COMMUNITY ORGANIZER LEON FORD PROVIDES MENTORSHIP AND GUIDANCE AS PART OF FOURTH STUDENT SUMMIT

Woodland Hills hosted its fourth annual Student Summit on February 10. Founded by high school English teacher Ms. Erin Wall, the summit began during the 2019-20 school year as a response to a series of traumatic events within the Woodland Hills community.

The summit has grown from once exclusively featuring only Woodland Hills students to now include students from nine districts. Aliquippa, Avonworth, Belle Vernon, Greater Johnstown, Mt. Lebanon, Penn Hills, Shaler, Westmont Hilltop and host Woodland Hills. Student leaders worked throughout the year to plan and host discussion groups about hand-picked subjects. This year's topics included women's rights, LGBTQ issues, mental health, quality animal care, racial and social injustice, gun violence, and climate change.

The summit featured a keynote speech from author and community organizer Leon Ford. Mr. Ford was paralyzed at the age of 19 when he was shot by a police officer in a case of mistaken identity. He shared his experience with depression, PTSD, the concept of post-traumatic growth and the importance of self-care.

Mr. Ford also recently agreed to a mentorship program with the district, one of several such programs the district has developed this year.

EXPERIMENTING WITH AUTONOMOUS MOVEMENT OF VEX ROBOTICS

Woodland Hills is one of the only school districts with a full K-12 robotics curriculum thanks to its partnership with VEX Robotics. At the high school level, students are learning more complex coding, including how to direct the robots to move autonomously.

Throughout March, students in Mr. Aaron Minor's computer science classes wrote Python code to make their VEX Robotics robots move and act autonomously. They began with algorithims to control movement, added sensors to detect objects, and later added a second sensor to detect a defined boundary. This experimentation helped test their coding skills as well as their ability to think critically and problem solve.

At the elementary school level, third graders at Turtle Creek Elementary STEAM Academy have showcased such a mastery of the VEX curriculum that they've started serving as mentors to kindergarteners and first graders. At Edgewood Elementary STEAM Academy, fifth graders overcame the lack of snow in the Pittsburgh area and created a slalom course that their classmates had to navigate with their code base.

Wilkins Elementary STEAM Academy fifth graders have been working on an ocean exploration unit, including building code bases, plows and more to help clean up the ocean floor.



OPPORTUNITY CAMP SET FOR GRADES K-8, HOSTED BY DICKSON & WILKINS

The Woodland Hills Opportunity Camp will return this summer with programming for students currently enrolled in kindergarten through eighth grade. The program will run from June 20 through July 28 and it will be hosted by Wilkins Elementary STEAM Academy and Dickson Preparatory STEAM Academy. The day lasts from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and the camp is provided at no cost to families.

Now in its third year, the Opportunity Camp is designed to help recover learning loss from the COVID-19 pandemic and help prevent future learning loss that typically occurs during the summer break. The combination of academics and activities serves to develop the students' reading, writing and math skills while also helping them develop their social and emotional learning.

Due to the interest in the Opportunity Camp, registrations were placed in a weighted lottery based on when the registration was received. Families will be notified of their enrollment status by mid-April. Students not selected will be waitlisted.

Transportation to the camp will be provided. All students will receive a free breakfast, lunch and snack every day. Students will also have the opportunity to take regular field trips on Fridays.

SENIOR KATIE GREEN NAMED NATIONAL FINALIST FOR NHS SCHOLARSHIP

Normally reserved and quiet, Katie Green's voice gets loudest when she advocates for change to positively impact the environment through the Woodland Hills Climate Action Team and Green Team.

It's one reason why Green has been selected as one of 25 National Finalists for the National Honor Society Scholarship. As a finalist, Green will receive a scholarship for \$5,625. She also earned a trip to the annual award celebration in D.C. and is eligible for additional scholarship money.

Green helped plan the NHS induction ceremony, participated in blood drives and community service projects, took part in mock trial, competes in science Olympiad, serves as a member of the stage crew for theater productions, and works as a library intern.


Third graders teamed up with their kindergarten buddies and read some of their favorite books together.
