
Rise of the Planet of the Apes



Currently, there are 18 teams in the United States' professional soccer league, Major League Soccer (MLS). The league was founded in 1993, one year before the United States would host the 1994 World Cup. Although the MLS is not one of the top soccer leagues in the world, many prominent headlines have polished the image of the young league, earning respect from sports fans from different countries. The biggest soccer players in the league, such as Landon Donovan from the Los Angeles Galaxy, and Thierry Henry from the New York Red Bulls, have managed to change the reputation of U.S. soccer, attracting more sports fans and delivering more positive criticism for the game. However, the female counterparts of soccer have not been as lucky. The current number of teams in the Women's Professional Soccer (WPS) is six. The WPS was founded recently in 2007, fielding 11 teams. This soccer league has also had some notable play-

number of goals in the history of U.S. soccer, and Kristine Lilly, who has the most international appearances for the U.S. in the history of soccer. These role models revolutionized soccer for women, in which the U.S. women's national soccer teams won two Women's World Cups in 1991 and in 1999. The latest achievement for the Women's U.S. team was taking 2nd place at the 2011 World Cup after barely losing to Japan.

These results were foreshadowing the glory for the WPS, but now, their future looks bleak.

Why?

During the 5 years of the WPS's existence, there have been a few flaws that have diminished the growth of the league, notably low attendance and economic hardships. According to the 2011 WPS season statistics, roughly 3,500 spectators attended each regular-season game, compared to the average 17, 400 attendance for the 2011 MLS season. The income of the players depends on the attendance, and their salaries are less than the men's compensation. The 2011 WPS season had suffered from a major setback: 4 teams, F.C. Gold Pride, Los Angeles Sol, Saint Louis Athletica, and Chicago Red Stars, are now defunct (disbanded from the league). The former players of those teams would seek positions in the remaining teams of the WPS. Unfortunately, since there is a limit of players on each team roster, players must look into other countries, such as Germany and Australia, for the job. The United States has tried to make the WPS grow, but the reverse has happened.

The league is entirely dependent on United States soccer fans, and there don't seem to be too many to begin with. Without fans, the league will cease to exist. The economic conflicts have resulted in a negative impact for the league. While the MLS grows and nourishes from its success, the WPS crumbles from its own flaws. How will the WPS rise from its miserable state? Only time will tell...
