The SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) is a standardized exam that most college and university programs require students to take. It is designed by the College Board and determines whether or not an individual has the basic knowledge needed in order to succeed in a college-level program. The SAT is composed of three primary sections: critical reading, mathematics, and writing. The critical reading section consists of multiple-choice questions that relate to reading comprehension and vocabulary. The mathematics section includes a series of multiple-choice questions and a group of fill-in or "grid-in" questions that relate to basic mathematical concepts. The writing section contains multiple-choice guestions related to grammar and sentence structure, and an essay question. Even though the SAT is one of the most commonly used exams for college admissions, some schools do not require it. Certain programs and universities may quire other admission tests for acceptance instead r in addition to, the SAT such the ACT or the SAT ubject tests. The exact score that an individual must ichieve on the SAT in order to gain acceptance varies rom program to program and from college to college. Universities do not use the SAT as the only factor for admission. So do not worry if your SAT score isn't so hot; it's not the only factor colleges look at. Most universities consider personal statements, GPA, and other related aspects. However, SAT preparation is always recommended, especially if you are applying for scholarships or looking into competitive schools.



As students know, a hundred volunteer hours are required to graduate from HMSA. However, many students have not actually started.

Some students don't know where to do their hours, or they think it's impossible to complete them. There are many places students can do their hours. For instance, they can volunteer at local parks, like Eucalyptus Park. If a student is part of a church, he or she can ask to volunteer for church events in exchange for HMSA hours. Gotfriends. com is a website of Friendship Circle in which students get hours by helping kids with special needs. It is a great way to make friends, and have amazing experiences. The main purpose of community service is to help the community, but indirectly students are helping themselves and growing as people.

Spiderman (and a former president) said, "With great power comes great responsibility." This is sound advice for the teleki-







The 2011-2012 UEFA Champions League is already three-fourths of the way through and it has staged the biggest upsets in the past decades. With the surprise eliminations of English giants, Manchester United and Manchester City, one would think the competition would lack seriousness. Swiss club Basel and Cyprus club APOEL proved to be more austere in performance. While Basel conceded the most goals from all the remaining teams, they managed to get a 1-0 victory in the first leg against German giants and 09-10 UEFA Champions League finalists Bayern Munich. Thus, proving that Basel eliminating Manchester United in group stage was no fluke, it's time that these clubs should be taken more seriously. Continuing their unpredictable run, Bayern will be determined to eliminate Basel since the final will be hosted in Bayern's stadium, Allianz Arena. Cyprus scored the lowest amount of goals out of all the remaining teams, but managed a somewhat positive one-goal loss against the sleeping French giant, Lyon.

This year's Champions League has to go down as one of the worst years for EPL teams. Manchester United being embarrassingly eliminated in the last crucial game of the group stage by a virtually unknown team like Basel adds more to the fire of insults from journalists and fans. EPL suffered another blow when Italian clubs Milan and Napoli both laid their own debacles on English teams. Milan smashed four goals on Arsenal, who were unresponsive. Napoli's Cinderella story continued when they made a remarkable comeback against Chelsea by responding to a one-goal deficit with three of their own. The only Italian disappointment was Inter who lost to French club Marseille 1-0 with a last minute goal by the African wunderkind Andre Ayew.

Obviously Barcelona defeated Bayer Leverkusen so we'll move on with Real Madrid's 1-1 draw with CSKA Moscow, who probably has the coolest name in the competition. Continuing with Russian teams, Zenit managed a 3-2 victory against the only Portuguese team remaining in the competition, Benfica. In the second leg, Benfica won 2-0 and advanced.

Switching back to EPL teams, specifically Arsenal and Chelsea, how much have they regressed from last year? After getting torn apart by Italian teams like zombies, the EPL is basically below Italian Serie A level. Disagree? Well too bad because it will be tough with arguing against England's best two clubs being eliminated in group stages with one of them being eliminated in the most crucial game by a Swiss club! The complete elimination of EPL teams early could be positive for fans as a whole. We won't be seeing the same old English/Spanish teams' dominance over the Champions League. Needed variety will be added on in the quarterfinals and onward. Semifinals with four different teams, each from different countries playing at their top level will add spice to the competition.

In the long run it will be interesting to see how the Champions League unfolds. The likelihood is that we won't see Basel or APOEL pulling upsets we want to see. The bottom line is that reality will give us a Spanish-Italian final at Allianz Arena. Whichever Italian team Barcelona faces, it will go down as one of the most exciting finals ever, unlike 09-10's final.

effort, and inspira-



We are living in an age where technology is accelerating, which gives the general impression that people must be knowledgeable. Yet we don't know who our vice president is. The results from the poll also proved that Christina Aguilera wasn't the only one who forgot the words to the national anthem. Surprisingly, 73% of adults and 60% of teenagers didn't even know the name of the national anthem. Questions like "how many senators do we have?" and "what type of economic system do we fall under?" stumped Americans. Many blame this failure on the complexity of the U.S. political system. Is it just us? Are we the only people ignorant of our political system? Research answered these questions. In March 2009, the European Journal of Communication asked citizens of Britain, Denmark, Finland, and the U.S. to answer questions on international affairs. The Europeans vanguished us. Only 58% of Americans could identify the Taliban. On the other hand, 68% of Danes, 75% of Brits, and 76% of Finns could identify the Taliban. Even though we've led the charge in Afghanistan, we couldn't recognize the Taliban. Not only are Americans unaware of international events and problems, they're unaware of their own struggles. I guess Plato was right when

he said, "Those who are too smart to engage

in politics are punished by being governed by

those who are dumber.'
