The Town Clerk's Office has transitioned to a new land record system. The land record index is still available on the Town Clerk page of the website, so you can continue to check activity, but you can now sign up for Fraud Alert, which will notify you by email when a document has been recorded on the land records in your name. You may sign up on the Town Clerk page on the town website.



Fishing licenses are issued on a calendar year basis and expire Dec. 31. New licenses can be purchased at the Town Clerk's Office or online at https://portal.ct.gov/CTOutdoorLicenses. Fishing licenses are not required for anyone under 16 years of age. There is a 50 percent discount for Connecticut residents aged 16 or 17, and licenses are free for Connecticut residents 65 and older, free for CT residents 65 years or older, although there is a charge for trout and salmon stamps. Fishing season is now year-round, with some exceptions.

A Trout and Salmon Stamp is required for all people 16 or older when they keep any trout or salmon, fish in a designated trout management area, trout park, wild trout management area class 1, 2 or 3, or an Atlantic salmon management area.

Reciprocity agreements with Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New York allows anglers with a valid Marine Waters Fishing License to fish in Connecticut. Any Connecticut resident with a valid Connecticut Marine Waters Fishing License may fish in the marine district of those states.



#### **Annual Town Meeting**

The Annual Town Meeting to vote on the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget will take place on April 25th at 7 p.m. at Rockville High School auditorium, Loveland Hill Road.



#### **Dog Licenses**

June is dog licensing month in Connecticut. Licenses purchased in June are in effect between July 1 and June 30, 2024. Valid rabies certificates effective July 1st or later are required, along with a spayed or neutered certificate. Licenses remain \$8 for a spayed or neutered dog and \$19 for an unaltered dog. There is a \$1 per month late fee after June 30th.

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## **Capital Projects Continue Forward Momentum**

he Town of Vernon continues to move forward on a variety of capital projects designed to benefit residents by preserving historic structures, streamlining municipal government and enhancing recreational opportunities for people of all ages.

#### Windermere Youth Athletic Fields

Work continues on the athletic field complex under construction off Windermere Avenue. Grass is growing on three fields; irrigation systems are installed in one field and out to bid for fields 2 and 3. Constructing of a fourth field is planned.

The town is also seeking proposals for construction of a building to house a concession stand and restrooms, and for a septic system. Construction of driveways and parking areas will begin when field construction is complete. Sidewalks and guide rail have been installed and barriers to ensures neighbors' privacy are in the works.

Vernon residents approved purchasing the 42-acre site in 2019 and would has been progressing ever since. The fields will primarily service Vernon's youth soccer program, which has exploded in popularity.

#### **Miracle League Field**

There has been incredible progress on the Miracle League Field of Northern Connecticut, which will be built at Northeast School. Ground is expected to be broken when school ends this spring and the field should be completed in about 11 weeks, making it available for soccer in the fall.

Children of all abilities will be able to play baseball, soccer and lacrosse and other sports on the field. It will also be available to Northeast School students, the Vernon Public Schools Unified Sports program and adaptive physical education classes throughout the district.



As one of only three Miracle League Fields in Connecticut, it will draw people to Vernon who will not only enjoy the field, but patronize local businesses.

#### **Citizens Block**

The renovation and restoration of the Citizens Block building on Park Place is progressing. Crews worked through the winter on the building's masonry exterior and built an elevator shaft and rear entrance. The vault for the Probate Court has also been installed.

Crews have also been framing and construction the building's interior. The building, constructed in 1879, once contained retail, offices and apartments.

Redevelopment of the building is based on Mayor Dan Champagne's vision to transfer several town departments to the building, thereby making access to town government more convenient for residents. Most town departments will be on Park Place.

Under the Mayor's vision, the Probate Court will move from Town Hall to Citizens Block and the Town Clerk's office will be able to gain much-needed space in the former probate court office. A community room for organizations to use is also planned for the building.

#### **Rockville Public Library Steps**

A consultant is evaluating the granite steps, landing pad and adjoining patio and walls at the Rockville Public Library, a historic structure built in 1904.

Weather, use and other factors have made the steps unusable. The consultant is working to determine what it will take to properly restore the steps to their former grandeur and so that patrons can use them to reach the library's front door.

The Town of Vernon has only owned the library since 2018.

