H.1.a.1. Academic Services - FCPS District Service Delivery Model (Planning)

Discussion:

Amanda Dennis, Soraya Matthews, Faith Thompson and Michael Dailey shared a presentation on The District Service Delivery Model. Amanda described the service model as a three-tiered support effort that included required, recommended, and requested services. She then addressed the implementation of co-teaching data considered for the selection of schools in the 2017-2018 school year. The process included the review of the number of students with IEP's receiving services in general education, master schedule readiness and school readiness. The co-teaching initiative consists of professional learning, internal coaching, external coaching, and fidelity checks to ensure support through feedback. Michael shared information on allocation of gifted and talented as well as ELL teachers, an MTSS process for gifted services, the ELL Service Framework Level 1- Level 5, and the SIOP Implementation. Faith provided information on the service delivery model for expanded student support through learning culture and environment. The student support service charge was to create a service delivery model using triangulated or multiple and varied points of data. The expanded student support service schools include: TCE, TCMS, TCHS, Lexington Traditional Magnet, Partnership Zone schools, and Empowerment Zone Schools. Faith also shared the online requesting system to request expanded student support services. Soraya discussed the professional learning requesting system and how services are channeled to the appropriate curriculum department. Once a request is received, the directors of curriculum share the request with the appropriate department to provide the requested support.

Background/Rationale: KDE's 702 KAR 4:160 requires 10% retainage on construction contracts until the project is 50% complete, when a reduction to 5% retainage is allowed. After substantial completion of the work, a reduction to a lump sum amount less than the 5% retainage, which lump sum shall be twice the estimated cost to correct the deficient or incomplete work, may be approved. The contract with D.W. Wilburn, Inc. for the construction of Frederick Douglass High School in the amount of \$62,044,000.00 (including direct purchase orders) was accepted and approved by the Board at its May 14, 2015 meeting. Since that time the progress of the work has been reviewed by the Office of Facility Design & Construction, the design consultants Tate Hill Jacobs Architects, and the local building code officials. More than 99% of the construction is currently complete, leaving \$380,734.69 for the remainder of the contract work, including the retainage amount. Currently, the contractor has requested with the approval of the surety, the recommendation of the architect and the concurrence of the FCPS Facility Design & Construction staff, a reduction of the retained amount to a lump sum of \$172,347.69, which amount the architect confirms is twice the estimated cost to correct the deficient or incomplete work. The Kentucky Department of Education requires that this reduction of the retainage to a lump sum be approved by the Board. Remaining payments to the contractor shall not be made until all work has been completed and accepted by the architect and FCPS Facility Design & Construction. Prior to final payment, a BG-4 Final Approval and Payment Application Form will be presented for signature by the Superintendent and acceptance of the work by the Board. Approval of this reduction of retainage complies with the intent of the requirements of 702 KAR 4:160 and the Kentucky Department of Education, District Facilities Branch.

Background/Rationale: The construction of a new high school to be located on 65 acres at 2000 Winchester Road (formerly 1970 Winchester Road) is listed as priority 1a.5 on FCPS's 2013 District Facility Plan. Tate Hill Jacobs Architects produced final Construction Documents for bidding describing the construction of a new building totaling approximately 285,790 SF to serve 1,800 students. The 21st Century high school program was developed during a series of Building Committee meetings attended by FCPS instructional and administrative leadership, and refined in small group meetings where teachers provided direction related to collaborative teaching and project-based subject matter. The program is consistent with recent new high school projects across the nation and provides new building space that functions and supports current FCPS enrollment growth. Bids were received on May 7, 2015 and construction began in June, 2015. The Office of Facility Design & Construction, the design consultants and the local building code officials have reviewed the progress of the work. Changes to the original plans and specifications have been necessary in order to satisfy the requirements described below. Approval of these changes allows the work to be completed. EOP Architects has produced Design Development documents (plans, elevations, with BG-2 Outline Specifications and BG-3 Statement of Probable Cost) describing the construction of approximately 80,000 SF to serve 750 students. Recommendation/Motion: Approve the waiver request to KDE relative to 702 KAR 4:170 to allow the elimination of a door from the Art Classroom directly to the outdoor art patio as shown on the drawings prepared by EOP Architects for the construction of the New Elementary School at Athens-Boonesboro Road, subject to the approval of the Kentucky Department of Education, District Facilities Branch, per the provisions of 702 KAR 4:160.

