Black History Month

Black History Month is the celebration of African-Americans and their accomplishments in the US and Canada. It is also in remembrance of all of the ancestors of Africans-Americans that went through the diasporas out of Africa. Since the year 1976, it is celebrated annually in the United States and Canada in February; however the United Kingdom celebrates it in October.

Black History Month started out in 1926 as "Negro History Week" by historian Carter G. Woodson. The goal of Negro History Week was to have the public educated about African American achievements and family backgrounds.

Overall the main purpose of Black History Month is to spread awareness of African American history to the public. During Black History Month, African American history is taught to students at elementary, middle, high school and university levels respectively. African

American history is a momentarily important part of American history,

and it is almost impossible to find an American History textbook that does not include passages about black history. Many of the great things that we still use today were actually first invented by African Americans. George Washington Carver was a scientist whose research was based to expand crops in the south other than cotton. George Crum invented the very first potato chip in a restaurant called Moon Lake Lodge in Saratoga Springs, New York, USA. The old school mail box was invented by a man named Philip Downing, while a man named Charles Drew started the idea of a blood bank and the preservation of blood plasma. One of the most useful items that African Americans have invented was done by a man named Lewis Latimer; he was a member of Edison's research team who improved the incandescent light bulb (meaning that instead of burning out the light bulb would stay lit). Garrett Morgan was an inventor of numerous inventions. He created the safety hood and smoke protectors for firefighters, the gas mask, and hair straighteners along with hair dying lotions. Along with men there were also African American women who brought something to the table. Sarah Goode invented a folding cabinet bed; it was a convenient invention since it could be put into small houses and apartments. It worked as a cabinet, desk, and a bed all in one so that it was spaciouly efficient. Another great woman was Madame C.J. Walker, an inventor of numerous useful hair care products such as a scalp treatment that healed scalp disease and even grew hair, created a hair softener that allowed a hot comb to be used with much more ease. Overall these are some of the many great inventions that African American men and woman have given society.

They also want math to be the second language of the students. Dr. Lohenry spoke about how to become a physician's assistant and what they do. The students are required to go through 400 hours of basic science courses. Dr. Peterson talked about CSU LA and how forensic science is different from many other careers. MML and Copyright Infringement

Recently, Nexon removed the Mabinogi Music Composer, a feature allowing players to transcribe songs into Music Macro Language (MML), from the official mabinogi website. Many players speculated whether this was due to copyright infringement, but Nexon claims that this is not the case. But this and the shutdown of popular sites that host MML codes do make one question whether transcribing songs into MML is a form of copyright infringement. The songs are not being used to make a profit. Illegal copies of songs are not being made through MML, MML simply allows a player to play songs using instruments available to them in videogames. MML is like sheet music; songs transcribed into MML are instrumental versions of songs. It seems like transcribing MML would be protected as fair use. Record companies and artists do not go around suing every individual who plays a copyrighted song on an instrument. Essentially that is what players are doing: playing songs on virtual instruments for non-commercial entertainment. However there are various misconceptions surrounding fair use, but even if MML song codes are not protected by fair use, they should only be considered to be a significantly mild form of copyright infringement.

SUPER BOWL XLVI: A GIANT WIN

Amazing happened on February the fifth on Sunday night. Super Bowl XLVI was one of the most intense Super Bowls ever. The AFC Champion, New England Patriots faced off against the NFC Champion, the New York Giants, in a rematch of the 2008 Super Bowl in which the Giants won. Much anticipation preceded this game after the Giants' remarkable playoff run where they eliminated the #1 team, Green Bay Packers. All this anticipation resulted in over a hundred million U.S. viewers, according to Nielsen Company.

One of the key plays of the game came down to Mario Manningham's unbelievable-38-yard catch in the fourth quarter with about 4 minutes left on the clock. The result of this play not only gave hope for the Giants, it caused Patriot's manager, Bill Bellicheck, to challenge to play and lose it along with a timeout. This timeout could have saved the Patriots some time during the critical final minute of play.

Bellicheck and the Patriots almost pulled off what could have been the most brilliant tactic of the game. That play was to allow Ahmad Bradshaw score with one minute left on the clock. If the Patriots would have never allowed Bradshaw to score, the Giants would have settled for a field goal, but 40 seconds would have been burned off the clock and the Patriots would have had only about 17 seconds left to score with only two timeouts. Wisely, the Patriots chose to have a minute with two timeouts to score a touchdown. If Bellicheck never challenged Manningham's 38 yard catch, the Patriots could have had an extra timeout, thus allowing the Patriots more plays to get close to the touchdown zone.

The first quarter was dominated by the Giants who took an early 9-0 lead thanks to a Victor Cruz touchdown and a safety on Tom Brady. The tide turned in the second and third quarter, when the Patriots scored 17 consecutive points with Stephen Gostkowski's field goal and Aaron Hernandez and Danny Woodhead's touchdowns. The Giants were able to come back and win the game with two field goals by Lawrence Tynes and the game-winning touchdown by Ahmad Bradshaw. In the fourth quarter, the Patriots made several offensive errors that proved to be dire in their loss. Two drops by receivers Wes Welker and Deion Branch could have helped the Patriots not turn over the ball to the Giants too early and given them a chance to score. The Patriots could have probably scored and placed the final nail on the coffin of the Giants and win the game.

Several errors by the Patriots proved to help the Giants win the Super Bowl, but give credit where it is due. The Giants played a brilliant game. Making impressive catches and runs that seemed too crazy to believe helped them win the game. On the defensive end, the Giants were able to knock down passes, an interception and cause Tom Brady early in the game to intentionally ground for a safety. Defensively, the Giants were able to contain the Patriots for a good portion of the game. Jason Pierre-Paul was a menace to Tom Brady by knocking passes, causing Brady to play quicker in the pocket, and making several good defensive plays.

The Super Bowl MVP, Eli Manning, was well-deserved of the MVP award by going a stunning 30-40 in completions, throwing for 296 yards, one touchdown throw, and achieving Quarterback Rating of over 100. Both Brady and Eli gave us mind-blowing performances that lead to the game being decided in the final minutes of the fourth quarter. The bottom line is that Eli Manning came out on top and led the better team to win a well-deserved Super Bowl title.

Sharpe and Launius Interview

What's your view on Valentine's Day?