#### **Fox Hill Tower**

The town has gone to bid for consultants to develop plans and budget estimates to restore Fox Hill Memorial Tower, make it Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant, and then to oversee the work. The Town received a \$2.5 million allocation from the State Bond Commission to go toward restoration work.

The landmark tower in Henry Park provides breathtaking views of the Connecticut River Valley.

It was built in 1937 during the Great Depression as a Works Progress Administration project to put people back to work, and as a memorial to Vernon's war veterans. The tower is an iconic symbol of Vernon and is on the official town seal.

### Heating Assistance, Rent Rebates, Shelter and Food VERNON SOCIAL SERVICES

There are a number of local, state and federal programs available for Vernon residents in need:

#### **Heating Assistance**

#### Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP)

This federally funded program helps low to moderate income residents with heating costs during the winter months. This includes deliverable fuel - oil, propane, kerosene and pellets - as well as gas and electric heat. Residents with heat included in their rent are also able to apply. The program goes through May 31. To set up an appointment, call Social Services at 860-870-3661.

#### **Operation Fuel**

In addition to CEAP, residents may qualify for assistance through Operation Fuel. For more information, including how to apply, visit their website: <u>operationfuel.org</u>

#### Tri Town Fuel Bank

The Tri Town Fuel Bank is a collaborative program between Vernon, Ellington and Tolland. Individuals and families who reside in the three towns can apply for heating assistance – deliverable fuel and electric utility - after first having applied for and exhausted benefits from CEAP and Operation Fuel. Applicants must meet the CEAP income guidelines; each request is reviewed on a case-by-case basis. The Maximum assistance is \$750 and is limited to one assist per household in a 12-month period.

#### **Renters' Rebate**

This state reimbursement program is available for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apart-

#### **CEMETERY DEPARTMENT**

The Town of Vernon Cemetery Department is asking families to remove all holiday and winter decorations by April 1. This includes all statues, garden shop figurines, shepherd hook plant holders, etc.

Decorations not removed will be discarded. All artificial flowers must be secured in a pot or suitable non-glass container. No candles or LED garden lights are permitted in cemeteries.

Borders around monuments must be preapproved by the superintendent. For a complete listing of Vernon Cemetery Commission rules and regulations, visit the Town of Vernon website at vernon-ct.gov and click on "Departments."

Lots for cremation or full burials are available for purchase. Contact the cemetery office at 860-875-3158 for details or to make an appointment.

ment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home, may be eligible. Renters' rebates can be up to \$900 for married couples and \$700 for single persons. The renters' rebate amount is based on income and the amount of rent and utility payments made in the prior year. The program begins April 1 and runs through September. Call Social Services for information.

#### Shelter

Persons who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless should call 211 to reach a specialist trained to assess housing needs. Anyone seeking shelter in Connecticut must connect directly with 211. While Vernon is fortunate to have a shelter in town – Cornerstone – all requests must first start with 211. This is also a one-stop connection to other services and assistance.

#### Food

Hockanum Valley Community Council and Cornerstone both offer food pantries. Additionally, Cornerstone has dropin hot meals seven days a week. And the Connecticut Foodshare Mobile Pantry comes to Vernon twice a week, every other week. Call Social Services for more details.



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## **Important Fire Prevention Tips to Follow**

The weather is warming, so it's time for spring cleaning. This year, don't forget to add some fire safety. By following these simple tips, you can help reduce the risk of a fire happening in your home.

One of the most important things you can do to prevent a fire is to keep your home clean. Dust and dirt can quickly build up and become combustible. Make sure to dust all surfaces, especially those that tend to collect dust, like bookshelves and window sills. Don't forget to vacuum regularly too!

The Vernon Office of the Fire Marshal has compiled a quick list of additional fire prevention and safety measures to include in your cleaning routine this year.

## Indoor spring cleaning fire safety tips

#### Clear any clutter from your home, especially hallways and stairways.

Did you know that clutter provides fuel for a fire to spread? Make sure that all of your exits are clear and have a clear path to them. If you have any items blocking an exit, move them immediately. This ensures your family will have good escape routes should you need to evacuate due to fire.

## Check smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.

Test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they are working properly. Now is an excellent time to install them if you don't have any. Replace your carbon monoxide and smoke detector batteries and look for any corrosion on the batteries or their connection points in the device. Replace the entire device if you notice any corrosion inside the battery compartment. Otherwise, install fresh batteries in your carbon monoxide and smoke detectors.

