THE SEARCH: WHERE DO YOU BEGIN?

- Research websites:
 - Individual School Website
 - College Board: www.collegeboard.org
 - U.S. Department of Education: collegescorecard.ed.gov
- Check with your guidance office for college representative visits to your high school.
- Attend a college fair.
- Complete prospect forms to receive information from the university.
- Make a list of colleges you would like to visit, then schedule visits.





VISIT CAMPUS

- Attend an Open House or special visit program.
- Schedule an individual visit with the Admissions Office.

- Tips to a successful college visit:
 - Visit when the institution is open.
 - Be on time.
 - Take notes and ask questions.
 - Take advantage of the entire visit.







RESEARCH: REQUIREMENTS AND DEADLINES

- What are the requirements for admission?
 - View the school website for details.
 - Contact the Admissions Office.
- What is the application deadline?
 - Some schools will have deadlines, others will not.
- How selective is the school?
- Apply to your top 3-5 choices.
 - It's better to be prepared!





- Open Admission
 - Accept all high school graduates until space filled
- Rolling Admission
 - Consideration for application as soon as it is completed
- Early Action
 - Submit application prior to regular admissions
 - Decisions come earlier
 - Non-binding
- Early Decision
 - Submit application prior to regular admissions
 - Decisions come earlier
 - BINDING

UNDERSTANDING THE DIFFERENT TYPES OF ADMISSION

- Institution Application
 - Application that is typically available online on the institution's website.
- Common Application
 - A standard application form accepted by colleges who are members of the Common Application Association. May be submitted to nearly 700 colleges that accept it.
- Coalition Application
 - A standard application form accepted by members of the Coalition for Access, Affordability, and Success. May be submitted to more than 90 colleges and universities that are members of the Coalition.

UNDERSTANDING THE DIFFERENT WAYS TO APPLY









START THE ADMISSION PROCESS

- Complete an application for admission.
 - Online Application
 - Application fee (fees vary by institution)
- Submit your information (varies by college).
 - ACT/SAT test scores (code schools)
 - Super Scores
 - Test Optional
 - High School Transcript
 - Self-Reported Academic Record
 - College Transcripts
- Be aware of any other documents you need to send.
 - Personal Statements
 - Essays
 - Letters of Recommendation
 - Interviews
 - Portfolios



WHAT ARE COLLEGES LOOKING FOR IN APPLICANTS?

- Successful Academic Record (9-12 Grades)
- Involvement
- Other supplemental application materials (varies by institution):
 - SAT or ACT test scores
 - Rigorous Course Load (i.e. AP, IB, Honors, Dual Enrollment or College in the High School courses)
 - Essays and/or Personal Statements
 - Letters of Recommendation
 - Portfolio
 - Interview








WHAT ATTRIBUTES ARE COLLEGES LOOKING FOR IN APPLICANTS?

- Well-rounded
- Positive Attitude
- Talents and Passion
- Internal Drive
- Problem Solving Skills
- Grit
- Curious Mind
- Good Communication Skills
- Ability to Work Independently and with a Team




TIPS FOR YOUR ESSAY AND/OR PERSONAL STATEMENT

- Read the directions
- Proofread
- Be concise
- Branding make yourself memorable
- Don't share your entire life story
- Share something that Admissions would not necessarily know from your application











TIPS FOR APPLICATION ETIQUETTE

- Make sure to provide correct contact information on your application.
- Be as professional as possible.
- Take calls at suitable times. Colleges will leave messages.
- Set up an appropriate voicemail. Make sure your voicemail is set up and not full.
- Create a professional e-mail and CHECK IT!
 - Use for applying online, contacting schools, and for financial aid and scholarship applications.

SOCIAL MEDIA

- Use Social Media...WISELY!
 - Be cautious of the content you are sharing, posting, and commenting on.
 - Do not tweet, post, or make derogatory comments about colleges on your social media sites.
 - One-fourth of all scholarship donors look up an applicant's online presence. One-third of these scholarship donors rejected applicants due to their social media presence!





COLLEGE TUITION: CAN I AFFORD IT?

- Don't rule out a school based on the cost of attendance alone.
- Consider this:
 - Financial Aid amounts are based on the cost of attendance for each individual school.
 - Scholarships and Grants could be available!





UNDERSTANDING THE COST OF YOUR EDUCATION

Cost of Attendance

- Direct Costs Items billed by the university
 - Tuition and Fees
 - Room and Board
- Indirect Costs
 - Books
 - Travel Expenses
 - Personal Expenses
 - Miscellaneous






WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID?

- Financial Aid consists of funds provided to students and families to help pay for post-secondary educational expenses.
- Students and parents have the primary responsibility for funding post-secondary education to the extent they are able.



FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

- A standard form that collects demographic and financial information about the student and family.
- Required for all types of federal, state, and institutional aid.
- Colleges use the FAFSA to award financial aid based on what the government believes a family can reasonably contribute towards the education.







APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

- Application opens OCTOBER 1st
- Penn State University Deadline: DECEMBER 1ST
- Pennsylvania State Deadline: MAY 1ST
- THE FAFSA IS FREE!




ONCE YOUR FAFSA IS COMPLETE...

- The results of your FAFSA are sent to each school you list. You may list up to 10 institutions.
- The results are also emailed to the student if an email address is provided - Student Aid Report (SAR).
 - Review your results for accuracy.
 - Update any estimated information.
- Schools may require additional documentation.
 - Some colleges also use the College Board CSS Profile as part of their financial aid process.







AWARD LETTERS

- Each school will send you a summary of the aid you have been awarded at that institution.
- Award letter will list the sources you are eligible to receive based on the results of the FAFSA. This will include:
 - State and federal grants
 - Institutional scholarships
 - Student loans


