AMANDA ASARO '08 was MCI Athlete of the Year during her senior year. While active in soccer and basketball, Amanda's strongest sport was track, where she was a star at MCI and later ran at Division I Central Connecticut State University. Amanda is arguably MCI's best girls distance runner ever. She currently is the school record holder in 1600, 3200, 4x100, and 4x800. She has seven of the top 10 800 times, 9 of the top 10 1600 times, and 8 of the top 10 3200 times. She was a five-time KVIC individual and relay champion and a five-time KVIC individual and relay runner-up. A two-time team MVP, Amanda was a very good soccer player and was named KVIC Class B Defensive Player of the Year in basketball as a junior. Amanda decided to pursue track and ran indoor as an independent athlete as a senior, where she won the mile and finished second in the 2 mile. Amanda resides in New Hampshire, where she works in the healthcare administration.

BECKY VAUGHN WALKER '93 was a three-sport athlete who starred as a pitcher and went on to a Hall of Fame college career at the University of Maine at Farmington. During her freshman year at MCI, Becky compiled a 16-3 pitching record, giving the Huskies a first-place standing in eastern Maine and state runners up in Class B. During her junior year, the Huskies were 18-2, winning the Eastern Maine championship. Becky earned all-state honors and was named the team's defensive MVP while batting .433. As a senior, the team was 12-3, advancing to the Eastern Maine semifinals. Becky received MVP honors. Becky was also a four-year athlete on the basketball team and played one year of soccer. Becky is a kindergarten teacher for SAD#53 and continues to coach girls in pitching windmill, having served as an assistant softball coach for MCI.

SAM MARZNELL '99 is the only golfer in MCI history to win three individual state golf championships - in 1996, 1997 and 1998. His 1998 title earned him a berth in the New England Regional Championship. Sam's MCI golf teams won the Class B state title in 1997, and the team was state runners-up in 1996 and 1998. The team also won the Kennebec Valley Athletic Conference title in 1998. He was 13-0 in high school matches during his senior year and was selected Portland Press Herald's Golfer of the Year. Sam also won the Alden MacDonald Junior Tournament at Sugarloaf and was the Big "I" state qualifier for nationals. Sam also played first singles tennis as a senior at MCI. After MCI graduation, he attended the University of Maine at Farmington where he won 15 college golf events. Sam worked ten years as a PGA pro at Cape Arundel Golf Club. He is now a school teacher in RSU# 1 in Bath, Maine.

JOHN WILCOX '89 was MCI Athlete of the Year during his senior year; he played football, basketball, tennis, baseball and track during his three years at the school. John excelled in basketball, where he was named MVP for three years and served as captain during his senior year in which he averaged 17 points and 11 rebounds per game. A three-year member of the football team, John was captain and team MVP as a senior; John also captured the Eastern Maine Championship for shotput during his senior year on the track team. Academically, John received the Rod-eric Smith Award, attended Boys State, received the MEA Award for Writing, and participated in MCI's French Club and the Cultural Exchange Club. John is a clinical associate professor of occupational therapy at the University of New Hampshire.

ANDREW ST. CLAIR '02 received MCI's coveted Masters Cup at graduation and was a four-year member of the baseball and basketball teams, while also playing on the soccer team for three years. After MCI, St. Clair was a Hall of Fame basketball player at Colby-Sawyer. At the time of his induction, St. Clair held school records in rebounds, steals, blocks and field goals. St. Clair was named Commonwealth Coast Conference Player of the Year three times, and Rookie of the Year in the 2002-03 season. He was a National Association of Basketball Coaches All-American Second Team selection, as well as numerous other accolades, including Colby-Sawyer Male Athlete of the Year and Senior Scholar Athlete of the Year in 2006. Following his collegiate career, he became the third Colby-Sawyer athlete to compete professionally overseas. St. Clair now works in software sales at Smartsheet in Boston and is an assistant men's basketball coach at Colby-Sawyer.

JETHRO FERGUSON '92 was a four-year member of MCI's football and basketball teams and also played baseball and ran track for a year. After graduating from MCI in 1992, Ferguson attended Middlebury College in Vermont where he was a member of the Panther football and basketball teams all four years, earning eight varsity letters. Ferguson moved to New York City after college and began his career in advertising, first with Ammirati Puris Lintas Digital and then with Ogilvy Interactive where he held various leadership roles. He is currently with Publicis Groupe, one of the world's largest advertising holding companies, as the Global Chief Production Officer for Publicis Groupe's largest client, Procter & Gamble. Ferguson currently lives in Westfield, New Jersey with his wife Molly, and their four children.