Background/Rationale: The construction of a new elementary school to be located on a new site is listed as priority 2a.1 on FCPS's 2013 District Facility Plan. EOP Architects has produced Design Development Documents describing the construction of a new 750-student elementary school (original capacity increased from 650 in anticipation of growth). The program is consistent with recent FCPS elementary school projects and provides new building space that functions and supports current FCPS instructional programs. KDE's 702 KAR 4:170 Facility Programming and Construction Criteria states that the Standard Art Classroom shall be located "On ground floor at north exterior wall for direct access to a future art patio."

The intent of the regulation is to require a location for the art classroom that will allow daylight from the north into the room. This north light provides better color rendition with few shadows during the day. Locating the art classroom on a north-facing wall on this site is not possible. Artificial lighting with better color rendition can be provided indoors with proper light fixture selection. In lieu of providing an exterior door directly to the exterior that requires additional security alarms, students will have access to the outdoors via corridor to the exterior. The KDE District Facilities Branch has required that the Board request a waiver of the 702 KAR 4:170 Facility Programming and Construction Criteria to allow this layout to be incorporated into the final building design. The approval of a waiver request is recommended by FCPS and the design team.

AUTHORIZATION FOR CHAIRMAN AND SECRETARY TO EXECUTE INTENT TO PURCHASE SCHOOL BUSES ON STATE CONTRACT

<u>BACKGROUND AND RATIONALE:</u> Fayette County Public Schools operates a fleet of 287 buses. This fleet supports an active daily schedule of over 1,400 bus routes, travelling approximately more than 3.3 million miles per year. The daily active bus requirement has increased steadily each year with a level of 241 for the 2017-2018 school year. The remaining buses are required to support normal preventive maintenance, mechanical repairs, and regularly scheduled monthly safety inspections.

The district presently is using a 14-year life cycle for school buses. The bus replacement plan has been aligned to provide a uniform annual replacement of 20 buses per year. This number of replacement buses is expected to maintain the desired fleet size of 280 buses and is expected to support the present and proposed numbers of schools for the next school year.

Although cash purchasing of buses is preferable due to the savings in interest, purchasing through Kentucky Inter-local School Transportation Association (KISTA) provides a reasonable alternative, especially during times of extremely low rates of interest. The time-value of money over the ten-year bond retirement period can also be a counterbalancing amount. The annual interest rate of the presently proposed bonding is expected to be at 2.85% over the next ten years based on current market conditions. The actual bond rate will be determined at the time the bonds are sold, and will be at a fixed rate. Use of the bonding program spreads the procurement costs over the ten-year period covered by the state depreciation/reimbursement schedule. 702 KAR 5:020 outlines the state depreciation schedule for school buses and the manner in which local district reimbursement for transportation costs is affected.

In order to purchase school buses on the state bid contract a KDE SCHOOL BUS PURCHASE AUTHORIZATION (PA-1) must be signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Education. Further, in order to purchase the buses with bonds, which can be repaid over a tenyear period, the Board of Education must adopt a KISTA participation resolution. Options for these buses can be included on the bonding program, and will be, with the exception of Zonar.

PARTICIPATION RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN EQUIPMENT LEASE AND SECURITY AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE KENTUCKY INTERLOCAL SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION ASSOCIATION AND THE BOARD PROVIDING FOR THE ACQUISITION AND LEASING OF SCHOOL BUSES AND APPROVING GENERALLY THE PLAN OF FINANCING THE ACQUISITION OF SCHOOL BUSES FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") has determined that it is necessary and desirable that the Board acquire new school buses in order to provide for the transportation needs of the students served by the Board, and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Department of Education of the Commonwealth of Kentucky ("Department") has implemented a program to assist local boards of education throughout the Commonwealth in the acquisition of school buses, combining the needs of school districts throughout the Commonwealth and purchasing in bulk directly from the manufacturers, and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the pooled acquisition of buses administered by the Department, it is necessary that local boards of education provide their own financing for the acquisition of school buses purchased for them through the Department, and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Boards of Education of the Elliott, Lewis, Morgan, Pendleton, Rowan (the "Original Districts") and certain subsequent Districts (the "KISTA Governing Board") that certain economies may be realized through the utilization of a joint agency to act for and on behalf of local boards of education desiring to acquire school buses, and

