

Letter from our Principal

ECA & CEC Parents, Students, staff and Community:

Halloween is behind us and Thanksgiving and the Holidays are almost here!! Our STUCO Fall Festival was an incredible success for the first one in many years. We had over 15 cars in our bus lane for kids to "Trunk or Treat" and I saw a whole lot of happy dentists out there rejoicing. Inside there were some

games and scary rooms, teachers had a door decorating contest and the kids enjoyed a scary Halloween movie on our 22' screen.

But we had a lot of other exciting stuff going on at ECA and CEC!! We had two booths

at the APS School of Choice Fair, and our Cosmo and Esthetics teams showed up and did theatrical make-up and mini facial steams to open up pores and add hydration and increase circulation. Lucky for those that got one! It was a great time and our booths were by far the most popular.

This past week we had two security trainings, one with the staff and one with the students. At our staff meeting last Friday we were trained in ALICE. It is our sixth year of this training, and we have been using ALICE protocols well before the district adapted them. We also did a training with our ECA students through Advisory and have asked all of our CEC teachers to have conversations with their students about how we will handle these events on our campus. By now, all APS students should be trained in ALICE protocols. Attached you will find the lesson plan we used in Advisory class for the student discussion. We certainly hope you will have a conversation with your student about what they learned and what they might do in an emergency situation at school. Just ask them, " How will you respond in a crisi at school?"

We commit, through regular and ongoing training, to ensure that our school is a safe place where students can learn and grow, free from concerns about safety. Daily measures are taken to ensure this safety, including locking the exterior doors; training our staff for a variety of crises that may be encountered from health issues, accidents,

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intruders, and weather-related crises; routinely monitoring security cameras throughout the school; and ensuring our facilities are well maintained and all equipment is in working order. As mentioned in the last newsletter, we are working on communication protocols and procedures that outline how we will communicate with the school

community in an emergency.

Your ECA and CEC Administrative Leadership Team continues to work toward building an academically rich, curious and playful culture at our school. One of our post-pandemic goals is to restore the joy that brought our students to ECA and CEC in the first place, so we have been working with our staff at every opportunity to provide strategies, techniques and skillsets they can use and provide students to nurture their curiosity through active listening and active engagement. Early College Academy has added a new award to the recent National Blue Ribbon Award won in 2019 – ECA is now a 2023 Certified National Magnet High School.

Only 18 magnet high schools in the entire United States earned the distinction of becoming a Magnet Schools of America HS Demonstration School. They earned the distinction from Magnet Schools of America, the national association of magnet and theme-based schools.

The certification process is designed to recognize the most exemplary magnet schools in the nation and help them as they continue to grow and provide high-quality, innovative curricula and instructional programs that promote choice, equity, diversity, and academic excellence for all students.

As a Nationally Certified-Demonstration Magnet School, ECA demonstrated through evidence, reflection, and strategic action that they have established the Standards of Excellence in their schools and fulfilled a commitment to community stakeholders.

APS ALICE video to be shown during 10/17/2022 Advisory

Talking about preparing for a potential school shooting can be stressful for students and staff alike. Therefore, we have put together this discussion guide as a reference tool for you. Please review this guide and watch the video *before* October 17th. Watch the video at ALICE Protocol - English. This is the *only* video to be shown to students.

Q: What is the best way to introduce the topic?

A: Students will follow your lead. Therefore, keep the discussion on topic - using the ALICE protocol to stay safe in the event of a violent intruder on campus. Focus on student preparedness rather than danger. Stress the importance of informed decision making. Do not allow the discussion to stray to sharing personal stories, myths, news coverage, etc. Ask for questions related to the procedure only.

Q: What is ALICE and how is it different from what we have done during past lockdowns?

A: The traditional approach of lockdown focuses on one response to all situations. On the other hand, ALICE empowers students and faculty to participate in their own response by assessing the situation and making informed decisions.

Q: What does ALICE stand for?

A: The acronym ALICE stands for *Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter,* and *Evacuate*. See more detailed explanation below.

Q: What steps should we take on a daily basis to keep our school safe?

A: There are lots of things that all of us, students and staff, can do to keep our campus safe.

- Tell an adult if you see something unusual. This may include a student acting strangely or a stranger on campus.
- All students and adults need to wear their ID at all times when we are on campus. While ECA is a relatively small school, we have more than 200 students and almost 1,000 CEC students here every day; it is not possible to recognize everyone simply on sight. That's why you need to make sure that your ID badge is visible at all times. You can make a real impact by encouraging your friends to wear their ID, as well.

ALICE

ALERT is your first notification act to save yourself. A speedy response is critical. Seconds count. *Alert* is overcoming denial, recognizing the signs of danger and receiving notifications about the danger from others. Alerts should be accepted, taken seriously, and should help you make survival decisions based on the circumstances.

LOCKDOWN should be used if immediate evacuation is not is not a safe option. Barricade all entrances to the room. Prepare to *evacuate* or *counter*, if needed.

Everyone in the classroom should work together to barricade entry points into the room in an effort to create as secure a situation as possible. There are some scenarios where *lockdown* may be the preferable option. However, this is not the passive "lockdown only" that has been used in years past. Rather, it is an informed decision that may change as the situation evolves.

INFORM is how everyone participates in communicating the violent intruder's location and direction in real time. The purpose of *INFORM* is to continue to communicate information in as real time as possible, if it is safe to do so. Armed intruder situations are unpredictable and evolve quickly, which means that ongoing, real time information is key to making effective survival decisions. Information should always be clear, direct and in plain language, not using codes. If the intruder is known to be in an isolated section of a building, occupants in other areas can safely evacuate while those in direct danger can perform enhanced *lockdown* and prepare to *counter*. Video surveillance, 911 calls and PA announcements are just a few of the channels that may be used by employees, safety officers, and other personnel to inform others.

COUNTER is a strategy of <u>last resort</u>. *Counter* focuses on actions that create noise, movement, distance and distraction with the intent of reducing the shooter's ability to shoot accurately. *Counter* is NOT actively confronting a violent intruder. Instead, it creates a dynamic environment that decreases the shooter's chance of hitting a target and can provide the precious seconds needed in order to evacuate. *Counter* is NOT fighting.

EVACUATE when it is safe to do so, rather than just immediately trying to escape. Such a determination is based upon the information you receive (e.g. an announcement that the intruder is another part of the campus). *Evacuating* to a safe area takes people out of harm's way and hopefully prevents civilians from having to come into any contact with the shooter.


