Read Aloud

After listening to the read aloud, ask your child to name the characters and ask questions, such as, "What problem did Elephant and Piggie need to solve?" Ask your child to draw their favorite part of the story and then describe their drawing to you.

Subitize

Show your child a set of coins between 1 and 5. Give your child 2 seconds to look at the set before covering the set. Ask your child to tell you how many they saw.

This is like taking a picture with your eyes.

Challenge:

Watch the video below with your child to practice identifying how many they see in each set. If they are uncertain of how many, name the number as it is shown.

Read Aloud

Take a nature walk. Before going outside, make a list with your child of the animals, plants, and things that you might see. While walking, look for things that are on the list. Afterward, ask your child to draw a picture that shows your nature walk. Help them label some of the things the two of you found.

Positional Word Practice

Use a stuffed animal or other toy to practice identifying various positional words (over, under, in front of, behind, inside, outside, above, below, and between). Hold the object in each of those positions around you and ask your child to name where the object is. For example, "Where is the teddy bear now, (as you put it **between** your feet). Then ask them to place it between their feet and say the word again.

Tear colored paper into small pieces. Can you sort the paper into groups by color?

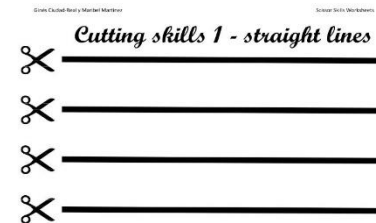


Sort your Socks!
