1. Guest Speakers

a. Mr. Dunbar

- 26.9 acre campus
- Currently have 347 parking spaces?
- Same number as old campus
- Natural surfaces need to be in ratio to non-natural surfaces
- Old campus: used to divide parking between staff and grade levels
- New campus: very few labeled spots (handicap, 5 for visitors, staff lot)

- Most high school campuses in a suburban environment is more like 40 acres = more space (Shorecrest)
- 170th street (by ballfields) = about 18-20 parking spots
- Currently charge \$25 for a parking permit
- Would we drop the fees lower?
- Parking patrol monitor
- Not looking to make a profit off of parking
- Don't have enough space to add more spots
 - Tess: Mr. Sherry's understanding is that we have less parking now than we did in the old campus, can we turn ballfields into a parking area?
 - Dunbar: softball and baseball fields are part synthetic and part natural, closely regulated environmental rules
 - Niko: back in the day...seniors and juniors got money from parking pass and the money would go towards the specified class
 - Dunbar: money would go to ASB account and that would pay for a parking lot monitor and other parking stuff
 - Troy: are we selling more passes than there are spots?
 - Dunbar: sold around 280 passes, comparison to SCC system (permit gives you right to park on campus but doesn't guarantee a spot)
 - Estie: if we're not guaranteeing spots then why are we charging?
 - Dunbar: Money from permits allows for us to operate the parking lot, there's no obligation to buy a permit (off-campus parking)
 - Payton: Why is our parking system set up like a college system?
 - Arden: Putting down a different surface onto the ballfield...is that something that the district would pass?
 - Dunbar: What would the surface be?

b. Mr. Sherry

- Total spots: 348 or 349
- Traffic flow situation
- Pedestrian crossing
- Asked human relations department to see if it was necessary to put in a crossing guard
 - Reason for back-ups is because of parents stopping to drop-off/pick-up