Don't use electrical appliances or tools with frayed cords.

If you have any electrical appliances or tools with frayed electrical cords, replace them as soon as possible. Using damaged electrical cords could start a fire. This is also an excellent time to check your extension cords. Too many devices plugged into an outlet can overload it and cause a fire.

## Check for water around electrical appliances.

Water around electrical appliances, such as your washing machine, dryer, or dishwasher, can be a sign of trouble. If you notice any water, have a professional inspect your appliance to make sure it is safe to use.

#### Check appliances to make sure they are in good working condition.

This includes your stove, oven, microwave, toaster, coffee maker, and anything else you use daily. If you notice any issues with an appliance, have it repaired or replaced as soon as possible.

#### It's a great time to clean your clothes dryer vent and lint trap.

Regularly clean your clothes dryer lint trap. Lint is highly combustible and can easily cause a fire if it isn't removed. Clean your dryer vent and hoses at least once a year to remove and prevent excess lint buildup or blockages.

#### Outdoor Spring-Cleaning Fire Safety Tips

## Trim trees and bushes that are too close to your home.

Trimming bushes and trees creates a "defensible space" between your home and potential fire sources. Additionally, if you have dead or dying trees, now is an excellent time to remove them. Dead vegetation can easily catch fire.

## Check gas grills for rust, worn parts, grease, and other debris.

Grilling is a popular spring and summer activity, but it's essential to ensure your grill is clean and in safe operating order before firing it up for the first burger of the season. Remove any rust, grease, or debris built up over the winter. Inspect all parts to make sure they are in good working condition. If you notice any worn parts, have them replaced. It's a great time to check your grill's propane tank for gas leaks.

#### Move the grill at least 10 feet away from the house before use.

It's essential to keep your gas grill at least 10 feet away from your home when in use. This will help prevent any accidental fires. Additionally, make sure that the area around the grill is clear of any debris or flammable materials.

## Make sure your home's address is visible from the street.

If your home's address is not visible from the street, it will be difficult for emergency responders to find your home in the event of a fire or other emergency. Make sure that your house number is visible and easy to read from the street. If you need to, repaint or replace your address sign.

## Macary Honored as Outstanding Superintendent of the Year by UConn's Neag School of Education

Vernon Superintendent of Schools Dr. Joseph P. Macary has been honored by the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut as Outstanding Superintendent of the Year.

He is one of several Neag alumni honored as part of the schools 25th annual Alumni Awards program and was formally recognized in March.

Dr. Macary, who earned his undergraduate degree at UConn and doctorate from Neag, has served as Vernon's superintendent since 2015. Before arriving in Vernon, he was superintendent in Wolcott, and before that Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction and Director of Special Education and Alternate Programs. He began his education career in Waterbury as a teacher.

During his tenure in Vernon, Dr. Macary has set high expectations across the board and established a vision for every Vernon Public Schools graduate to be a critical thinker, collaborator, communicator, resilient individual and responsible citizen.

He also expects students to make progress every year and for those who are struggling to receive the services they need to help them achieve.

"Everybody says to me, what do we want? I want every child to grow academically, socially and emotionally over a year," Dr. Macary said. "I want them to grow based on their abilities. We want to keep showing student growth."

That is achieved in a system with high standards and high quality, he said.

"I personalize this," Dr. Macary said.

"What would I want for my child if they had this teacher, this administrator, this paraprofessional? I have high expectations for myself, for my staff, for my students, for my parents. There are definitely high expectations for learning."

Board of Education

Chairwoman Anne Fischer said board members believe Vernon is lucky to have Dr. Macary as superintendent.

"Joe is an amazing superintendent who puts his heart and soul into his job, all for the benefit of each and every one of our students, staff and parents," Fischer said. "He is a tireless worker with boundless energy and he is incredibly adept at juggling the many different aspects and demands of his job."

Dr. Macary said he views his job as being an advocate for children, especially those who may struggle and need extra support. And as crucial as reading, writing and arithmetic are, there are other equally important components of a students' education.

"I'm a believer in the whole child approach to learning," he said. "That's academic, social and emotional."

The merits of that approach were driven home during the pandemic. Although Vernon did much better than many other districts, academic achievement still slipped. That's one of the reasons Dr. Macary advocated for getting students back to school.

