2. Prove Competency

Students must earn a score of 684 or higher on the following End of Course (EOC)/AIR Tests

- Algebra I
- English II

Earn credit for one CCP Math and/or English course

Demonstrate two of the following Career-Focused Activities
 one of the two must be a foundational activity

Foundational:

- Score proficient on your CTE WebXams
- Earn a 12 point CTE Industry Credential
- Be accepted into an approved apprenticeship program

Supporting:

- Complete a work-based learning experience
- Earn the required WorkKeys scores
- Earn the Ohio Means Jobs Readiness Seal

3. Show Readiness

Students must earn 2 diploma seals to show readiness.

A diploma seal is a sticker on your diploma that is awarded by the state to demonstrate your academic, technical, and professional skills and knowledge.



Honors Diploma GPA Requirement

The Ohio Department of Education has clarified that the GPA requirement for an Honors Diploma must be calculated on an **UNWEIGHTED** GPA scale.

Field Experience Requirement

- 15 hours, in one or more locations related to the specific honors diploma pathway
- Required log signed off by site supervisor

Portfolio Requirement

If student uses field experience as their exemption:

- Collection of ten work samples related to student's honor diploma area of focus. Can include: projects, essays, presentations, documentation of performance, videos, photos of project, art work, etc.
- Short presentation to school personnel and professionals in the field.

Portfolio Requirement

with field experience:

- Electronic or hard copy
- Company profile/thorough description of company (i.e. products, services, marketing strategies, size, image, etc.)
- Log of 15 hours: time, activities completed, signed off by placement supervisor

Portfolio Requirement

with field experience continued....

- Job shadowing reflection (2 page typed, double spaced, 12 pt font, 1" margin):
 - Describe your experience
 - What did you learn from your experience?
 - How did this contribute to your thinking about life after high school?
 - What else would you like to learn about this or related fields?
- Provide two artifacts from their placement/work samples/pictures/video. If you are unable to obtain artifacts from your site, you must provide two work samples in your honors diploma pathway.
- Short presentation to school personnel and professionals in the field

TURN IN THOSE PE WAIVER FORMS!

It is your responsibility to get your coach's/parents' signatures and return the forms to your counselor.

You will be scheduled into PE classes if you do not turn in your forms.

- Discuss post-high school plans
- Answer any questions or concerns you have
- Parents/guardians are welcome to attend the meeting

Senior Privilege -Late Arrival/Early Dismissal

- Come to school 1 or 2 periods late <u>or</u> leave 1 or 2 periods early <u>or</u> come
 1 period late and leave one period early
- Completed and signed <u>form</u> required
- Must meet requirements:
 - All credit -recovery courses must be completed
 - Passing grades
- Must attend scheduled study hall until given notice
- Privilege can be revoked per administrators' discretion

Meningococcal Shot



The Ohio Department of Health has the following immunization requirements for students who will be entering the 12th grade in the 2023-2024 school year:

Two doses of Meningococcal (serogroup A, C, W, and Y) are required prior to entry into 12th grade. If the first dose was administered on or after the 16th birthday, a second dose is NOT required.

Enlisting in the Military?



- 1. Do your homework before enlisting. Talk to different recruiters from different branches every branch has different incentives and different jobs available.

- 5. Consider ROTC programs with scholarship money attached
- 6. Academies requires a lot of diligent effort that you would need to start this summer

Personal College/Military Visits

- → We encourage you to go on college and/or military visits this year.
- → You are permitted two excused college visit days, just make sure to turn in verification from the college to CSHS's Attendance Office.
- → Ask a lot of questions during your visit. Make a list of questions to ask before your visit.

Applying to colleges....



- ★ Pick 4 to 5 schools that interest you
- ★ Apply online
- ★ Submit your application with all required documentation
- ★ Are you applying for Early Action/Decision? Strict deadlines!

Applying to colleges continued....

- ★ Ask your counselor to send an official transcript to the school
- ★ Get a housing application if you're living on
- ★ Find out what tests (ACT/SAT/SAT II Subject
 Tests) are required and the deadlines for submitting your official score report
- ★ If you have questions ask your parents/guardians, guidance counselor, or an admissions director

College Representative Visits

- → College representatives will visit CSHS throughout the year during lunch periods
- → Be sure to go talk with reps. They may be on the decision panel for acceptance
- → Check the scrolling announcements/monthly newsletters for upcoming visits

- 3 essays (one page each)
 - Past experiences how you became who you are
 - High school experiences
 - Future plans what and why
- Have a teacher/a strong writer proofread your essays

Helpful Tip....

Plan to have all college applications submitted by Winter Break!

*It is your responsibility to know all your chosen college's deadlines/requirements.
(Ex. Early Decision/Action dates/SAT Subject Tests requirements, etc.)



Acceptance Is Preliminary

Colleges/NCAA/NAIA care about senior coursework and grades.





Interested in playing sports in college?

NCAA (Division I/II/III)/NAIA - determine eligibility to play competitive college sports.

NCAA eligibility worksheet

- Must have 16 core credits (English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Foreign Language)
- Must have a minimum GPA/ACT/SAT score (varies by division)

Need to register ASAP!
See your counselor for additional information.

Additional info about college sports....



- → If you hope to play college sports, you must meet NCAA/NAIA academic eligibility requirements
- → Credit recovery classes are **not** accepted
- → NCAA/NAIA will need an official copy of your transcript.
- → Register with the Clearinghouse to begin the process \$80 fee



WHAT'S THE DIFTERENCE?

SAT VS ACT

What is the difference between the SAT and ACT? Although both gauge a student's readiness for university, there are many differences between the two.



TOP SCORE Scaled score 400 -1600.



READING

The SAT has 5 reading passages.



ESSAY

The SAT essay focuses more on comprehension of the source text.



TIME

Excluding the optional essay, the SAT is 3 hours long. With the optional essay, total test time increases to 3 hours and 50 minutes.



MATH

Formulas provided. Calculator allowed for some questions.



SCIENCE

No Science based section.



TIME

Excluding the optional essay, the ACT is 3 hours and 30 minutes. With the optional essay, total test time increases to 4 hours.



MATH

Formulas not provided. Calculator allowed for all questions.



SCIENCE

Be prepared to look up data and trends, make predictions and synthesize information.



TOP SCORE

Scaled score 1 - 36.




READING

The ACT has 4 reading passages.



ESSAY

The ACT essay focuses more on evaluation and analysis of complex issues.

A few things about the ACT....

- The Class of 2024 took the ACT in February.
- Recommend taking "Plus Writing" once if you are not sure which college you're going to attend.
- Can have scores sent to 4 colleges free of charge; additional charge for extra colleges. (Many colleges require scores sent directly from ACT.)
- F & R Lunch: qualify for 4 fee waivers, see your counselor for a waiver.

A few things about the **ACT*cont....

- All of the national testing dates are offered to CSHS students. Testing locations vary on different dates but there are always sessions held in Stark County. You will select your testing location when you register.
- There is a cost to National Test Date ACT
