Special Appeal Eligibility Criteria

Any student who meets the following eligibility conditions may appeal to earn a diploma with a lower score on a Regents exam. These conditions are specific to the special appeal.

Regents examination taken:

- June 2022.
- August 2022,
- January 2023,
- June 2023, or
- August 2023

Earned a score of **50-64** on the Regents examination that is the subject of the appeal and was taken during one of the above administrations

Passed the course for which the appeal is being sought *

* When making a determination as to whether a student is eligible to apply for a Special Appeal, the grade earned on the Regents examination is <u>not included</u> in the calculation of the course average.

US History & Government (Framework)

For the purpose of meeting the diploma requirements, students shall be exempt from the Regents Examination in US History and Government if they intended to take such exam in June/August 2022 or January 2023 and:

- were enrolled in a course of study that would ordinarily culminate in the taking of the June 2022, August 2022, or January 2023 Regents Examination in US History and Government and earned credit for such course of study by the end of the first semester of the 2022-23 school year; or
- were enrolled in a course of study in grade 7 or grade 8 that would ordinarily culminate in the taking of the June 2022, August 2022, or January 2023 Regents Examination in US History and Government and met the learning standards in such course of study; or
- by the end of the first semester of the 2022-23 school year, successfully completed a make-up program for the purpose of earning course credit in a course that would ordinarily culminate in the Regents Examination in US History & Government; or
- were preparing to take the Regents Examination in US History and Government in order to graduate in June 2022, August 2022, or January 2023; or
- transferred to a NYS high school and earned credit in a course for which they intended to take the Regents
 Examination in US History and Government in June 2022, August 2022, or January 2023.

Subject: Providing Over-Age Students the Opportunity to Return to School in the

2022-23 School Year Due to the Impact of COVID-19

As previously announced, the Board of Regents and the State Education Department have implemented a number of temporary regulatory changes to minimize the educational impact that COVID-19 has had on all students in New York State. This has resulted in the need to modify the requirements students must meet to earn high school diplomas, credentials, and endorsements.

While COVID-19 has impacted all of us, it has been particularly harmful to vulnerable populations, including English language learners, economically disadvantaged and homeless students, and students with disabilities. Students who "aged out" of the P-12 education system because they have turned 21 years old by the start of school in September 2022 were also greatly impacted this past school year.


To ensure that 21-year-old students have the chance to earn their high school diploma and fully prepare for the transition to their planned postsecondary experiences, the Board of Regents and the State Education Department are strongly encouraging schools and school districts to allow those students who will age out of school the opportunity to attend school in the 2022-2023 school year, in order to complete their education and earn a diploma, credential, or endorsement.

Many plans for the 2022-2023 school year were again placed on hold or interrupted due to constantly changing health and safety conditions and the need to transition between remote, hybrid and in-person instruction. As we experienced last school year, these changes to our educational system disrupt learning leaving some students without ransition from high school ne of these students were m at the end of the 2021r students who can least edential, or endorsement.

Science Laboratory Requirement



In order to qualify to take a Regents examination in any of the sciences, a student must complete 1,200 minutes of laboratory experience which may be met through any combination of hands-on and simulated **laboratory experience** with satisfactory documented laboratory reports. The 1,200 minutes of laboratory experience must be in addition to the required classroom instruction associated with earning a unit of credit.



Grad Measures: Draft Timeline

Phase I: Information Gathering & Learning

- November 2019 March 2020:
 - o Literature review of research and practices in other states.
 - o Regional meetings held beginning Jan. Mar. 2020 to gather feedback from across the state.
- March 2020: All Regional Meetings canceled due to COVID-19 pandemic.
- Fall 2021 Spring 2022: Regional Meetings held in virtual format.
- Spring / Summer 2022: Compile Regional Meeting feedback.
- Fall 2022:
 - o Present regional meeting and literature review findings to the Board.
 - o Establish the Blue Ribbon Commission (BRC) and draft meeting schedule.


Phase II: Blue Ribbon Commission

- Fall 2022 Winter 2023:
 - Commission's first meeting the BRC convenes and defines its scope of work.
 - Blue Ribbon Commission second meeting to identify priority areas and a framework for moving forward. Establish sub-groups for priority areas.
- Winter 2023 Spring 2023: Sub-groups meet.
- Spring 2023 Summer 2023: Sub-groups develop proposed recommendations.
- Fall 2023 Winter 2024: Sub-groups advance recommendations to the BRC.
- Winter 2024 Spring 2024: The BRC finalizes recommendations and a report is prepared.

Phase III: Regents Discussion

• **Spring / Summer 2024:** The Blue Ribbon Commission's final report is presented to the Board of Regents for consideration.

Structure of the BRC



Based on student interests







Individual Arts Assessment Pathway Pilot for Approved Pilot Schools



- ≥ 25 School districts and 48 schools are participating in this three-year pilot
- ➤ Approved pilot schools completed the draft application and committee report process which was due to the Department on June 15th.
- Projected IAAP enrollment in the 2022-2023 AY is 1140 students, more than three times the Arts Pathway participation in the 2020-2021 AY




Seal of Civic Readiness Update


Who can apply?
