After projects are dropped off, students are taken to separate rooms based on their math level to take a math test. Students are allowed to take either a group test (free-response) or solo (multiple-choice). Once testing is over, students are free to wander and watch others carry out competitions. When lunch rolls around, all the results are calculated. The ceremony consists of a mini-pep rally followed by announcements of the winners. Those who have won will be taken to the MESA Regionals on April 9th. This is where students who have