"Kids need structure," he said. "They want to be with other people. That interaction is huge. That's the social component of it all. And then the emotional part is



people being together, aettina through adolescence together, getting through early childhood together. That developmental approach is critical. Then of course there's the academic. the reading, writing and arithmetic. I think that whole child approach

to learning is key and that's what we want to make sure we do for our students in Vernon."

Parents play an essential role in their child's education and need to be engaged.

"It's a partnership," Dr. Macary said. "You need three legs for a table to stand. You need the student, you need the teacher and you need the parent. If the parent is not there, a two-legged table does not stand. It falls. Parents are their children's first teachers. Children learn so much from their parents. We need them to be part of it."

Dr. Macary also wants parents to know he is committed to helping their children continually move forward and achieve.

As for Vernon, it's unique community that is similar to the state as a whole.

"We have urban, we have suburban, we have rural" Dr. Macary said. "We have schools next to farms. We have an urban center. When you bring it all together, you've got the classic American melting pot. That's what we are proud of."

## **Water Pollution Control Authority**

The Town of Vernon's upgrade to its Water Pollution Control Facility (WPCF) has been ongoing since 2019.

Some systems have been completed and are now in use, such as the ultraviolet (UV) light disinfection system. The WPCF is required by permit to disinfect effluent prior to discharging it into the Hockanum River. Previously, liquid chlorine was used for disinfection and a second chemical had to be used to offset chlorine's harmful effects.

The new UV system put in place in 2021 eliminates the need to use potentially hazardous chemicals for disinfection. When water passes through the ultraviolent light, it is disinfected without chemicals.

The result is a process that is safer for staff and environment, and more efficient.

or 18 years the Vernon Greenways Volunteers has been helping the Vernon Parks and Recreation Department maintain, clean and beautify more than 40 miles of trails in Vernon. These efforts have largely been led by President Don Bellingham, with the help of 130 volunteers. Various committees have formed to carry out our mission to provide an enjoyable experience for all. The work performed by these groups includes surface repair, trash,



tree and debris removal, spring cleaning and planting of gardens. Our Trail Blazing crew cleared a new trail running behind Starbucks and Tri-City Plaza, creating a southward extension of the path along the Hockanum River.

Recently the Vernon Greenways Volunteers merged with the Friends of the Hockanum River Linear Park and we are now a nonprofit officially known as the Vernon Greenways Volunteers, Inc.

Many trails form the Vernon trail system. These include the Rails-to-Trails, the Hockanum River Linear Park, Valley Falls Park, the Valley Falls Braille Trail, Risley Pond Loop and the Belding Wildlife Management area. All offer the beauty and tranquility of nature while enjoying activities such as biking, running, walking, hiking, snow shoeing, and cross country skiing. Other trails offer ponds, streams and picnic areas.

As you explore Vernon's trails you will certainly get a chance to see abundant wildlife. Signs in certain spots provide an educational component, explaining the historical and ecological significance of the area. A must see is a remarkable piece of art in the form of a mural found on the Rockville spur of the Rails to Trails near the I-84 underpass. For additional trail information, please



#### **DEVELOPEMENT SERVICES**

#### **PLANNING DEPARTMENT**

The Planning Department works closely with all land use commissions. It also works with the public to guide the permitting process, land use matters, and future development, while also performing long range planning and overseeing development projects in order to create a prosperous community.

The Planning Department has joined the Building Department in transferring all land use applications onto Permit Link, an online system. This will allow the permit process to run more smoothly while giving the public the opportunity to apply for permits from home.

The Planning Department recently expanded to create a planning specialist position, that works alongside the town planner.

#### **BUILDING DEPARTMENT**

The Building Department is responsible for reviewing applications for all building permits as well as inspecting the work performed per the Connecticut Building Code, while ensuring public health, safety and welfare.

The Building Department has been working with ScanOptics to transition all paper street files to an online database. The files will be viewable by the public on the town website.

The Building Department has three administrative assistants, a full time building official and part time building inspector. The department also has a property maintenance and zoning enforcement officer.

#### **ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT**

The Engineering Department works diligently to review and inspect all construction activities within public rights of way. It also reviews development proposals to determine compliance with Town standards.

The department recently updated several documents on its website relating to determining property lines and requirements for as-builts, a part of the building process in Vernon.

