Recordkeeping:

- 1. Gather information on progress reports.
- Interpret transcripts and evaluate transfer students.
- 3. Prepare transcripts.
- 4. Check credits, grade point averages, class ranks.
- 5. Keep record of class size to balance class loads.

Testing:

- Administer the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (P.S.A.T.) to interested college-bound juniors.
- Provide information and dates of registration for college entrance testing— Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), American College Testing (ACT).
- Provide information and test date for Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (A.S.V.A.B.).

Personal Counseling:

- Counsel with students in evaluating personal assets and limitations.
- Counsel with students concerning personal decisions.
- 3. Provide information for use of community referral sources.
- 4. Provide the students an opportunity to talk through their problems.
- Encourage individual problem solving by discussing alternatives.
- Counsel students concerning learning difficulties.

Scheduling and Registration:

- Assist students in selecting high school courses to fit needs.
- 2. Work with students during registration to help each student get the best possible schedule.
- Correct errors in registration by helping students make appropriate class changes when necessary.
- 4. Schedule new students in classes.

Parents and Teachers:

- Keep communications open with parents.

SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES RELATED TO INTIMIDATION AND/OR HARASSMENT:

Elma High School is a place of learning for all students. Staff has the responsibility to facilitate learning and students have the responsibility to be the very best learners they can be without impeding the needs or rights of others.

Intimidation, harassment, slurs, and profanity or other inappropriate acts will not be tolerated. In order for all of us to receive maximum benefit from our educational opportunities, we must all feel welcome and safe. Due to our own unique background and experiences in life, we may not always realize when we are offending another person. However, we are each responsible for our own behaviors. The quality of life at Elma High School is the responsibility of all of us. Therefore, if you feel you have been intimidated or harassed, please follow these steps:

- Let the person offending you know that the behavior is unwanted. Try to do this in a mature, calm, and respectful manner that explains how you feel. Remember, you may be a victim even if the act is not directed at you.
- 2. Notify a staff member. If you feel the offense is serious, notify an administrator.

Consequences for Acts of Intimidation and/or Harassment

- A formal complaint will be completed and filed in the student's permanent discipline file. Parent(s)/ guardian(s) will be notified.
- Depending on the results from the investigation, the student will be disciplined accordingly. Discipline may include suspension.

MAKE-UP OF FAILED CLASSES

In the four years a student is enrolled at Elma High School he/she has the opportunity to earn 24 credits, 24 of which are required for graduation. However, if a student fails a class that is a graduation requirement he/she must make this class up to be eligible to graduate. There are options a student can pursue to make up a required class. These options are:

- 1. Retake the class the following semester/year
- 2. Attend Summer School if offered.
- Students can use an online program to recover credits. There is a fee that the student is responsible for. See the Counseling Center for specific details.

WITHDRAWAL - TRANSFER

If a student finds it necessary to withdraw or transfer from school at any time during the year, the following procedure should be observed:

- 1. The student withdrawing must have permission from his/her parents or guardians.
- 2. Obtain a withdrawal form in the Counseling Office.
- Have each teacher, the Librarian, and Main Office check the student out indicating any fine's) and/or other obligations the student needs to satisfy.
- 4. Pay fees/fines in the Fiscal Office and return completed form to the Counseling Office.
- 5. Credits and/or transcripts will be held until such clearance is completed.

Certificate of Academic Recognition

The Certificate of Academic Recognition will be awarded to graduates of Elma High School that have a minimum accumulative grade point average of 3.0 and have successfully completed each of the following required classes with a minimum grade of 2.0.

Mathematics:

2 years selected from, Algebra 2, Pre-calculus or Calculus (or running start equiv)

Science:

1 year selected from Chemistry, Engineering Physics, Adv. Biology or Engineering Robotics (or running start equiv)

Foreign Language:

2 years selected from Spanish or other appropriate Foreign Language (or running start equiv)

English:

4 years of Composition and Literature (British Comp. & Lit. or Adv. Placement English) or 1 year of Speech taken in either Grade 11 or 12 (or running start equiv)

The total minimum requirement would be 6 credits plus additional course work selected from Advanced Math, Science, Foreign Language, or Composition and Literature to make a total of 7 credits. (05-02) (02-14) (02-16) (02-17)

General Information

REGISTRATION

It is our philosophy that students are responsible for selecting courses that will meet their educational and career goals. To accommodate this belief, we allow students to pick the classes they would like to take the following year.

During the second semester, students will receive forms that outline the classes they are eligible to sign up for. In addition, students will receive information from their counselor regarding graduation requirements, specific classes that must be signed up for and other pertinent information. Students will then have the opportunity, with input from parents and staff, to request classes with alternatives in case a class they want is full. Students will then be given a time frame to turn in their registration sheets to their counselor. They are responsible to ensure that the registration deadline is met. Failure to complete the registration sheet before the deadline may jeopardize ones chances of registering with the rest of the students and getting the classes one wants.