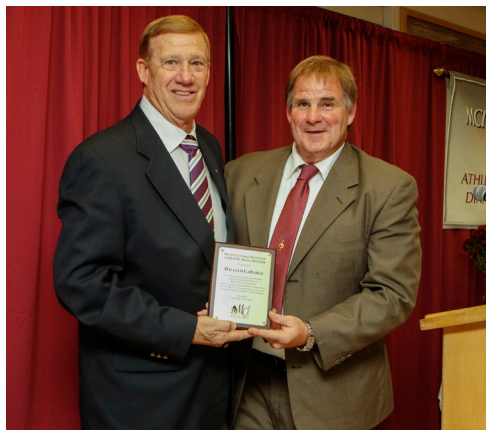
EMILY WALKER ANDERSON '94 was a four-year member of the soccer, basketball, and softball teams at MCI. As a senior forward, Anderson averaged 20 points, 9 rebounds, and 4 steals for the Huskies and was chosen as Class B South Player of the Year and all-conference. Upon graduation from MCI, Anderson attended New Hampshire College for a year before transferring at Husson University where she enjoyed a Hall of Fame basketball career. She was named to the State of Maine First Team in 1998, as well as the NAIA Third Team All-American. Emily scored over 1,000 points in her Husson career, averaging 14.73 points per game which is fourth all-time. Anderson is eighth in all-time scoring at Husson with 1,208 points. Anderson ended her Husson career with a shooting percentage of 54.4, the highest in school history. Anderson, who works as a nurse, lives in the Bangor area with her husband, Justin, and their two daughters.

ANDREA CIANCHETTE MAKER '75 was a member of the varsity basketball and field hockey teams for three years. In college, Maker was an avid rower on the University of New Hampshire Crew Team, where she won a silver medal in the Head of the Charles Regatta in 1976, placed in the same race in 1977, and won a gold medal in the National Women's Rowing Association national competition in 1978. Maker received her Bachelor's in Business Administration at the University of New Hampshire's School of Business and Economics, and her juris doctorate from the University of Maine School of Law. She is a law partner at Pierce Atwood LLP, and also served as VP of Corporate Affairs for Martin's Point Health Care and Director of Public Affairs for the former Champion International Corp. Maker is the mother of four children and continues to row with the Yarmouth Rowing Club.

RONALD FRIEND '65 lettered in baseball, basketball, and football, playing those sports all four years of his high school career. Friend received the Coaches Trophy for lineman as a senior in football. He also received the Master's Cup and as a senior was Sno-Ball King. During his senior year he played on the MCI basketball team that finished 5th and made the school's first appearance in the Eastern Maine Tournament. Friend ran a successful auto dealership for many years before retiring.

WILLIAM LABARGE '67 won the Maine Interscholastic Athletic Association pole vault championship in 1965 and 1967, and was a member of the track team as a sophomore, junior and senior. He played for the 13-4 Prep basketball team as a senior, after playing on the undergraduate team his sophomore and junior years. He attended Ricker College in Houlton, ME, where he was captain of the baseball and soccer teams as a junior and senior and earned All-Conference in soccer and baseball. He received the school's Athlete of the Year award in 1971, and upon graduation, had two professional baseball offers from the Boston Red Sox and the Philadelphia Phillies. A Lt. Commander in the U.S. Navy, he has authored several books, including *Sweetwater Gunslinger 201*, and later served as a technical advisor on the film "Top Gun."

SUSAN STAPLES '81 was a three-sport star at MCI, playing basketball, field hockey, and softball. She was a co-captain in basketball and was selected Athlete of the Year. She participated in drama, student council and received the Faculty Cup as the top female student. Staples was the sophomore Class President and a member of the National Honor Society. She is a physical education teacher in the Merrimack Valley School District, Penacook, NH.

STEPHANIE SHAW '91 was a four-year member of the basketball, soccer, and softball teams, earning Class B All-State and team MVP honors in all three sports. In basketball, she scored more than 1,000 points and advanced her team to the Eastern Maine playoffs all four years, including an 18-0 regular season her junior year. Her 1990 softball team advanced to the Eastern Maine Class B Finals. She was selected to play on a USA Soccer Ambassador team in 1989, travelling to England, Belgium, Holland and Germany to compete internationally. A 1995 graduate of Husson University, she was inducted into the Husson Hall of Fame in 2005.

STANLEY WYMAN '46 was a three-sport star at MCI. Wyman was quarterback of the football team as a junior and senior. In basketball, Wyman earned All-Tournament honors as a senior with teammate Jack Christie at a season-ending basketball championship at UMaine. On the baseball team, he pitched in the team's 14 games his junior year, and played centerfield as a senior. He joined the service upon graduation and later competed at Husson, playing basketball and baseball in 1949-50. Wyman was employed by Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. from 1950 until his retirement in 1993.

PAMELA NEWHOUSE DUFOUR '77 was class vice president as a sophomore and junior and won the Faculty Cup as well as Athlete of the Year recognition as a senior. She played on the field hockey team for three years, and softball as a sophomore and junior. She was on the track team as a senior. She received the Tuesday Club award her senior year. She was a trumpet staff member three years and was a member of student council her junior and senior years. She was selected to Girls State as a junior and was a member of the band as a sophomore and junior. Dufour played field hockey and basketball at UMPI, receiving the Female Athlete of the Year award her senior year. She coached field hockey and basketball at Georges Valley High School, then field hockey and track at Lawrence High School. Dufour, who has taught PE for 33 years, works as a physical education instructor at George Mitchell School in Waterville. She was a recipient of the Waterville Schools Board of Education Faculty Award.