The department has been working to solicit proposals from firms specializing in historic preservation to rehabilitate Fox Hill Memorial Tower.

The Engineering Department has a full time engineer, and senior engineering technician/wetlands enforcement officers. The Department has a full time surveyor on staff too.

The Town of Vernon's land use departments – Planning, Building and Engineering – are now fully staffed through a recent reorganization of the departments, under the direction of Shaun Gately, Director of Development Services. Staff provides technical guidance and support to the residents and businesses of Vernon, reviews public and private development projects,

## Rockville High School Creative Writing Students Win Big in Annual Scholastic Writing Competition

he students in Rockville High School's Creative Writing Program continued to distinguish themselves and their school with their short stories, essays, poetry and other forms of writing in recent competitions.

Rockville High School students won 59 awards, including eight gold keys, 23 silver keys and 28 honorable mentions in the 2023 Scholastic Writing Awards, which are hosted by the Connecticut Writing Project at the University of Connecticut.

"The creative writing program at Rockville High School is one of the pillars of our school," Superintendent Dr. Joseph P. Macary said. "When an outstanding teacher helps students unleash their creativity, it's a powerful combination and highlights educational excellence."

Principal Jason Magao said students and faculty in the creative writing program, including teacher Victoria Nordlund, have created something special that makes the school and town proud.

"From the day I began my tenure as Rockville High School principal, I have been beyond impressed with the dedication and passion of our creative writers," he said.

Nordlund said that the students who participate in the creative writing program are not only outstanding writers, but articulate speakers, dynamic performers, and wonderful role models and ambassadors of Rockville High School.

"I'm so incredibly proud and impressed

with the RHS Creative Writers who have excelled in every literary genre," Nordlund said. "They continue to top themselves, and this year is no exception. But these achievements alone do not make my students outstanding. It is the community that we have built together that makes us shine year after year."

Very few public high schools enter competitions, she noted. Rockville High students are competing with students from private schools and arts schools and doing very well.



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## Vernon Police Continue Partnership with Ring Neighbors App

The Vernon Police Department is working with Ring and its Neighbors App to share information with residents and to ask for video that may be helpful in solving crimes and other incidents.

We have been using this program for about two years and have found it to be helpful on multiple occasions.

The Neighbors App enables police to quickly provide information to a neighborhood where an incident is occurring or has recently occurred. And it is not necessary for residents to have a Ring Video Doorbell, Ring cameras or any other security system to use the free Neighbors App.

Neighbors who have cameras can also choose to share their video with police. Police do not have access to a person's video unless the person chooses to share it publicly on the app or specifically

## Property tax relief available to qualified elderly and totally disabled homeowners

A property tax relief program is available to homeowners who are elderly or who are totally disabled. To be eligible, individuals and couples who own homes must have adjusted gross income of less than \$49,100 and meet other guidelines. People must apply for the program every other year. The application period this year is from Feb. 1 to May 15.

Under the property tax credit program an applicant must, as of the October 1, assessment date, be a Connecticut resident, be the property owner or have life use, and be age 65 as of Dec. 31. There is no age requirement for people who are totally disabled. Applicants must also submit evidence of verified income. This can be in the form of a federal tax return and Social Security statement (SSA-1099). People who have not filed their federal tax return, or who do not file, must present pension statements, bank interest statements, and statements of any other income.

Another possible option for homeowners 70 and older who are of limited income is the Local Freeze program. For more information, contact the assessor's office at 860-870-3625.

We can ask the community for assistance by asking residents to share information and their videos to aid investigations. We have found residents security and door bell videos to be helpful when their camera captures an incident or crime. They have also helped us identify missing people and people we would like to talk to in connection with incidents we are investigating.

The Neighbors App allows police to appeal directly to residents when seeking video for an investigation.

The Neighbors App is available for iOS, Android, or FireOS supported devices.

## Refuse and Recycling Cart Placement

#### **Proper Placement**

Carts should be placed a minimum of 3 feet apart from one another as well as other obstacles such as poles, mailboxes and stonewalls. Ensure no vehicles are blocking access to carts.



#### **Improper Placement**

Incorrect spacing, too close to mailbox. Loose items cannot be collected. Handles should be facing away from street. Lids should be completely closed to avoid littering. Items should not be places on top of closed lids.