CORE SCHEDULE

Elma High School has a Core period. All students, including upcoming Freshmen, will be assigned a Core teacher. Core changes will be made on a teacher recommended basis throughout the year to assist students to improve their subject grades.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

With careful planning and forethought, prior to registration, students have the opportunity to build a schedule that will meet their goals. All students should develop a tentative plan of course work for the entire year that meets parent approval.

After the semester starts, each student has five (5) days in which to request a class change on elective classes. Class changes will not be honored after that time unless the student is misplaced according to ability or placed in an incorrect sequential class. As a general rule, no requirement will ever be dropped. Administrative approval is necessary for all changes and a form is required that a parent or guardian must sign. A class dropped after 15 days will carry an "F" on the permanent transcript.

Requests will **NOT** be granted for students wishing to take a different teacher, have classes with friends, do not like the classes they signed up for, or other invalid requests, etc. <u>In addition, multiple requests for changes will not be honored.</u>

GUIDELINES FOR SCHEDULE CHANGES

- 1. Not scheduled into a required class
- 2. Class needed for graduation
- 3. Student signed up for duplicate class
- 4. Running Start schedule change
- 5. Lack the required prerequisite for a class
- 6. Incomplete schedule
- 7. Teacher request
- 8. Counselor discretion

Withdrawal from individual classes will have no grade penalty until the 15th day after the start of each semester. Any withdrawal after the 15th day will result in an "F" withdrawal grade unless other arrangements have been made with the appropriate counselor and administrator. This also applies to Running Start students who withdraw from a college class.

English, Math, and Science Credits

Intro to Literature and Composition

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year Available for Grade: 9 and makeup Graduation Requirement: English

Description: Reviews basic grammar, including usage and mechanics as part of composition. The course will introduce freshmen to different forms of literature including: short story, poetry, biography, non-fiction drama, and novel. Students will also be introduced to different organizational formats, elements of good written and spoken delivery, library research skills and use basic word processing skills.



Geometry

Credit Value: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9th & 10th

Graduation Requirement for: Mathematics



Description: Geometry is an algebra oriented subject dealing with points, lines, planes, circles, angles, polygons, and polyhedrons. Basic forms of reasoning (inductive and deductive) and logic, coordinate Geometry and figure transformations will be studied during the year with emphasis on

how Geometry is used in the every day world.

Algebra I

Credit Value: 1.00 Duration: One year

Available for Grades: 9th

Graduation Requirement for: Mathematics

Description: Discovery and development of algebraic concepts that include various types of expressions, equations, inequalities, functions and systems of equations. Concepts are extended to both theory and application.

Biology

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9th

Graduation Requirements for: Biology

Description: This introduction to Biology uses inquiry to gain a scientific understanding of living systems, and then applies that knowledge to solve human problems. Students will use writing, reading, and mathematics to explore the characteristics, organization, and relationships of living organisms. Learn about the diversity of life by discovering the role of energy, cells, genetics, ecology, and technology!



Environmental Biology

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9th

Graduation Requirements for: Biology

Description: Meets the biology requirement for freshmen by exploring life science from an environmental approach. Students explore biology through ecosystems, populations, photosynthesis, genetics, and much more. Students also have the opportunity to be in FFA.

Core Credits

PE, Health, & Careers Credits

Beginning Body Conditioning

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year Available for Grades: 9, 10, 11 and 12 Graduation Requirement: Physical Educ.



Description: For students who want to improve both their strength and aerobic conditioning. JV and Varsity athletes are encouraged to take this class. All self-motivated, hard-working students who aren't afraid of a

good workout or perspiration are welcomed. The hardest working students will be considered for advanced weights. The grade is based on daily participation and strength and agility tests.

P.E.

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9

Graduation Requirement: Physical Educ.

Description: An experience in all the phases of the Physical Education sequence. The following areas will be covered: aerobic conditioning, weight training, and individual and team activities. Students must furnish P.E. shorts or sweats, a T-shirt, tennis shoes and a lock for their P.E. locker. Jean shorts are not to be worn during class. Daily participation and dressing out are essential to successful completion.

Low Impact Cardio/Wgt. Train

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9

Graduation Requirement: Physical Educ.

Description: Do you want to improve your cardiovascular conditioning and your overall body strength? This will be developed for each student by the instructor with low to medium impact exercises. No Olympic or powerlifting techniques will be taught. Activities will include walking, power walking, jogging, fitness circuits, weight training and other activities. This course is not eligible to be considered for advanced weights. Daily participation is required.

Sports & Nutrition

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9

Graduation Requirement: Physical Educ.

Description: Engage in physical activity that will focus on strength training, conditioning, and flexibility. Balance this with understanding muscle dynamics and the role nutrition plays with your overall health and wellness.