WHEREAS, the provisions of Sections 65.210 through 65.300 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, designated as the Interlocal Cooperation Act ("Act"), set forth the procedure by which any two or more governmental units may enter into agreements with one another and with third parties for joint or cooperative action, and

WHEREAS, the KISTA Governing Board pursuant to the Act administers the Kentucky Interlocal School Transportation Association ("KISTA") which acts as an agency and instrumentality for those local boards of education which desire to participate in the issuance of Certificates of Participation on a pooled basis, the proceeds of which are applied to the acquisition of school buses for participating boards of education in order that certain economies in financing may be realized; said pooled financing plan being designated as the KISTA Equipment Acquisition Program ("KEAP"), and

WHEREAS, in order for the Board to participate in KEAP for the year 2017 for which KISTA is to act as an issuing agency for this Board and other participating local boards of education, it is necessary that the Board approve the execution of an Equipment Lease and Security Agreement ("Series 2018 Lease") by the Chairman and Secretary whereunder this Board's portion of school buses ("Equipment") purchased from the proceeds of KISTA's Series 2018 Certificates of Participation, will be leased by KISTA to the Board on a year to year basis at rentals sufficient to amortize (i) the costs of the Equipment purchased by KISTA on behalf of this Board through the payment of the Board's pro rata portion of the Series 2018 Certificates of Participation, issued by KISTA, (ii) the funding of a collision insurance and debt service reserve fund, to the extent required, and (iii) the expenses incident to the issuance of said 2018 Certificates of Participation, allocated to the Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. DECLARATION OF PUBLIC POLICY

That the Board hereby declares that it is in the best interests of the Board to cooperate with other local boards of education pursuant to the Act and to contract with the Kentucky Interlocal School Transportation Association in the acquisition of Equipment through the utilization of KEAP for 2017 effected by the issuance of KISTA's Certificates of Participation, Series of 2018, (the "Series 2018 COPS" or "COPS"). It is now anticipated that KEAP for 2017 will be funded with KISTA COPS issued in the year 2018.

SECTION 2. APPROVAL OF GENERAL FINANCING PLAN

That KISTA has been established pursuant to the Act to act as an issuing agency for participating boards of education in the issuance of Certificates of Participation, which, after providing for the expenses of their authorization, sale, issuance, and funding a collision insurance and debt service reserve, shall be utilized on a pro rata basis among the participating boards of education for the acquisition of Equipment. The KISTA COPS, shall be issued pursuant to the terms of a Trust Indenture by and between KISTA and The Huntington National Bank, Cincinnati, Ohio ("Trustee") and shall be secured exclusively by rental payments due under a certain Equipment Lease and Security Agreement ("Lease") whereunder the Equipment purchased by KISTA with the proceeds of the COPS, will be leased to the Board on a year to year basis at annual rentals sufficient to amortize the Board's pro rata portion of the proceeds of the COPS allocated to Equipment purchased on behalf of the Board, and the expenses incident to the authorization, sale, and issuance of the COPS.

SECTION 3. AUTHORIZATION OF EXECUTION OF EQUIPMENT LEASE AND SECURITY AGREEMENT

That the Chairman and Secretary of this Board are hereby authorized to execute an Equipment Lease and Security Agreement with KISTA; said Lease shall provide for the lease of the Equipment purchased by KISTA on behalf of the Board to the Board on a year to year basis for a term of ten years at annual rentals sufficient to amortize the Board's pro rata portion of the COPS issued by KISTA on its behalf, as well as the expenses incident to the authorization and sale of said COPS.

The Lease shall be prepared by KISTA's Bond Counsel prior to the sale of KISTA's COPS, and shall be submitted to the Board and its counsel for consideration and execution.

The Lease shall provide for annual rental payments in amounts sufficient to amortize the Board's pro rata portion of the KISTA COPS, which shall be payable in semi-annual installments due two weeks prior to the principal and interest due dates on the KISTA COPS.

The Lease shall provide that the Board shall have the option to not renew the Lease at the end of any rental year (June 30), but the Lease shall automatically renew without action by the Board in the event the Board desires to continue its obligations on a year to year basis.

The Lease shall provide that the Board shall have the option to purchase the Equipment identified therein at any time upon sixty days' notice to KISTA and the Trustee Bank and upon the payment of the Board's pro rata portion of the KISTA COPS, then outstanding, plus interest due to the next interest payment date upon which the Board's portion of said COPS may be redeemed plus any redemption premium.

