Wilma Unlimited: How Wilma Rudolph Became the World's Fastest Woman by Kathleen Krull and David Diaz

The award-winning true story of runner Wilma Rudolph, who overcame childhood polio and went on to win three Olympic gold medals.

The Boy Who Never Gave Up: Stephen Curry by Anthony Curcio

The inspiring true story of NBA Most Valuable Player Stephen Curry and how he overcame being told he was too short, too weak and not good enough play in the NBA.

The William Hoy Story: How a Deaf Baseball Player Changed the Game by Nancy Churnin

Hoy, a deaf baseball player, asked the umpire to use hand signals for strikes, balls, and outs, forever changing how the game was played.

Cubs in the Tub: The True Story of the Bronx Zoo's First Woman Zookeeper by Candace Fleming

Fred and Helen Martini longed for a baby, instead they ended up with dozens of lion and tiger cubs to foster. This nonfiction read aloud introduces readers to the Bronx Zoo's first female zoo keeper.

The Boy Who Loved Math: The Improbable Life of Paul Erdos by Deborah Heiligman

Rosie Revere, Engineer by Andrea Beaty

A bestselling picture book about pursuing one's passion with persistence, while learning to celebrate each failure on the road to achieving one's dreams.

Who Was and What Was books by various authors

These series of nonfiction texts offer kid-friendly accounts of important historic events and famous figures.

Who Would Win books by Jerry Pallotta

Young readers explore the facts and characteristics between two wild animals. Which animal would win a deadly fight?

READING IS IMPORTANT!

It is our hope that you will continue to immerse your child in literature over the summer break. In reading, the proverb "practice makes perfect" reigns true. Research indicates that in learning to read - just reading -is the most powerful contributor to the development of accurate, fluent, high-comprehension reading. It is also proven that at every age level, reading more pages in school and at home was directly associated with higher reading scores. Unfortunately, summer reading loss is a documented reality for many students. By continuing to read over the summer, children may escape the "summer setback." We can say with confidence that the actual time spent reading is the best predictor of a child's reading achievement - the more students read, the better readers they become.

PARENTS:

Trinity's Lower School implements the Accelerated Reader program as a tool to monitor independent reading. AR is a computer based program that assesses student reading comprehension. The five to ten question assessment presents multiple choice answers so children learn to weigh options and make informed decisions. Students are awarded points based on the number of questions answered correctly.

During the school year, the teacher and the librarian are able to use this information, combined with many other tools, to assist the children in making appropriate book choices as well as identifying student growth in comprehension.

Students in the second grade are encouraged to reach 40 points in the Accelerated Reader program during the 2023 - 2024 school year (August 9 - May 17).

For your convenience, the AR website is listed on the right. This enables your child to take tests at home. Your child's log in information (username and password) is included in the summer packet from their first grade teacher. There is also a link to AR Bookfinder, this link will allow you to check books you may have at home to see if they have an AR test.

Students are required to take a minimum of 3 AR tests out of the 10 books.


The library will be closed August 7th and 8th for professional development.
