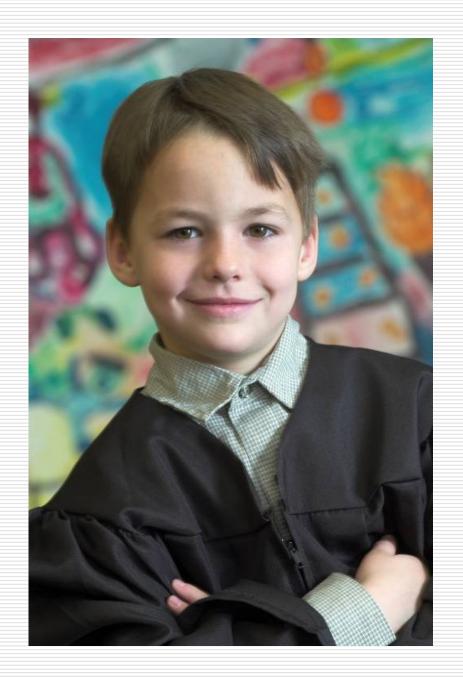

Condition Assessments

- 85% building conditions are unsatisfactory, poor or fair
- ☐ Most problems are infrastructure





Issues Identified



- ☐ 58% need heating systems replaced
- ☐ 36% have roofs near or past end of service life



Issues Identified



- 60% Have plumbing systems beyond service life
- 46% Need new windows or have single pane or uninsulated windows



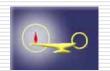
Issues Identified

- ☐ 25% Need more electrical outlets or circuits
- 21% Need lighting upgrades

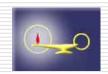


Spending Expectations

□ These funds would be spent over 4 – 6 years on school improvement projects. It is possible that 2008 taxes would reflect some increase.

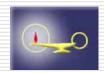
☐ Year Projects Tax Impact \$85,290 Home

- 2008: \$ 88.9 million; \$0.093 tax rate; \$ 3.70/mo
- 2009: \$103.9 million; \$0.204 tax rate; \$ 8.05/mo
- 2010: \$106.3 million; \$0.317 tax rate; \$12.50/mo
- 2011: \$100.9 million; \$0.425 tax rate; \$16.75/mo
- 2012: \$ 99.9 million; \$0.532 tax rate; \$21.00/mo

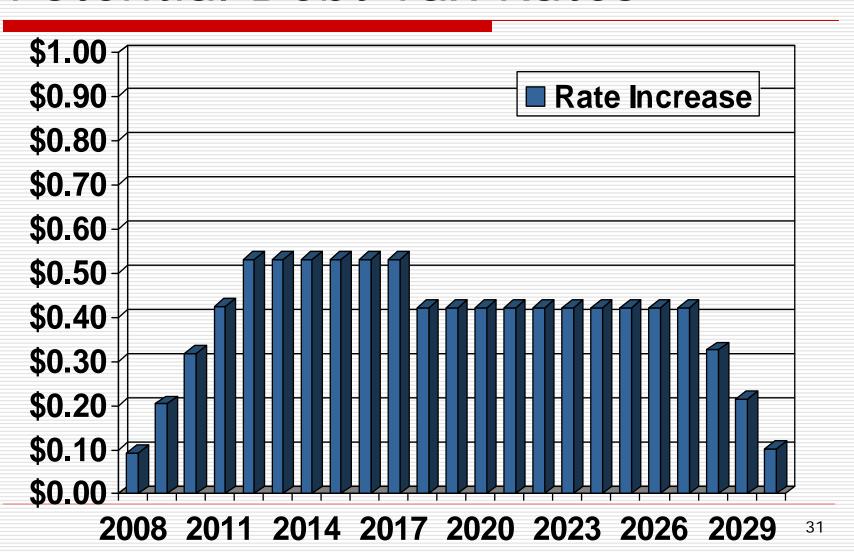

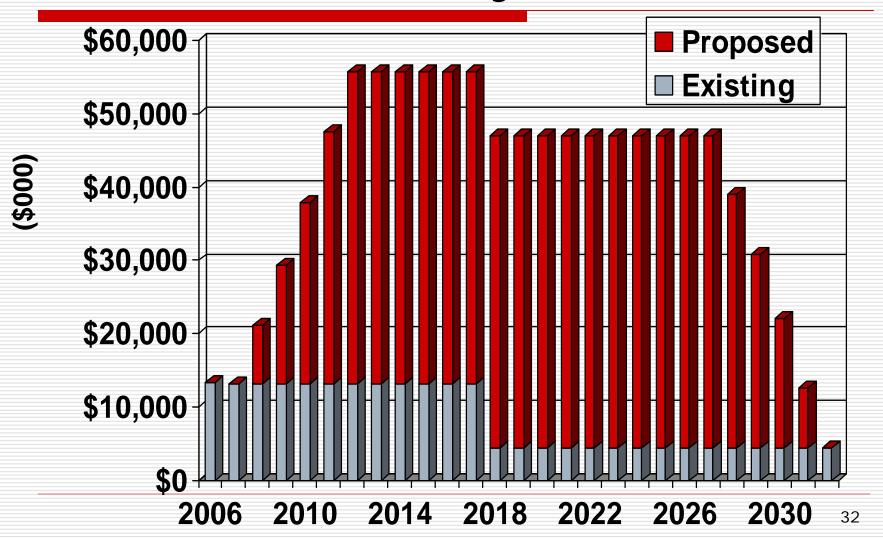


Potential Debt Tax Rates

Guiding Principles

- 1. Education of our students is critical
- 2. Facilities must complement the educational process
- 3. Tax burden within the limits of what community and citizens can support
- Efficient design and effective implementation



Guiding Principles

- Complete appropriate and affordable work for each school
- Consolidation will be considered
- Science and Technology Center in partnership
- Reduce dependence on debt serviced by property tax



Recommendations

- Issue bond financing for \$500 million for improvements
- 2. Report annual progress
- 3. Maximize use of Capital Projects Fund

Approve a \$500 million bond – recognizing that the needs presented by the FWCS administration and their consultants exceed this budget and that future work will be required to address the condition of many schools in the district. The \$500 million should be used to address as many of the first 23 work items on the New Yellow Option as is necessary and possible, at as many schools as possible, starting with the greatest capital improvement needs.

When the \$500 million has been spent on these top priority items, the community should evaluate both the effectiveness of the administration in implementing the capital improvement program and the remaining capital improvement needs of the district.