The Lease shall provide that the Board shall maintain adequate liability insurance in accordance with guidelines established by the statutes and the Department, but the Equipment financed thereunder shall be covered by KISTA for collision insurance for all damage in excess of \$5,000.

The Lease shall provide that title to the Equipment shall be vested in the Board, but shall be subjected to a security interest in favor of the Trustee Bank in order to secure the Registered Owners of the KISTA COPS, with the right to foreclose in the event of a default by the Board.

The Lease shall not be effective or binding upon the Board or KISTA unless and until its provisions and the Board's execution thereof are approved by the Commissioner of Education of the Commonwealth of Kentucky or the duly authorized and designated representative of the Department in accordance with the Commissioner's direction.

That the Lease shall provide that in the event the Board shall fail to pay the required rental payments due thereunder, KISTA, or its designee, shall have the right to advise the Department and request that the Commissioner of Education or his duly designated representative in the Department intercept those funds appropriated and allocated to the Board annually for school transportation requirements in any year in which the Lease is in effect and apply a sufficient amount to the rental then due; said right of interception shall terminate upon the termination of the Lease by the Board in accordance with its terms.

That the Lease shall provide that title to the Equipment purchased by KISTA on behalf of the Board shall vest in the Board and the Board shall exercise all rights incident to the ownership of said Equipment and shall be responsible for liability insurance and maintenance of said Equipment from which responsibilities KISTA shall be held harmless, but KISTA shall provide collision insurance for claims in excess of \$5,000.

SECTION 4. DIRECTION TO SUPERINTENDENT

That the Superintendent of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to file an executed copy of this Resolution, accompanied by an executed copy of the Board's 2017 School Bus Purchase Authorization, with the Department no later than November 15, 2017; the Department's deadline for KISTA orders; said Resolution and Authorization shall likewise be filed with Ross, Sinclaire & Associates, LLC, Financial Advisor to KISTA no later than November 15, 2017.

That this Resolution shall constitute a notice and request by the Board to KISTA that the Board be included in the 2017 KEAP pooled financing represented by the KISTA COPS, to the extent of the Board's required Equipment indicated herein and that Counsel for KISTA proceed to prepare the Lease reflecting the general terms herein set forth and the specifics of the Board's participation.

That upon	the sale and delivery of the KISTA	COPS the proceeds thereof, after	the deduction of the
expenses incident to	their authorization and sale, shall be de	eposited in an Acquisition Account	with the Trustee Bank
in the name of the	Board and applied to the acquisition	of the Equipment for the Board	in the total amount of

Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, the Board shall have the right to withdraw its participation at any time prior to January 15, 2018, by giving written notice to KISTA of its intention to withdraw. Conversely, KISTA may rely on the commitment of the Board expressed through the adoption of this Resolution unless and until it receives notice to the contrary by the date stated.

SECTION 5. NOT TO BE ISSUED AS "QUALIFIED TAX EXEMPT OBLIGATIONS"

That pursuant to Section 265(b)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, the Board, by the adoption of this Resolution, acknowledges that KISTA's COPS will not be issued as "qualified tax exempt obligations", but that the Board's pro rata portion of said COPS will count against the Board's \$10,000,000 "qualified tax exempt obligation" limitation for the calendar year ending December 31, 2018 just as if the Board or its School District Finance Corporation had issued said COPS directly.

SECTION 6. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF POSSIBLE VARIATIONS

That by the adoption of this Resolution the Board acknowledges its understanding that estimated interest rates for the KISTA COPS, are subject to some variation based upon the conditions of the municipal bond market at the time the KISTA COPS are publicly advertised and sold and that the annual rental payments due under the Lease will be impacted by the interest requirements of the COPS, as well as the amount of the Board's participation.

SECTION 7. WAIVER AND CONSENT ON BIDDING

That Ross, Sinclaire & Associates, LLC, Lexington, Kentucky, is acting as Financial Advisor to KISTA and Program Administrator for KEAP. In accordance with Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board Rule G-23 as amended November 28, 2011, said Fiscal Agent shall not provide any underwriting services. Compensation of said Fiscal Agent will be in accordance with the fee schedule approved by the Kentucky Department of Education and the Kentucky School Facilities Construction Commission.

