GWRSD & MES 2022-2023 Highlights: A Year in Review

Effingham Elementary School has many reasons to celebrate, events to highlight, and accomplishments to be proud of from this year! Our whole school community went “Batty” in preparation for the Effingham Conservation Commission’s poster contest. The theme was: “Why Bats are Good for the Earth.” We have enjoyed all parts of our playground and nature trail by sledding, creating a Pumpkin Path community event, a Story Walk with the Effingham Public Library, snowshoeing, and all types of recess games! The EES solar field produced 167.23 MWh in 2022 and is on track for 2023. Students have attended field trips of all sorts this year: Camp Cody, The Ecology School, The NH State House and Capitol, King Pine Ski Area, Remick Museum, and a visit to our very own Middle School for rising seventh graders. We’ve also hosted several guests: TIGER from Plymouth State University, Christa McAuliffe Planetarium, Lions Club Eye Screenings, Rotary Presentations, KRHS/NHS Read Program, and a Family Fun Snowflake Social! EES staff and students have immersed themselves into the science of reading, especially at the primary grades. Our math coach works with all classrooms and teachers throughout the week. Students have risen to the challenge of ExactPath Challenges. The 2023 district Spelling Bee Winner and Runner-Up both call Effingham Elementary their home school and are both in fourth grade. Finally, EES is gearing up to host a Summer Program with funding from Title 1!

The year 2022-2023 proved to be a remarkable one for **New Durham School**, with exciting developments and accomplishments across various areas. To start, our enrollment reached an impressive milestone of 160 students, marking the highest number in several years. This surge in student population injected a renewed sense of energy and vibrancy into our school community.

Our Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO) played a vital role in our success, working alongside us to expand our playground replacement fund and providing invaluable support to our dedicated staff. Their dedication and hard work made a significant impact on the overall well-being of our school.

Recognizing the importance of effective communication, we embraced the power of social media by expanding our use of Instagram. By establishing an account under the handle @ndswildcats, we fostered stronger connections with our families, enabling us to share important updates and celebrate student achievements more efficiently.

Additionally, we organized wonderful winter and spring concerts, featuring the musical talents of our fourth-grade recorders, the fifth and sixth-grade band, and the fourth to sixth-grade chorus. The NDS chorus even had the honor of performing for the GWRSD School Board, leaving a lasting impression on all who witnessed their exceptional talent.

Art and creativity were celebrated through an enthralling Arts Night and Spaghetti Dinner, which brought together our school community in a vibrant display of artistic expression and delicious food. The event served as a platform for our students to showcase their talents and ignited a sense of pride among all attendees.

Sports played an integral role in our students' experiences, and our Winter Sports program was a resounding success. All third to sixth-grade students enthusiastically participated, fostering teamwork, sportsmanship, and a love for physical activity.

This TCS Family experience also provided a leadership opportunity for older students within each family, as well as the possibility for students to make connections with others outside of their class throughout the year. Our 2022-2023 school year was full of academics, social growth, team building, memories and a whole lot of fun at TCS!

Middleton Elementary School had a fantastic year in 2022-2023, marked by a series of exciting celebrations and achievements. One of the highlights was the ability to welcome all families at once to our family events, fostering a sense of unity and community. Weekly grade-level and monthly school-wide meetings brought our students together and provided time to learn about and bring to culmination our character education monthly theme that heightened understanding of our motto: The Carpenter Way is to be safe, kind, and responsible to ourselves and others. T.I.G.E.R., the theater performance group from Plymouth State University, is an annual treat that children so enjoy. Its lively entertainers enthrall the students with their actions and words as the mini skits focus on all the themes that we have learned throughout the year. Memorial Day continued to be a very special occasion at Carpenter School. Focusing on the theme of 'Freedom,' our students gave their all to the service men and women as they sang patriotic songs, provided background to each song's origin, listened to speakers, and stood quietly as the Crescent Lake band played the *Star-Spangled Banner*.

With all the joy that the traditions bring, the academic rigor continued, and our students have demonstrated significant growth as readers, writers, mathematicians, and problem solvers. It has been a joy to visit their classrooms and observe them share their various projects with their families and friends during their curriculum night. Field trips to the Clarke House, Hunter's Sap House, Squam Lakes, the Polar Caves, and a ride on Molly the Trolley to tour local monuments, brought classroom studies to an authentic and different level of understanding for the children. As the year comes to an end, we look forward to Field Day and our all-school gathering to watch a PowerPoint of the year.

