February 28, 2019 School Board Report

1. A few corrections/updates in regards to topics from last meeting:

- a. The Middle School Review Committee IS recommending that standard classes be removed altogether in science, social studies, and english, in favor of **ALL students** taking **honors classes** in these subjects. (not math, 6th graders too, will be called “honors” on Canvas, has been approved) **NEXT MEETING: March 4--VOICE YOUR OPINIONS**
- b. The School District is looking into new options for a partnership with the City of Shoreline to accomodate the needs of students in regards to the new aquatic facility.
 - i. The current property of the Shoreline Pool is not large enough to accomodate the City’s project of a new recreational facility. (removing tennis courts)
 - ii. The District would like to provide property as their contribution to the new **aquatic center**, so that Shoreline tax payers do not have to pay for a new property and the City can invest more in the facility itself, e.g., an eight lane pool and a diving tank.

2. January 28th Meeting

 - i. The overall goal is to reduce classroom sizes and how to optimize the space that we have in the District.
 - ii. Beginning 2019-2020 North City Elementary is available to provide extra classroom space.
 - 1. Could open as a neighborhood school or a location for special programs.
 - iii. Highly Capable trends.
 - 1. Implementation of highly capable services at neighborhood schools appears to be causing a trend of decreased enrollment in the two magnet programs at Ridgecrest and Meridian Park.
 - c. Action Items.
 - i. Approval of the Middle School Committees Recommendations.
 - d. Community Comments
 - i. High Cap Parent: in response to the District's adoption of the Middle School Committee recommendations, that opted for an ALL Honors system, this individual stated that high-cap kids should be kept within their own groupings because it best serves their social-emotional needs.
 - ii. Kellogg Math Teacher and a High-Cap Associate: in response to the District's adoption of the Middle School Committee recommendations, that opted for an ALL Honors system, the individual reminded the Board that there would continue to be Math and ELA cohorts for High-Cap students: mixing with the other students would only occur in science and social studies classes. The individual stated that High-Cap is largely composed of white and rich/upper class students and these individuals would benefit from interacting with other students and learning to work with them. It is our job to teach them these skills.
 - iii. It is still uncertain how the advisory time will be implemented.

 1. SBR Crumb Rubber
 - a. Many perceived health risks, the EPA is conducting a study but no developments have been made public.
 2. Coated SBR Crumb Rubber
 3. Granular Cork: organic, the alternative to SBR that the Board is willing to consider.
 4. Other:
 - a. Thermoplastic Elastomer
 - b. Ethylene-Propylene-Diene Rubber
4. February 25th Regular Meeting
 - a. School District Options for Participation in City of Shoreline's Possible Upgrade of Shoreline Pool
 - i. The Wish List:
 1. 8 lane swimming pool
 2. Lane width 8 feet each (Current Design references 7' lanes)
 3. Separate dive well
 4. Additional deck and spectator areas
 5. Preferred practice times as we currently have
 - ii. Shoreline Center Configuration.
 1. The City's current CAC location allows for 2.1 acres for the facility and 2.1 acres for parking.
 2. The Shoreline Center can accommodate these area requirements
 - a. The tennis courts and public restrooms would have to be removed.
 - iii. Next Steps.
 1. The City is waiting for feedback from the Board on the presentation from this meeting.
 2. The City plans to have a decision about this option by late March.
 - b. 2019-2020 Enrollment Projections
 - i. Based on a conservative 6-year weighted formula, enrollment is projected to increase by 52 students (0.5% increase) next year, excluding Running Start.
 - c. Community Comments/Board Reports

- i. Shorewood Girls Swim coach: Thank you to the Board for the willingness to step up to the plate and take a stand on the pool issue. Please also consider how the proposed construction on the current pool site will impact district swim teams.
- ii. Many, many young swimmers came in to express their love of swimming!
- iii. Kellogg middle schooler: An 8 lane pool is essential because overcrowding is a safety concern.
- iv. Mother of two Shoreline graduates: Crumb rubber is a safety concern, there have been cases of cancer, exacerbated asthma, and concussions associated with crumb rubber and its lack of resilience. Please take caution as you proceed with the future infill of our fields.