Kentucky Interlocal School Transporation Association (KISTA) Equipment Lease Revenue Bonds

Overview: Following the tragic Carrollton bus accident, the Department of Education established one of the state's highest safety standards for school buses in the nation. School districts in Kentucky now pay approximately \$95,000 on the average for each school bus unit. By State mandate, all units are now required to be equipped with diesel engines.

In Kentucky, there are over 9,700 school buses in service each day. In order to provide a low cost financing tool for school districts to pay for their school buses, several superintendents joined together to form an organization known as "KISTA."

Issuer: The Kentucky Interlocal School Transportation Association "KISTA" is a not-for-profit association of up to fifteen (15) school districts in Kentucky established pursuant to KRS, Sections 65.210 through 65.300, of the Interlocal Cooperation Act. The Board of Directors for KISTA are the superintendents of the 15 districts, or their designees. The Board serves without pay and establishes the policies and procedures of the Association.

Purpose: KISTA acts as an issuing agency of tax-exempt bonds or notes in order to provide the needed funds for participating school districts to acquire new school buses. The school buses purchased through KISTA have diesel equipped engines and meet all safety requirements of the Department of Education. The buses are purchased from a State approved vendor's listing which has been competitively bid by the Department of Education.

Pay-back Mechanism: Each participating school district's Board must first approve by Resolution approval to participate in the KISTA financing program and to enter into an Equipment Lease & Security Agreement with KISTA. The lease amount of a District is the prorata share of the District's equipment costs to the total equipment costs purchased from the Bond proceeds times the annual principal and interest payments of the Bonds.

KISTA provides a self-insurance collision policy for each bus unit financed. There is a \$5,000 deductible per unit. The maximum payment is computed on the depreciated value of the school bus unit. Comprehensive and liability insurance is the local district's responsibility. Any insurance reserve remaining after the KISTA bonds are repaid will be rebated to the participating districts on the same original prorata basis.

The Bonds: KISTA Equipment Lease Certificates of Participation are issued for 10 years, which uniformly matches the depreciation formula of the Department of Education. The Bonds are competitively bid and awarded to the successful purchaser based on the lowest interest cost to the participating Districts. KISTA bonds are rated "Aa3" by Moody's Investors Service.

Prior KISTA Bond Issues: KISTA has provided tax-exempt financing for over 4,650 school bus units costing over \$319 million. A listing of the districts which participated in prior KISTA bond issues is shown below:

Dear Mr. Caulk:

J.J.B. Hilliard, W.L. Lyons, LLC ("Municipal Advisor") appreciates the opportunity to serve as municipal advisor to Fayette County School District ("Client"). Upon your acceptance, this engagement letter (the "Agreement") will serve as our mutual agreement with respect to the terms and conditions of our engagement as your municipal advisor, effective on the date this Agreement is executed by Client (the "Effective Date").

1. Scope of Services

Hilliard Lyons is engaged by Client as its Municipal Advisor to provide the services with respect to the issuances of municipal securities, the structure of bank loans or leases, or other financing programs the Client may consider ("Issue(s)") [or municipal financial products ("Products")] set forth in **Appendix A** (the "Scope of Services").

2. Municipal Advisor's Regulatory Duties When Serving Client

MSRB Rule G-42 requires that Municipal Advisor make a reasonable inquiry as to the facts that are relevant to Client's determination whether to proceed with a course of action or that form the basis for and advice provided by Municipal Advisor to Client. The rule also requires that Municipal Advisor undertake a reasonable investigation to determine that it is not basing any recommendation on materially inaccurate or incomplete information. Municipal Advisor is also required under the rule to use reasonable diligence to know the essential facts about Client and the authority of each person acting on Client's behalf.

Client agrees to cooperate, and to cause its agents to cooperate, with Municipal Advisor in carrying out these regulatory duties, including providing to Municipal Advisor accurate and complete information and reasonable access to relevant documents, other information and personnel needed to fulfill such duties. In addition, Client agrees that, to the extent Client seeks to have Municipal Advisor provide advice with regard to any recommendation made by a third party, Client will provide to Municipal Advisor written direction to do so as well as any information it has received from such third party relating to its recommendation.