DALEN MILLS '66 was class president as a senior and played on the undergraduate basketball and baseball teams as a sophomore and junior. He led the basketball team in scoring both years (sophomore 16.7 ppg and junior 21.1 ppg). He also led the Huskies in hitting (.345 and .361) his two years on the baseball team. He started on the PG basketball team as a 5th year senior and was second in scoring. He was a member of the famous 1965 MCI basketball team which was the first MCI team to play in the Eastern Maine tournament. After MCI he attended UMaine-Farmington, and lettered in baseball, basketball and golf as a freshman and sophomore. He earned a UMF letter jacket (lettering in at least two different sports for two years to qualify), which was a rare accomplishment for a sophomore. He also lettered in basketball, baseball and cross country at Pemetec High School in SW Harbor before attending MCI in 1963. Mills had a successful propane and heating oil business in Southwest Harbor before retiring.

MICHAEL SUSI '75 was a three-year letter winner in football and basketball, serving as captain of both his senior year. The football team was Class D state champions in 1974 and the basketball team played in the Class B tournament as a 5th seed. He joined the PG team after completion of his high school season and the PG team went on to win the New England Prep School Championship for the first time since the 1950s. He also lettered in baseball as a junior and senior. He was a three-year member of the Key Club and went to Boys State as a junior. He won the Gary S. Dupill Sportsmanship Award. He was class treasurer as a sophomore and class president as a junior. Susi coached Boys Varsity Basketball on two separate occasions, and was a girls basketball assistant to Julie Treadwell. He was instrumental in the football boosters and there is a football award/scholarship named in his honor.

2015 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

MARTHA BEVERAGE BLACK '83 was a field hockey, basketball and track athlete at MCI while also earning valedictorian honors. She received the top female athlete award among her numerous MCI activities and honors. She received the Coaches Award in field hockey and was a team MVP in basketball. She attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology where she also received the top female athlete award. She was a three-time Academic All-American as a basketball and field hockey player. Black worked in the chemical engineering field for a number of years and is now part of the faculty at Bowdoin College as a laboratory instructor.

DAVID FERNALD '58 was also a class valedictorian and three-sport athlete at MCI, playing football, baseball and basketball. He was a member of the 1956 undefeated Maine prep school champion MCI team that did not allow a point. He captained the MCI postgrad team in 1957. He attended Bowdoin where he was a three-time All-Maine selection in football and also played lacrosse. Fernald was inducted into the Maine Sports Hall of Fame in 2007. He also received his MBA from Stanford and enjoyed an extended and successful career in the software field.

DERMARR JOHNSON '99 earned McDonald's, Parade Magazine, and USA Today High School All-American honors while a member of the MCI post-graduate basketball team. He averaged 26 points and 6.7 rebounds a game and was named Parade Magazine National High School Player of the Year. He attended the University of Cincinnati, and was selected sixth overall in the 2000 NBA draft by the Atlanta Hawks. After two years in the NBA, Johnson's career was curtailed by an automobile accident. He returned to the NBA in 2003 with the New York Knicks, then played for the Denver Nuggets in the 2004-05 season. After two more seasons in the NBA, Johnson's career took him to international play, with stops in Italy, Lebanon, Columbia, Argentina, and Venezuela.

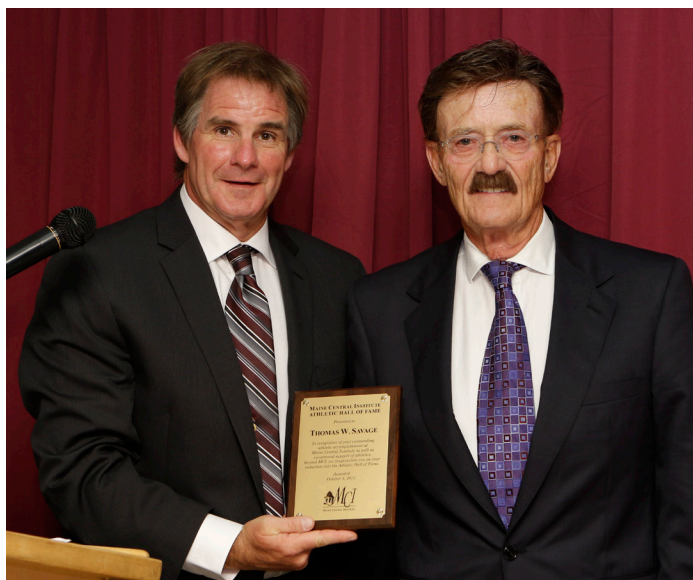
THOMAS SAVAGE '99 was a 4-year member of the baseball, basketball and football teams at MCI lettering the first time in all three as a freshman, serving as co-captain of the football and basketball teams as a senior. He was a starter all four years of his baseball career, and threw a no-hitter as a junior. He started at quarterback for the football team and then guard with the basketball team for three years. Tom was previously inducted into the MCI Hall of Fame in 2007. He graduated from the University of Maine in 1968 and then went to work for Federal Reserve Bank of Boston. He later enrolled in the New England School of Law, graduating in 1975 before moving to Bangor where he practiced law for more than 20 years.
