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Course Description

The fourth grade program begins with a general library orientation. The parts of a book are reviewed. The various classifications of the library collection are reviewed and reinforced. Location skills are expanded through the use of the online public access catalog. Online and print-based research skills are expanded; the almanac is introduced as a new reference source. Dictionaries and encyclopedias are reviewed and used in a variety of projects and assignments. Types of literature included at this level are historical fiction and nontraditional tales. Various authors and their works are explored.