3. Term of this Engagement

The term of this Agreement begins on the Effective Date and ends, unless earlier terminated as provided below, [at the close of business on the settlement date for the Issue]. This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause by either party upon the giving of at least thirty (30) days' prior written notice to the other party of its intention to terminate, specifying in such notice the effective date of such termination.

4. Compensation

Fees and expenses. The fees due to Municipal Advisor hereunder shall be, and expenses incurred by Municipal Advisor in connection with any services provided hereunder shall be reimbursed, as set forth in Appendix B.

5. Required Disclosures

MSRB Rule G-42 requires that Municipal Advisor provide you with disclosures of material conflicts of interest and of information regarding certain legal events and disciplinary history. Such disclosures are provided in Municipal Advisor's Disclosure Statement delivered to Client together with this Agreement.

6. Post-Pricing Purchase of New Issue Securities [if applicable]

In accordance with MSRB Rule G-23, when serving as a Municipal Advisor, Hilliard Lyons may not function as an underwriter for the Client's financing. Rule G-23 does not prohibit Municipal Advisor from purchasing a client's bonds from an underwriter following pricing of the bonds and Hilliard may do so.

7. Waiver of Jury Trial

EACH PARTY AGREES TO WAIVE ANY RIGHT TO A TRIAL BY JURY WITH RESPECT TO ANY CLAIM, COUNTERCLAIM OR ACTION ARISING OUT OF OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT OR THE TRANSACTIONS CONTEMPLATED HEREBY OR THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PARTIES. PARTIES AGREE TO WAIVE CONSEQUENTIAL AND PUNATIVE DAMAGES.

8. Choice of Law

This Agreement shall be construed and given effect in accordance with the laws of Kentucky.

9. **Binding Effect; Assignment**

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of Client and Municipal Advisor, their respective successors and permitted assigns; provided however, neither party may assign or transfer any of its rights or obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of the other party.

10. Entire Agreement

This instrument, including all appendices hereto, contains the entire agreement between the parties relating to the rights herein granted and obligations herein assumed. This Agreement may not be amended, supplemented or modified except by means of a written instrument executed by both parties.

11. Severability

If any provision of this Agreement is, or is held or deemed to be, invalid, inoperative or unenforceable as applied in any particular case in any jurisdiction or jurisdictions because it conflicts with any provisions of any constitution, statute, rule or public policy, or for any other reason, such circumstances shall not make the provision in question invalid, inoperative or unenforceable in any other case or circumstance, or make any other provision or provisions of this Agreement invalid, inoperative or unenforceable to any extent whatever.

12. No Third Party Beneficiary

This Agreement is made solely for the benefit of the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns. Nothing in this Agreement, express or implied, is intended to confer on any person, other than the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns, any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities under or by reason of this Agreement.

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The undersigned represents and warrants that (s)he has full legal authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of Client. The following individuals have the authority to direct Municipal Advisor's performance of its activities under this Agreement:

- Evaluate options or alternatives with respect to the proposed new Issue, including refunding opportunities.
- 2. Review recommendations made by other parties to Client with respect to the new Issue/Refunding
- **3.** Review financial and other information regarding Client, the proposed Issue and any source of repayment of or security for the Issue/Refunding
- **4.** Consult with and/or advise Client on actual or potential changes in market place practices, market conditions, regulatory requirements or other matters that may have an impact on Client and its financing plans
- 5. Assist Client in establishing a plan of financing
- **6.** Assist Client in establishing the structure, timing, terms and other similar matters concerning the Issue
- 7. Prepare the financing schedule
- **8.** Provide assistance as to scheduling, coordinating and meeting procedural requirements relating to any required bond referendum, other than through cash or in-kind contributions with respect to such referendum
- Consult and meet with representatives of Client and its agents or consultants with respect to the Issue
- 10. Attend meetings of Client's governing body, as requested
- 11. Advise Client on the manner of sale of the Issue
- **12.** Assist in the gathering of information with respect to financial, statistical and factual information relating to Client in connection with the preparation of the preliminary and final official statement
- 13. For a competitive bid where the Client has not engaged disclosure counsel to prepare the preliminary and final official statement, assist the Client in preparing the preliminary and final official statement and the bid package, obtain CUSIP numbers and provide an electronic version of the official statement to the winning underwriter
- **14.** Make arrangements for printing, advertising and other vendor services necessary or appropriate in connection with the Issue
- **15.** Advise Client with regard to any continuing disclosure undertaking required to be entered into in connection with the Issue, including advising on the selection of a dissemination agent
- **16.** Assist Client in collecting and analyzing bids submitted by underwriters and in connection with Client's selection of a winning bidder
- **17.** Prior to the time of sale, provide Client with relevant data on comparable issues recently or currently being sold nationally and by comparable
- 18. Review required underwriter disclosures to Client [where applicable]
- **19.** Assist Client in selecting legal and other professionals (such as paying agent, verification agent, trustee, escrow agent, accountant, feasibility consultant, etc.) to work on the Issue
- 20. Respond to questions from bidders, underwriters or potential investors
- **21.** Arrange and facilitate visits to, prepare materials for, and make recommendations to Client in connection with credit ratings agencies, insurers and other credit or liquidity providers
- 22. Work with bond counsel and other transaction participants to prepare and/or review necessary authorizing documentation of Client and other documents necessary to finalize and close the Issue