Students at **Crescent Lake School** are finishing a 2022-2023 school year that was filled with the return of many traditional activities and programs as well as the addition of some new ones. Familiar activities such as Fall Festival, Invention Convention, and National History Day took the lead as grade-level and school-wide events brought students together and celebrated teamwork, innovation, and thoughtful

planning and research. This year, we had 6th grade students selected to the national level of competition for Invention Convention. Nine students are being recognized at the state level and will be attending the National History Day competition in Washington, D.C, this June.

Our Otter Student Council led a canned food drive that collected over 1,350 items for our local food pantry. The drive was so successful that students were inspired to collect items in need for families in transitional housing at the CrossRoads House in the seacoast area of New Hampshire in time for the winter holidays. The CLS Otterbots Robotics team celebrated a regional 1st place award before competing at the state level. Winter Sports kept our students busy as they visited the Rochester Ice Arena for ice-skating, Gunstock for snowboarding and skiing lessons, and the trails around CLS for snow-shoeing. Fourth grade historical figure projects and a schoolwide Fun-Run challenge event took center stage this spring as new events for CLS.

As the school year draws to a close, our 5th grade students are enjoying their three-day experiential learning trip at The Ecology School while the rest of CLS is preparing for Field Day and our annual Can-Jam Tournament. After School Club programs, our Drama Club's production of *The Legend of Polar Mountain*, our One-Wheeled Wonder Unicycling team, and the return of our CLS Jazz Band all helped make this school year fun and engaging for students before, during, and after school hours. At CLS, we achieved and celebrated learning in 2022-23 as an Otter family community in a multitude of ways while practicing our core values of being ready, respectful, and resilient.

Based on recommendations from the New England League of Middle School assessment, **Kingswood Regional Middle School** has implemented school-wide initiatives. These have been based around expectations and the implementation of multi-tiered systems of support with behavior. The intent of these efforts is to sustain a climate and culture within the building that supports all learners. The creation of the K.R.M.S. (Kind, Respectful, Motivated and Safe) motto will allow students to access common language, expectations, and instruction from all adults in the building.

We are extremely proud of our efforts to continually strengthen our advisory program. To help with this, we have focused professional development efforts around Brooklyn Raney's book, *One Trusted Adult*, which teaches the fundamentals needed to build strong connections and healthy boundaries with young people. Our goal is to ensure that every KRMS student has the one thing that is crucial to their well-being and success: an accessible, boundaried, and caring trusted adult. In connection with this program, students have been using Raney's Ripple Journals in advisory.

We will strengthen our schedule to allow for more instructional time within our five core classes (ELA, Math, Science, Literature, and Social Studies). This change has limited transitions, increases instructional time, and provides opportunities for deeper and greater engagement during lessons. The schedule continues to support students at KRMS while also facilitating their future transition to the high school level.

Community involvement included sending cards and gifts to local nursing homes, holiday caroling during Wolfeboro Town Parade, and the donation and delivery of 28 Thanksgiving baskets to families in our community. Successful extracurricular activities included athletic teams, the drama production of *School Daze*, Envirothon Club's 1st and 2nd placement in their state competition, and student participation in the New England League of Middle School Leadership conference.

The Seal of Bilingual Proficiency is a national and state award program that acknowledges students who have studied and developed proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation. To receive the Seal of Bilingual Proficiency, students must demonstrate an Intermediate High proficiency level in another language. These students did this by taking a national standardized test and earned either a 4 or a 5 on the AP test or a 6 on the STAMP test. Students earned a Seal on their diploma and a cord to wear at graduation. In addition, the Seal of Bilingual Proficiency will be recognized on their official transcript. This year, in the state of New Hampshire, there are 82 students from 13 different schools who have earned this honor and 17 of them are from Kingswood; that is approximately 20% of all the Seals of Bilingual Proficiency in the state.

The NH Education Department is reviewing a proposal to amend rules governing the Minimum Standards for Public Schools Approval. The proposal has been in development for two years with input from various professional organizations. The State Board of Education is seeking additional input from students, parents, business leaders, educators, and more before entering into the rulemaking process. The rulemaking process includes opportunities for public comment and oversight by the Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules. Information sessions are being planned throughout the state to discuss the draft and gather insight.
