Dear Parents/Carers,

Intense half term; when isn't it!?

As always by the end of May, the exam season is well underway. I'd like to start by saying well done and good luck to all our year groups who are fully in revision mode over the half term (or at least should be with a few well-earned breaks!). A notable well done to all in Year 10 who have now completed their English Literature GCSE. Our lead invigilator commented on how brilliant they were throughout and on the fact that they seemed to all be writing until the bitter end. Many of them had a real sense of achievement, having written the most they've ever written!

Lovely celebration events were held for Years 13 and 11 before breaking up for study leave. It is notable how disrupted their academic and personal journeys have been over the last three years. All students deserve every success; we look forward to the proms at the end of June/ July.

Lots of learning points this half term; thankfully there aren't many schools who have had to implement the lockdown procedure for real, but Kineton did on 19th April. We were lucky to have previously booked a security expert, who advises many schools locally, for the following week. With his advice, we've been able to amend and improve further our procedure. I communicated some of the changes to parents and carers and another practice will be carried out before the Summer holidays.

There has been a flurry of recruitment taking place in school over the April-May period. With the sad news that Mr Leahy, our long serving Assistant Headteacher, will be retiring, we set about finding a replacement. I am delighted that David Murphy, currently an AHT at North Oxfordshire Academy, will be joining us in September. He'll be a great addition to our team at Kineton. Wonderful news too that Glenda Boyle, one of our fantastic Heads of Year team, will come back in the new term as Assistant Head for Behaviour and Ethos. This is a new role that will oversee the implementation of our Kineton values: Ambition, Respect and Kindness as well as supporting and leading the work of the pastoral and personal development teams. Many of you will have already had contact with Mrs Amanda Woodward our new SENDCO and Assistant Head. She is currently with us for two days a week and will be full time in September.

It is with great pleasure that I am able to share the news that our safeguarding team is soon to be complemented by an additional DDSL, Ms Esme Platt and a family support worker, Ms Anna Stowe. As education professionals, we work closely alongside social care; the health care system and the emergency services to support all our children and families. I have no doubt that these postholders will have a positive impact on the learning and education of many young people at Kineton. Our aim is to ensure excellence in Safeguarding practice. Many students got involved in activities to celebrate and recognise Safeguarding Awareness week last week (May 22nd).






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Headteacher's message




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Pastoral Update

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Teaching and Learning

Bear Grylls is a British legend, he served in the UK SAS (Special Air Service) and at one point was the youngest person to climb Mt. Everest in the world, just 18 months after breaking three vertebrae in a parachuting accident. Now the UK's face for Scouts, whose motto is "Be Prepared".





This is an appropriate message to all students at Kineton who need to come to school prepared for every single lesson. Below is some of the ways parents can help their child be prepared, and ultimately successful for their school day.

- School bag Students need to pack their school bag the night before, checking their timetable to make sure they are bringing the right things for the right day. It can be too chaotic and last minute if they do it on the morning of the day, so a reminder the night before is really useful.
- Breakfast Students will be more awake, alert, and teenagers will have a better temperament if they have broken the fast (breakfast) in the mornings.
- Uniform Students must come to Kineton School following the uniform policy. If they are not in correct uniform, they are challenged at the start of the day in form, setting the day off on a negative before learning period 1. If a child is unable to wear correct uniform due to a medical reason, then they will need a parental note.
- Equipment Children lose things a lot, but they need to have the right basic equipment for the school day. This includes a pencil case with pens, pencils, green pens for reflective tasks, highlighters, rulers and a calculator.
- Reading book Every child should have a reading book that they can take to school and read in English lessons or across other lessons when instructed.

When children are prepared for school, and for learning, they will have a much better day. So a continued thanks for all your support in setting them up to be prepared for the day ahead.






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Careers and Work Experience

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Duke of Edinburgh Award

3 Ex students all attended Buckingham Palace on Friday 19th May to collect their Gold Awards. All 3 of these students have shown great determination in completing their awards over the last few years.

The country went into its 1st lockdown 5 days before Ed's year were due to do their practice expedition, they had planned all their routes practice and qualifying, completed all their training and then lost both the practice and qualifying expeditions. They had to adapt rapidly but his determination paid off, eventually an alternative expedition took place and even though it was not the experience he was expecting, 500 miles cycled albeit on static bikes, 3 bikes refurbished and donated to charity the temporary changes to the DofE programme allowed him to complete all sections. Ed has shown great resilience and adaptability through the challenges that this threw at him.

Mia and Joe put their faith in us to deliver the programme for their year group as things started to get back to some "sort of normal" as we tentatively came out of the pandemic. Training done, practice done we managed to squeeze in a qualifying expedition late in the season for them, the weather was a challenge, daylight hours were short and 1 of their team was still recovering from a recent bout of Covid. They dug deep on that expedition worked together and kept going.

All 3 also managed to complete the residential section which is the main sticking point for those enrolling on the gold award but it really is a fantastic opportunity to meet new people, make new friends and try something new. When



speaking to the students enrolled they are all quite nervous about this section but don't be everyone is in the same situation of not knowing anyone else but it really is a fantastic opportunity.



A nudge to our year 12 and 13 students, keep going, complete the sections, sign up to a residential and have a great time. The Dofe message is "# youth without limits" Well done to these 3 who did not allow the pandemic to limit them.

