Warren Hosts Snack & Field Event

Washington County schools come together for a fun-filled day at Warrior Stadium

On May 12th, all of Washington County's special education students came together for a fun-filled day of Snacks & Field events at Warren Local High School. The event consisted of students from the following schools in Washington County: Ewing, Marietta, Belpre, Waterford, Fort Frye, and Warren. In total, 150 students participated in Snack & Field, which was an increase of 30 students from last year's event that was held at Fort Frye High School.

The day kicked off when school buses drove up Warrior Drive to a crowd cheering and welcoming the participants. As students got off the bus, they walked through the tunnel of high-fives and cheered participants on as they entered Warrior Stadium. To open the event, the National Anthem was performed by Warren High School Acapella students. Anticipation grew as the opening ceremonies were officially underway. activity locations and were on a rotation schedule throughout the day. Students had the opportunity to have their face painted or create their own crazy hair for the day. One of the main attractions was the photo booth to commemorate the event to where student-participants were also able to personalize their own frame to place their event photo celebrating the event. Also located in the art section were sand art and bubbles.

In total, 75 adults and students represented Warren and Morgan High School as the main volunteers. Activities consisted of both competitive and relaxed activities designed to accommodate every student-participant and their individual needs.

Located on the soccer field, participants were able to hit a home run, have a soccer shootout, play corn hole, run through obstacle courses, enjoy the parachute, and have some fun with several water activities. Inside the track and football stadium, students tested their skills of running 100m dash, bowling, punt-pass-kick, obstacle course, parachute, and the adaptable bikes. During a lunch break, each student-participant received a FREE Kona Ice. After the break, students returned back to round 2 of activities.

Closing ceremonies consisted of each student-participant receiving an award and recognition of competing in Snack & Field. When schools departed for the day, each participant walked back through the tunnel of cheers and high-fives for a job well done.

At the annual Ohio FFA Convention, 35 students traveled to Columbus for an experience of speakers, awards, and expo center. During the convention, we watched State Proficiency Finalist, Launa Ireland, in the Equine Science - Entrepreneurship Category, earning a third place on stage. We were also recognized as a Gold Rated Chapter for our outstanding service within the community, chapter, and leadership. We are among the top 10% FFA Chapters in the State of Ohio! During the evening session, the chapter cheered on member, Haley Grace Bolden, for her proficiency in Outdoor Recreation where she placed second in the state. Tessa Haffner placed second in the area of Organic Agriculture, she also was named the State Champion in the area of Speciality Crop Production. The next day, the chapter had three chapter officers receive gold ratings at the State Level

and walk across the stage. Congratulations to members: Launa Ireland and Trent Hamrick — Reporter, Christopher Burdiss — Treasurer, and Sophie Gilliland — Secretary.

Warren had 7 State FFA Degree recipients (pictured below) walk across the stage as a result of their hard work. The State Degree requires 25 hours of community service, \$2,500 earned and invested in a Supervised Agricultural Experience, and eight FFA activities above the chapter level. Our chapter competed in many Career Development Events (CDE) over the spring. We started the season with Equine judging; a team of four members evaluated classes of equine and hay. They placed 18th in the State! Four more members competed in the State Dairy Judging Contest, where they evaluated dairy cattle and pedigrees; the team placed 46 in the state! Our school competed in the State Floriculture contest for the first time ever. Throughout the contest, team members had to place classes of flowers, identify flowers, and complete fertilization calculations. The team placed 24 in the State!

Nurse Notes

2023-2024 School Year

Immunizations needed for senior year: Documentation of a meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine given on or after the student's 16th birthday must be on file at Warren High School before your child can enter the 12th grade in August of 2023. This also includes students who attend the Washington County Career Center and those who take college courses.

All 7th grade students must have an updated tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (Tdap) vaccine and a meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine before the first day of school in August.

All kindergarten students must have documentation of the following vaccines:

<u>DTap/DT</u> - 5 doses (Dose 5 only required if 4th dose was given prior to the 4th birthday)

Polio - 4 doses (Dose 4 only required if 3rd dose was given prior to the 4th birthday)

Hepatitis B - 3 doses (the final dose must be given after age 6 months) **MMR** - 2 doses

Varicella - 2 doses (or documentation of having the disease)

If your student needs to take prescription medication during school hours or have an emergency medication available, please have your child's healthcare provider complete a medication form over the summer. The form is available on Final Forms or by emailing your school nurse at melissa.kemper@warrenlocal.org.

