D-Day (June 6, 1944) By Megan Rushing

Originally designated for June 5th, 1944, but due to weather conditions was delayed till the following day, D-Day (the "D" standing for "Day") was when thousands of troops from the United States, Great Britain, and Canada landed on five beaches known as Utah, Omaha, Gold, Sword, and Juno. D-Day began at 6:30 p.m. June 6th, 1944.

As the U.S. landing at Omaha didn't go according to plan due to German weapons left intact from previous bombings and weather conditions forcing them to start further back than what was originally planned, this cost thousands of troops their lives. Eventually, around five and a half hours later, all five beaches were beginning to be taken by the allied forces. Five days later, with all beaches securely under the allies control, troops began to slowly make their way further into Normandy, France, which they gained control of around two and a half months later. This allowed them to liberate Paris from the Germans in August of that same year.

D-Day left many of the troops that were involved dead, wounded, or missing, the exact number is unknown but is assumed to be around 10% of all combined forces. D-Day marked the beginning of the end as it led to Germany taking a huge loss, eventually causing them to sign the unconditional surrender on May 8th, 1945, also known as VE-Day. D-Day is still considered some of our finest hours.

Juneteenth by Megan Rushing

Not unlike many countries around the world, in the United States, slavery, or the act of forcing people to do unpaid labor, was not always illegal. That changed with the Emancipation Proclamation issued by former President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863. This proclamation freed all slaves in the Confederate States.

The process of spreading the news took two years, eventually ending when thousands of Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas, on June 19th, 1865, freeing over two hundred thousand enslaved people. This day was celebrated by what were then, now former slaves, who immediately took advantage of their new freedom. June 19th, or Juneteenth, spread around the country and has been longly celebrated by descendants of former slaves. As of 2021, Juneteenth has been recognized as a national holiday.


