of subject choice allows considerable flexibility and is designed to provide pupils with a wide choice of post-16 courses. In addition to lessons in examination subjects, pupils have one Games session. There is also a Wellbeing course which includes P.E.

All pupils are required to study:

Physics, Chemistry and Biology are taught as separate subjects.

They will eventually be entered, as appropriate, for examinations at IGCSE Science and Additional Science (Double Award), or to three certificates (in the Separate Sciences). A pupil's access to, and eligibility for, Advanced Level science courses in the Upper School is affected by the quality of the IGCSE grades they achieve, and not by whether he takes Double Award or Separate Sciences.

The same subject cannot be selected from two or more groups. If a language is chosen from Group 2, this language must have been studied in Year 9.

The Ancient Greek option in Group 3 is for pupils of proven ability in languages wishing to start this subject in Year 10; they may therefore include three languages among their subjects. Greek is available to pupils regardless of whether they are continuing Latin to GCSE.

All pupils take ten subjects — leading to either ten or nine GCSE/IGCSE qualifications, depending on the science course followed.

The Upper School

The Remove (Year 12) and Upper Sixth (Year 13)

The two years of Advanced Level study at the College are called the Remove (also known as Year 12) and Sixth Form (Year 13). All pupils choose three subjects to study (four if they are studying Further Mathematics) and every subject follows an A level course apart from Geography and Biology where the Cambridge Assessment International A level is studied.

To guarantee breadth of study, all pupils in the Remove study an Advanced Electives Course and all pupils in Year 13 study a Liberal Studies course.

The Advanced Electives are bespoke, ten-week courses designed by teachers at Dulwich College, James Allen's Girls' School (JAGS) and Sydenham High School which inspire a genuine love of learning beyond exam curricula. They form a core part of the free learning ethos at Dulwich. We believe in preparing pupils for 21st century life by developing courses that are truly interdisciplinary, that straddle boundaries between academic, practical and emotional intelligence and which encourage pupils to think independently.

There are almost 50 courses to choose from that fit broadly into the arts, sciences, humanities, languages and social sciences. The Advanced Electives provide Dulwich pupils the opportunity to learn together with the Year 12s from JAGS and Sydenham High School in a manner which replicates the seminar-style, independent learning of universities and tertiary education. The lack of examination, characteristic of all courses, encourages freedom of thought and intellectual risk-taking.

In addition to their chosen subjects, in Year 13 all pupils follow a Liberal Studies programme, which is run in conjunction with JAGS, with some lessons taking place at the College and others at JAGS. Pupils are asked to choose courses from a wide selection offered by teaching staff, most lasting one term. Some courses are designed to stimulate an intellectual enthusiasm for a new, and often unusual area of study; others to broaden awareness of particular global or topical issues; others, still, aim to develop practical or study skills or give pupils an opportunity to engage in community service. Through these non-examined courses, we hope that pupils will gain a broader view of society and develop an intelligent, well-informed, enthusiastic response to the world around them.

The skills and knowledge developed in both Liberal Studies and Advanced Electives courses will be used by pupils to help them complete an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) or to plan and write an internally assessed essay of 2000 words. These are key components of our Dulwich Diploma, which recognises the academic and co-curricular aspects of a Dulwich education, and is awarded to pupils when they leave the College.

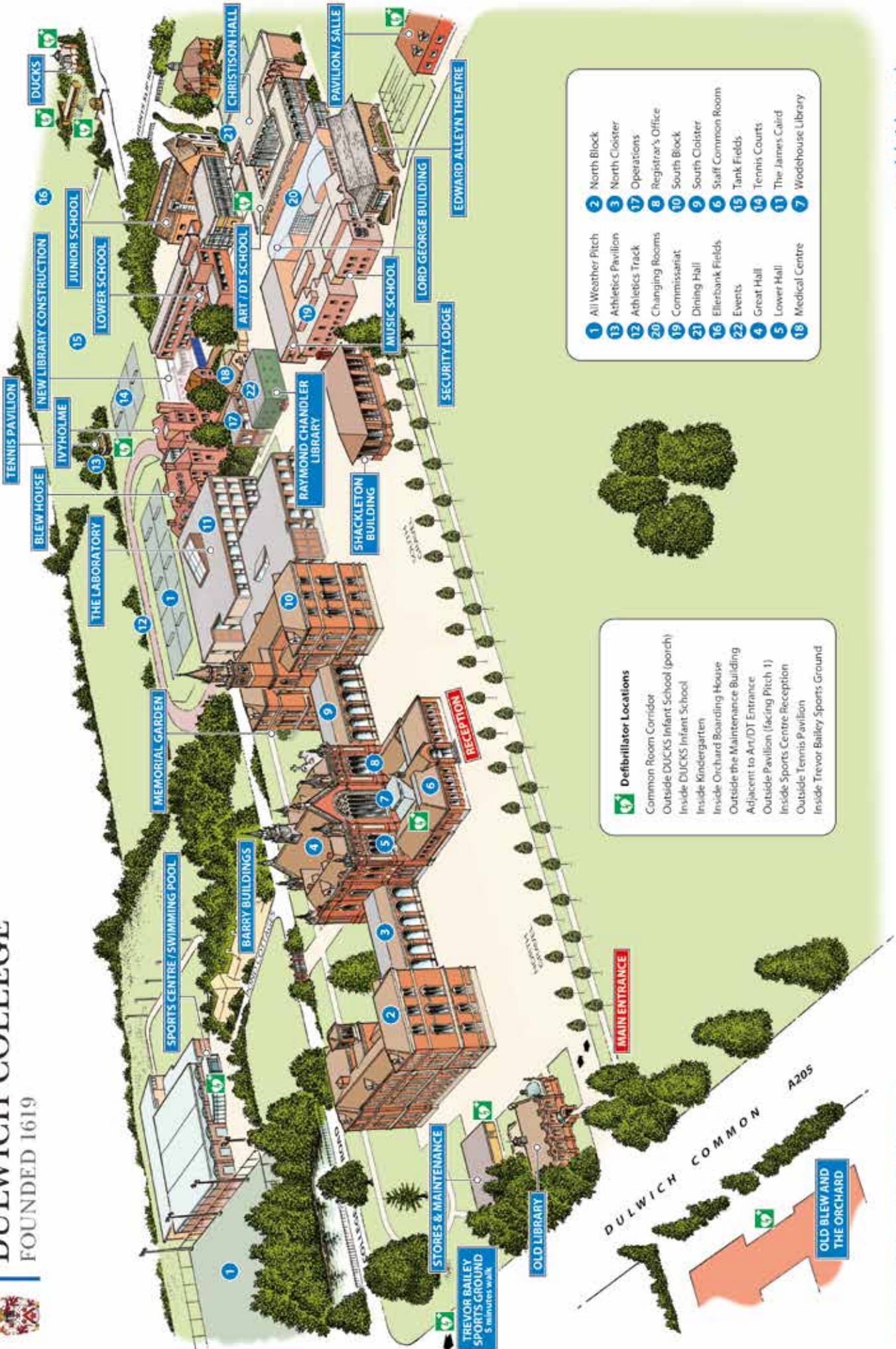
Details of the wide range of subjects currently available can be found in the Upper School Curriculum Booklet which the College publishes annually and is on the College website. Pupils may choose freely from these; the timetable is designed afterwards, to incorporate pupil choice.

There is in addition, a Games afternoon for all pupils, Wellbeing lessons which provide the RSE curriculum and time for private study.

Additional programmes and support are organised to assist those pupils in preparing for competitive university entry including Oxbridge, Medicine and American universities.