- 23. Coordinate working group sessions, closing, delivery of the new Issue and transfer of funds
- **24.** Prepare a closing memorandum or transaction summary for Client with respect to such matters as sources and uses of funds disposition of close, debt service repayment schedule, etc.
- **25.** If requested by Client, assist and provide guidance with respect to the investment of bond proceeds. If such service are provided by Municipal Advisor, a separate schedule of fees for such services will be provided to Client, but in no case will said fees exceed fees as promulgated by the United States Treasury Department.

DISCLOSURE STATEMENT OF MUNICIPAL ADVISOR

This Disclosure Statement is provided by Hilliard Lyons ("Municipal Advisor") to Fayette County School District (the "Client") in connection with the Municipal Advisor Engagement Letter dated September 18, 2017 (the "Agreement") and is dated as of the same date as the Agreement. This Disclosure Statement provides information regarding conflicts of interest and legal or disciplinary events of Municipal Advisor required to be disclosed to Client pursuant to MSRB Rule G-42(b) and (c)(ii).

PART A – Disclosures of Conflicts of Interest

MSRB Rule G-42 requires that municipal advisors provide to their clients disclosures relating to any actual or potential material conflicts of interest, including certain categories of potential conflicts of interest identified in Rule G-42, if applicable. If no such material conflicts of interest are known to exist based on the exercise of reasonable diligence by the municipal advisor, municipal advisors are required to provide a written statement to that effect.

General Mitigations – As general mitigations of Municipal Advisor's conflicts, with respect to all of the conflicts disclosed below, Municipal Advisor mitigates such conflicts through its adherence to its fiduciary duty to Client, which includes a duty of loyalty to Client in performing all municipal advisory activities for Client. This duty of loyalty obligates Municipal Advisor to deal honestly and with the utmost good faith with Client and to act in Client's best interests without regard to Municipal Advisor's financial or other interests. In addition, because Municipal Advisor is a broker-dealer with significant capital due to the nature of its overall business, the success and profitability of Municipal Advisor is not dependent on maximizing short-term revenue generated from individualized recommendations to its clients but instead is dependent on long-term profitably built on a foundation of integrity, quality of service and strict adherence to its fiduciary duty. Furthermore, Municipal Advisor's municipal advisory supervisory structure, leveraging our long-standing and comprehensive broker-dealer supervisory processes and practices, provides strong safeguards against individual representatives of Municipal Advisor potentially departing from their regulatory duties due to personal interests. The disclosures below describe, as applicable, any additional mitigations that may be relevant with respect to any specific conflict disclosed below.

- **I. Compensation-Based Conflicts.** The fees due under this Agreement will be based on the size of the Issue and the payment of such fees shall be contingent upon the delivery of the Issue. While this form of compensation is customary in the municipal securities market, this may present a conflict because it could create an incentive for Municipal Advisor to recommend unnecessary financings or financings that are disadvantageous to Client, or to advise Client to increase the size of the issue. This conflict of interest is mitigated by the general mitigations described above.
- II. Other Municipal Advisor or Underwriting Relationships. Municipal Advisor serves a wide variety of other clients that may from time to time have interests that could have a direct or indirect impact on the interests of Client. For example, Municipal Advisor serves as municipal advisor to other municipal advisory clients and, in such cases, owes a regulatory duty to such other clients just as it does to Client under this Agreement. These other clients may, from time to time and depending on the specific circumstances, have competing interests, such as accessing the new issue market with the most advantageous timing and with limited competition at the time of the offering. In acting in the interests of its various clients, Municipal Advisor could potentially face a conflict of interest arising from these competing client interests. In other cases, as a broker-dealer that engages in underwritings of new issuances of municipal securities by other municipal entities, the interests of Municipal Advisor to achieve a successful and profitable underwriting for its municipal entity underwriting clients could potentially constitute a conflict of interest if, as in the example above, the municipal entities that Municipal Advisor serves as underwriter or municipal advisor have competing interests in seeking to access the new issue market with the most advantageous timing and with limited competition at the time of the offering. None of these other engagements or relationships would impair Municipal Advisor's ability to fulfill its regulatory duties to Client.

