Norton Juster's The Phantom Tollbooth is the tale of a boy who was always bored and didn't know why – until he takes a trip through the "Lands Beyond" with the help of a mysterious tollbooth that appears in his room. Sounds surreal? I'll be honest: it's a children's book. There are pictures every few pages, and it's been described as a "modernday fairy tale." Its appeal lies in its simplicity, but this is exactly what makes it a double-



edged sword in terms of AR points: it's a good book if you only have a few points to finish off, but if you've barely started your points, this would not be a wise choice.

The Phantom Tollbooth is refreshingly straightforward about the fact that it is an allegory with a message: education brings order and interest to the world. Its honesty is precisely what allows it to get away with this. Even if you ignore the message (like I did when I read it for the first time several years ago), the story stands alone as a delight. Think Dr. Seuss meets Alice in Wonderland meets Roald Dahl. The book is bursting with puns and clever plays on words. The characters have allegorical names – King Azaz rules the land of letters and words, his brother the Mathemagician comes from a land of numbers, and Rhyme and Reason are sisters.

This book may seem childish to some – but it's a 6.7 ATOS level, with 7 AR points and quiz number 130 – but it's almost the end of the year. You have the summer away from people who make fun of you.

Because descriptions of puns aren't nearly enough, I entice you with various quotes taken from the book:

• "You can swim all day in the Sea of Knowledge and not get wet."

• "I don't know of any wrong road to Dictionopolis, so if this road goes to Dictionopolis at all it must be the right road, and if it doesn't it must be the right road to somewhere else, because there are no wrong roads to any-where."

• "Whether or not you find your own way, you're bound to find some way. If you happen to find my way, please return it, as it was lost years ago. I imagine by now it's quite rusty."

• "Why not? That's a good reason for almost anything – a bit used perhaps, but still quite serviceable." ***Linda's note: this is my answer if you're still asking me why you should read this book.

members and a change in musical direction, the band secured a five-album deal with Sony BMG in 2002, thus beginning their legacy. 



I'm Repulsed

Sapphire's "Push" is one of the most mind-curdling books I've ever read. It's the frictional story of a girl who gives birth to two children by her father. Spanish Downfall By Enrique Ruvalcaba

After disappointing performances from Real Madrid and Barcelona in the semifinals of the UEFA Champions League against German teams, there have been questions about the Spanish dominance in Europe. Madrid and Barcelona's failures have exposed the truth about the Spanish La Liga in general: It's overrated.

In recent years, Barcelona has posted the best defense in Spain and the best offense (The past 4 seasons and current season). In their matchup against the newly crowned German

champions, Bayern Munich, they suffered a 7-0 debacle. Blanked. Massacred. Lionel Messi and company couldn't penetrate a solid Bayern backline. The defense couldn't hold out speedy trio of Thomas Müller, Frank Ribery, and Arjen Robben on the flanks.

Real Madrid, who thrived under manager Jose Mourinho since he took over four years ago, were ousted by Borrusia Dortmund 4-3, but were embarrassed in the first leg 4-1. Madrid struggled with the counterattack and speed of Dortmund's offense composed of German wünderkinds Marco Reus and Mario Gotze along with veteran goal scorer Robert Lewandowski. The most underrated squad this year, Borrusia Dortmund, boasts one of the youngest squads and surprisingly was able to eliminate an experienced Real Madrid with a similar style to Bayerns'. Both teams rely on their speedy wingers down the flanks and create space for their sole striker in the box. Exposing the Spanish fullbacks' and central midfielders' struggles, it's clear both Spanish teams haven't faced teams of this magnitude.

How does this matchup reflect La Liga as a whole? Comparing the players between leagues, it is noticeable there's no players like Müller, Ribery, and Robben in La Liga (With the exception of Barcelona's and Real Madrid's players). Besides Real Madrid, Barcelona doesn't face elite caliber players week in and week out. The lack of competition in recent years of La Liga has led the league and the Spanish Giants to a downfall. The German Bundesliga can boast the high-level competition it delivers as shown by an all German UEFA Champions League Final. Not only that, other German teams such as Schalke 04 and Bayer Leverksun have stepped it up. This is Bayern Munich's third Champion League final in four years. The German dominance of Europe is slowly overthrowing the Spanish. Outside of Barcelona and Real Madrid, no other Spanish team has stepped it up in the UEFA Champions League.

In the last five Champions League tournaments, only two Spanish teams have made it to the round of 16 and two have made it to the quarterfinals. La Liga's mediocrity has put an end to the dominance of Barcelona and Real Madrid. The Germans have been able to advance further into the Champions League. The competitiveness of the German Bundesliga has placed the Germans into the circle of elite status. Very well deserved and about time. It is the era of the Germans now.

Their mind is set on playing rather than focusing on education. In Finland, children do not go to school until they are seven years old. At that age, children aren't as hyper and will focus more on their education. The main problem that needs fixing is the teachers (Not our teachers, of course). Other schools have teachers that are terrible at their job and schools can't get rid of them because of teachers' unions. Unions used to be great when companies were paying workers a couple pennies an hour for sixteen hours a day; but now unions are beating down the companies.