Expedition season is here. Over the last few weeks we have had a Gold practice expedition to the Brecon Beacons. This was a very wet and windy experience, conditions added to making this a challenging experience for the year 12 students. Despite some initial navigational difficulties they worked well together as a team and spirits stayed high. It did mean a late finish on day 1, pitching tents in a continued downpour everything was soaked including the ground they were trying to pitch on. The wind was very strong and cooking was proving challenging but they showed great determination to get through it .

The 2nd day saw a slight improvement in the weather, a chance to get out on open ground and see some amazing views after the previous day round and round a forest. Lack of sleep, and low confidence meant they travelled slowly in the morning, checking and double checking their navigation. Confidence grew through the day and the afternoon saw an improvement in their self belief and their pace. The 2nd campsite was a much better affair, a barn to cook under cover, nice toilets, some hot water and the opportunity to relax.

After a good nights sleep day 3 dawned bright and dry. With renewed confidence the group smashed day 3, keeping excellent time and their navigation was spot on. Next for them is their qualifying expedition in the Lake District in July. Hopefully the weather is kind.

The Bronze groups had their 1st experience of expeditions on their practice expedition at the beginning of May. They were all fantastic! They started at Burton Dassett hills or Tysoe and were then navigating to Horley, on the Sunday they then would head to the opposite start point. They all coped very well with the navigation and groups were keeping good time. Some still think it is a competition as to who gets their first, but all groups worked well. There was some fantastic meals cooked at camp which was brilliant to see and made such a change from pasta and tomato sauce. They enjoyed their time at camp in the evening but most settled well to a night in a tent.

Sunday morning was a lovely bright start to the day if a little chilly and some of the students had found it a bit cold overnight. They soon got moving though and all tents were packed away, breakfast cooked and they were off again. Another fantastic day with very few navigational issues, all groups finished in high spirits even the groups who ended their weekend with a climb up to the top of Burton Dassett. Not long now until their qualifying expedition.

So only the 3 qualifying expeditions left for this year. The bronze group are heading to the Cotswolds, the silver group to the Peak district and the Gold group off to the Lake district. If any participant is needing assistance with the other sections please remember to come and have a chat.





Leave of Absence During Term Time 2022-23



Student Absence Procedure

If your child is unwell and cannot attend school please call the **24 hour Absence Line on 01926 645 611 before 8.50am**, stating their name and form, your name and the reason. This must be done for each day they will be absent.

If your child is unable to attend school for any reason other than illness, planned or emergency (part day, full day or multiple days), please always complete a leave of absence form and send it by email to khsattendance@stowevalley.com This form should be used for all appointments (medical, dental, music exams or external sporting activities), holiday requests, religious observance dates and all other reasons or circumstances where your child will be absent from school.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

Unauthorised Absence

There are times when children are absent for reasons, which are not permitted by law. Examples of unauthorised absence are parental illness, term time holidays or a family day out. Where there is no explanation for an absence or where the explanation or reason for the absence is considered unsatisfactory absence will be recorded as 'unauthorised'. Unauthorised Absences have to be reported to the Local Authority. The Attendance Compliance Enforcement Team may contact you where unauthorised absence continues to be a problem. Unauthorised absence could result in a Fixed Penalty Fine or other legal action. We are always concerned about the amount of school time pupils miss as a result of term time leave. There is no entitlement to time off during term time. Leave of absence is only granted in exceptional circumstances at the discretion of the Headteacher in accordance with the school policy as agreed by the governing body.

We greatly appreciate parental support to reduce the total amount of days lost due to holidays. We are committed to working in partnership with you to enable your child to reach their academic targets and to support their social development. For this to happen we need to keep individual attendance as high as possible - we all need to play our part.

It is our policy:

- Only in an exceptional circumstance will term time leave be allowed. Parents/Carers wishing to apply for leave of absence need to fill in an application form well in advance and before booking tickets or making travel arrangements.
- If term time leave is taken without prior permission from the school, the absence will be unauthorised and you may be liable for a fixed-penalty fine or other legal action.
- Please remember that absence for whatever reason disadvantages a child by creating gaps in his/her learning. A good understanding of the work and good progress can only take place when the child is in the classroom regularly and on time.

If you think you have exceptional circumstances please talk to us without delay and before arrangements are entered into or money committed. If exceptional circumstances are accepted the Headteacher will determine how much absence will be authorised. Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Leave of Absence During Term Time 2022-23



The Supreme Court clarified has clarified the law on must attend school on every day that they are required to do which may result in legal action being taken against the so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

The regulations regarding Leave of Absence (The Education (Pupil Regulations) (England) Regulations 2006 as amended by Education (Pupil Regulations) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013.) advise:

term time unless they consider there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application.

If the leave is granted, Head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. When making an application for Leave of Absence in advance parents are advised to give sufficient information and time to allow the Head teacher the opportunity to consider all the exceptional circumstances and to notify parents of their decision. It is advised that if the resident parent has not received notification or a response regarding the leave of absence application, it is their responsibility to ascertain if the leave is authorised prior to the start of the leave.

The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with whom the child normally resides.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the (Platt v Isle of Wright 2017). The Supreme Court has made dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

> Where a leave of absence is requested, but additional days taken either prior to or after the request may be considered as part of the leave of absence and could result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

> Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case-by-case basis and on its own merits.

Leave of Absences which are not made in advance cannot be Head teachers shall not grant any Leave of Absence during authorised in line with legislation. This will result in the absence being recorded as 'unauthorised'. This may result in legal action against the parent, by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice. All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council.

> It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

> Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.