Health

Credit: 0.50

Duration: One Semester **Available for Grades:** 9th **Graduation Requirement For:** Health component of Physical Education

Description: This is a comprehensive health course. The main content areas covered include: mental health, nutrition, fitness, drug prevention, and sexuality education. This class is designed to give students information to help them make healthy decision which are practiced through self-esteem and communication skills. **Note:** This class rotates with Career

Exploration.

Career Exploration

Credit: 0.50

Duration: One Semester **Available for Grades:** 9th

Graduation Requirement: CTE or

PPR

Description: It's time to plan for your future! Do you know what you want to do? This class is designed to get you thinking about your goals, your future, and how do you get there! Wow! This class will also answer that question you have been pondering—why do I need an education? The world is changing, are you ready? Credit: 1.00
Duration: One year

Available for Grades: 9-12

Graduation Requirement For: CTE, PPR, Elect.

Description: Metal fabrication techniques skills covered during 1st semester are arc welding, wire feed welding, plasma arc cutting, oxy-acetylene cutting and welding, and sheet metal fabrication. The next semester covers small engines, Stihl Bronze level training, advanced sheet














Arts Credit & World Language

Credit: 1.00 Duration: One Year

Available for Grades: 9, 10, 11 and 12

Prerequisite: None

Graduation Requirements For: Arts, PPR or Elect

Description: Students will be taught the basics of music: breathing, posture, sound production, enunciation, reading of music, and showmanship. There will be at least one performance each semester in which the student is required to participate. Dress code for all performances: Boys—nice dress shirt and pants (no blue jeans) and shoes without holes. Girls—dresses or skirts.

Band

Credit: 1.00 *Duration:* One Year *Available for Grades:* 9, 10, 11 and 12



Graduation Pathway Options

The State Board of Education (SBE) sets state graduation requirements. In 2019, new legislation (House Bill 1599) removed the testing requirement and replaced it with a set of pathway options. Beginning with the Class of 2020, students must meet at least one of these pathway options to graduate.



Graduation Pathway Options - Class of 2020 Forward:

- Meet or exceed the graduation scores in the Washington State Assessments in English language arts (English) and mathematics.
- Earn at least one high school credit in English and one credit in math through a Running Start,
 College in the High School, or Career and Technical Education Dual Credit course. Students do not have to pay fees or claim college credit to meet this pathway, they must be able to earn college credit at the level 100 or higher by meeting local district program requirements.
- For both English and math, earn a 3 or higher on certain Advanced Placement exams or a 4 or higher
 on certain International Baccalaureate exams or an E on certain Cambridge International exams, or
 pass the course with at least a C+.
- Meet or exceed the graduation scores set by SBE in the math and English portions of the SAT or ACT.
- Pass a transition course in English and math (for example, a <u>Bridge to College</u> course, which is a senior course for students who earned a Level 2 on the SBA) which allows a student to place directly into a college level course for credit. This pathway includes transition courses identified through local agreements between colleges and school districts.
- Meet any combination of at least one English and one math option of those options listed previously.
- Meet standard on the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) by meeting the lowest score established by the military for eligibility to serve in the armed forces.
- Complete a sequence of Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses: two or more high school
 credits of CTE courses in a progression tailored to the student's goals and relevant to the
 postsecondary pathway(s) outlined in the student's High School and Beyond Plan. The sequence may
 be two courses within the same CTE program area. Sequences made up of courses within more than
 one CTE program area require local approval and expedited approval through OSPI.

Graduation Pathway Options Discussion

Graduation Requirement Changes

Here are more changes that were made to graduation requirements after last Legislative session:

- There is no link between the state assessment and graduation. Instead, students have a set of
 graduation pathway options to chose from that best aligns with their post-high school goals.
- The Class of 2020 can still apply for an "expedited appeal" to graduate if they have met all
 requirements except the assessment requirement.
- High School students get high school credit for taking a high school course in middle school. Parents
 can opt-out of this if they choose. Middle school grades will carry over to high school if students opt
 to receive credit. Unless the student and student's parent/guardian request the course be
 transcribed with a nonnumerical grade, such as "pass."
- When students' personal circumstances warrant it, they can receive a credit waiver for non-core
 classes. To achieve this, the law now refers to "student circumstances," instead of "unusual
 circumstances," so more students can stay on track to earning a diploma.
- A Mastery-Based Education Work Group is created to recommend a framework for a mastery-based diploma pathway, and more options to earn credit.

A High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP) must inform course-taking and be aligned with the student's goals for education or training and career after high school.

- For students with an IEP (Individualized Education Program), the HSBP must be updated to align with their "school to post-school transition plan" and must be updated the same way with the same school staff as all other students.
- Students must be informed of eligibility for automatic enrollment in advanced classes.
- Information on <u>FAFSA</u> and <u>WAFSA</u>, including the list of what is needed to complete the financial aid
 applications and opportunities to help families fill out the applications must also be given to
 students.