III. Broker-Dealer and Investment Advisory Business. Municipal Advisor is a broker-dealer and investment advisory firm that engages in a broad range of securities-related activities to service its clients, in addition to serving as a municipal advisor or underwriter. Such securities-related activities, which may include but are not limited to the buying and selling of new issue and outstanding securities and investment advice in connection with such securities including securities of Client, may be undertaken on behalf of, or as counterparty to. Client, personnel of Client, and current or potential investors in the securities of Client. These other clients may, from time to time and depending on the specific circumstances, have interests in conflict with those of Client, such as when their buying or selling of Client's securities may have an adverse effect on the market for Client's securities, and the interests of such other clients could create the incentive for Municipal Advisor to make recommendations to Client that could result in more advantageous pricing for the other clients. Furthermore, any potential conflict arising from Municipal Advisor effecting or otherwise assisting such other clients in connection with such transactions is mitigated by means of such activities being engaged in on customary terms through units of the Municipal Advisor that operate independently from Municipal Advisor's municipal advisory business, thereby reducing the likelihood that the interests of such other clients would have an impact on the services provided by Municipal Advisor to Client under this Agreement.

IV. Secondary Market Transactions in Client's Securities. Municipal Advisor, in connection with its sales and trading activities, may take a principal position in securities, including securities of Client, and therefore Municipal Advisor could have interests in conflict with those of Client with respect to the value of Client's securities while held in inventory and the levels of mark-up or mark-down that may be available in connection with purchases and sales thereof. In particular, Municipal Advisor or its affiliates may submit orders for and acquire Client's securities issued in an Issue under the Agreement from members of the underwriting syndicate, either for its own account or for the accounts of its customers. This activity may result in a conflict of interest with Client in that it could create the incentive for Municipal Advisor to make recommendations to Client that could result in more advantageous pricing of Client's bond in the marketplace. Any such conflict is mitigated by means of such activities being engaged in on customary terms through units of the Municipal Advisor that operate independently from Municipal Advisor's municipal advisory business, thereby reducing the likelihood that such investment activities would have an impact on the services provided by Municipal Advisor to Client under this Agreement.

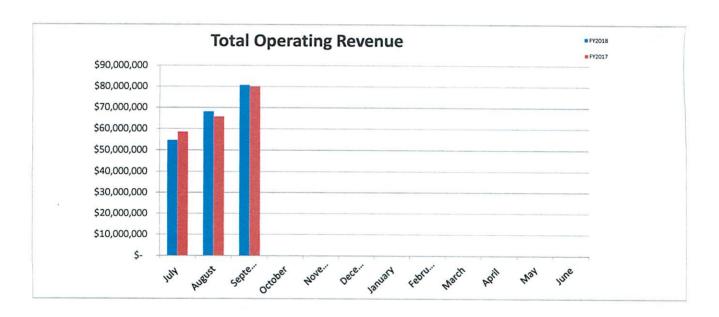

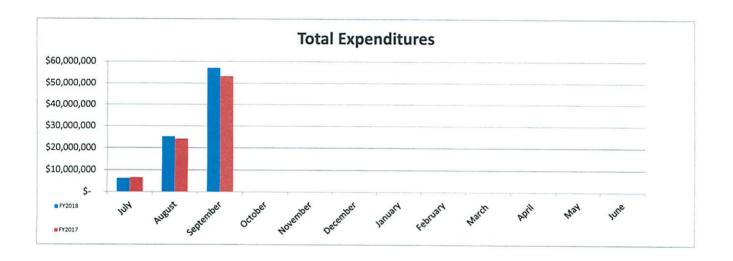
