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Team Beta Connects Students and Robotics at Nonnewaug High School and Beyond

Whether it's the love of coding, computer programming, mechanical engineering, or being around new friends, the enthusiasm of students in Nonnewaug High School's robotics Team Beta is electrifying.

Its small numbers didn't hinder its success as a formidable competitor in the team robotics competition season this year. Team Beta went 10 and 13 in the robotics events and their performance in two qualifying competitions landed them in the state competition. They made it to the semi-finals with their small robot – 19462 that was built and programmed to gather and stack small cones on a pole.

Team Beta is different for each of the members -- a way to explore an interest, an introduction to engineering and coding, a hands-on experience in building technical systems learning about engineering, a place to make friends and for some students, the club's draw is strong. "It's a great introductory experience into a career in robotics," said senior Jacob Wells. "There are also many opportunities for scholarships through being in this club." Wells received an \$8,000 scholarship over four years from First Robotics to use at Embry Riddle Aeronautical University where he will study aeronautical engineering.

The advisors are Nonnewaug science teacher Bill Pease and teacher Mark Strumolo. Team Beta meets afterschool for building, brainstorming, strategizing, mentoring, a lot of trial and error, and fundraising. The club is self- funding for everything from robotic parts to members competition costs and they take advantage of every fundraising activity from ION Bank's Community Rewards Program to hosting local bake sales. They raised \$2,000 this year.

Pease said he is proud of the team's perseverance. "The team and their robot showed marked improvement and increased performance at every competition this year," he said. "They remained competitive all year long." Pease and the underclass members are looking toward next year with a renewed hope of continuing to add new members and bring the Team into the forefront of state robotics.

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Nonnewaug High School Envirothon Heads to International Competition in Canada

For the first time in the team's history, the Nonnewaug High School Envirothon has won the state competition and will travel to Canada to compete in the National Conservation Foundation's Envirothon, an international environmental and natural resources education competition for high school students.

The five-person Nonnewaug team and advisor, Agriscience teacher Audra Leach will spend a week in New Brunswick, Canada competing against teams from every state as well as Canada and China using this year's current issue "Adpating to a Changing Climate." During the week-long competition in July, student teams will demonstrate their knowledge on soils and land use, aquatic ecology, forestry, and wildlife management through lectures, practical experiments, written tests, and interactive stations. They will spend one full day preparing an oral presentation on this year's current issue. The students will be meeting up until the competition and will meet with industry professionals in June and July to prepare them for the contest.

Envirothon at Nonnewaug challenges students to develop critical thinking skills and come up with inventive solutions to local and global environmental and



natural resources issues facing the world today. Students get hands-on outdoor field experiences and areas that include aquatic ecology, forestry, soils and land use, wildlife, and current environmental issues. EdAdvance Grant Funds Added Behavioral Health Staff in Region 14 Schools

Region 14 School District is participating in a grant through EdAdvance that will offer staff, students, and families a range of emotional, behavioral, and mental health services and support over the next five years. As part of this grant, EdAdvance will provide two school-based mental health professionals.

Dionna Reynolds will be in each elementary school building one day per week and at Woodbury Middle School three days per week. She will be involved in providing a range of services intended to support students' wellbeing and success in the classroom. Dionna will work with staff on professional development opportunities on Social Emotional Learning strategies and classroom interventions that support learning. Gail DeFrancesco will be at Nonnewaug High School five days per week involved in providing a range of services intended to support students' wellbeing and success in the classroom. Gail will work with staff on professional development opportunities on Social Emotional Learning strategies and classroom interventions that support learning. They will also both work with students on organizational and decision-making skills, developing strong social relationships, and providing small group academic support when appropriate.