Dental Sealants

In early spring, staff from the Washington County Health Department offered free dental sealants for 2nd and 6th grade students at Warren Local. The hygienist also rechecked sealants of 3rd and 7th grade students that were placed last school year. A sealant is a plastic coating that keeps



food and germs out of the chewing

surfaces of the back teeth and protects them from cavities. Sealants are

safe; they work and are easy to apply.

There are no drills or needles involved! This will save money on future dental

Thank you all for a great year. It was a challenging year as we learned the ropes of Transportation Director and Assistant. We are looking forward to making improvements throughout the summer and into the new school year.

Please be sure your child's address and busing needs are current in Final Forms. Call the bus garage as soon as possible if you need to change your child's busing information for the 2023-2024 school year; 740-678-2368.

We will have a few open routes in the upcoming school year. If you or anyone you know is interested in becoming a sub bus driver for Warren, please contact me at the bus garage.

We have a local class coming up July 17-20 that would allow you to be ready to drive by the new school year. The pay rate for starting sub drivers is \$16.50/hour with a two-hour minimum. If the driver is retired from SERS, the sub pay rate is \$18.25/hour. Full time route drivers start at \$19.92/hour. Being a sub driver is convenient for individuals that have other part time jobs or just need something to keep them busy. The hours of work typically run from 5:30am-9am and 2pm-5pm, leaving extra time during the day to work on other jobs or projects. Have a wonderful summer break!

Robotics field trip to OU

April 18 - The high school Robotics class and volunteer students from physics and the technology club traveled to Athens to visit Ohio University's Russ College of Engineering. We met with Dr. Pagán, who showed us around his robotics lab and introduced us to a number of undergrad and graduate students who demonstrated their current research projects using robotic assistance. They walked us through the industrial needs, the prototyping process and the fabrication of parts, they then explained their goals and their designs for its final form.

Each step was interesting from the perspective of how engineers approach their work and how robots were a part of the process.

One project we viewed used AR-Augmented Reality, which is using Virtual Reality (VR) technology to program and operate a connected robot.... very cool.

We toured the lab and were able to operate small industrial SCARA and Articulated Arm robots. We set off many alarms of impending doom. So naturally, our first lesson was how to silence the alarms and reset the robot. Exciting learning experiences.

We then went to the Ohio University Student Expo which featured current research and projects from all the colleges on campus. One student called it, "Next level stuff!" There were hundreds of topics from Microplastics in Crawfish, to marketing techniques on how to make products appear more valuable to customers. The biotech papers featured unpronounceable names and mystifying purposes. All in all, it was a mind blowing day



STEM - Stitches

Mrs. Vincent's new elective class, "Stitches," has been very busy! They have learned how to repair jeans, set a seam, and sew on a button. They are learning how to hand sew, machine sew, and use a rotary cutter. They were very excited about a recent field trip they took that provided them with hands-on learning experience. It also gave us the opportunity to incorporate STEM education into our curriculum.

Our first stop was Kreinik Manufacturing where they saw first-hand how thread is made using modern machinery. This was a great opportunity for our students to learn about the technology and engineering behind thread manufacturing, as well as gain insight into the importance of quality control in the production process. Kreinik has supplied materials for costumes in Hocus Pocus, Game of Thrones, and even Buckingham Palace...very cool for a local company!

After our visit to Kreinik, we had the opportunity to learn from a quilting expert at Bolts and Quarters Quilt Shop. Students gained insight into the techniques and methods used to create beautiful quilts. They had the opportunity to explore different types of fabrics and learn about how to select the right colors for their own projects. Mr. McCoy, the owner, donated fabric and taught each student how to create a block that they will make into a quilt to donate to our Academic Boosters for the fall craft show raffle.

Quilting involves measuring and cutting fabric into specific shapes and sizes. This requires an understanding of geometric concepts such as area, perimeter, angles and symmetry. In addition, quilting often involves creating patterns using different shapes and colors of fabric. This requires an understanding of mathematical concepts such as fractions, ratios, and proportions. Quilting helps students develop spatial reasoning skills, improve their ability to visualize and manipulate objects in their minds, and strengthen their problem solving and critical thinking abilities.

They learned about so many careers involved in this creative area ranging into so many different fields; small business, machinist, sales, sewing machine maintenance and repair, fabric and thread production, advertising, long arm quilting and so much more! It was a wonderful trip, and we can't thank Kreinik or Bolts & Quarters enough for this opportunity!


