Rutter, Johnson Named Coaches; Band To Travel To World's Fair

The addition of three new sports teams and a debating team to the Pottsgrove High School activities was approved at the December 14 meeting of the joint school board.

The board adopted the 26 recommendations of the educational planning committee for the establishment of golf, tennis, cross country, track, and debating teams.

New Coaches

The Falcon also learned that three new tennis courts may be built on the school grounds in the spring. The fate of the courts will depend upon submitted cost of the estimates.

Seniors Stage Christmas Fete Before Holiday


To celebrate the holiday season, students of Pottsgrove attended the annual Christmas Dance held on December 19, from eight to eleven o'clock P.M.

To become eligible for membership, the inductees must have previously earned and been awarded a varsity letter in a high school sport.



A teacher's lesson plan may be thrown awry by floating periods in combination with assemblies, pep rallies, quarterlies, or vacations.


A floating chaos cannot be avoided if students persist in joining more activities than they can handle.

The Falcons ended Unionville's one game winning streak by beating the Indians by a score of 60-46, in the second game of the season, Tuesday, December 1.



The Falcons posted a very impressive victory over the Wildcats, 89-41, on Tuesday, December 8, at O. J. Roberts.

The birds had to scramble back after falling behind early, but the guards hustled, and with Gerry Dori and Dave Tillger controlling the Backboards the Falcons soon caught up. Dave Tillger was high scorer of the night with 31, with help from Rod Binczak and Gerry Dori, each with 12.

Succumb to Muhls

The Falcons dropped their second in the first five games to an aggressive Muhlenberg team, 93-63. Rod Binczak topped the Falcons with 16, while John Psota added 10.

Dan Calabrio, Berks County's top scorer last year, slammed in 26 points for the Muhls. The Muhls played a tough man for man defense and didn't give the Falcons the good shots.

Pottsgrove Stuns Bristol and Pius

The Falcons built up an early lead and held on to beat Bristol 59-53 cm December 17 at Bristol. John Psota lead all players with 21, and got support from Jack Hipple 10, and Dave Tillger 12. The Falcons played an outstanding defensive game.

Pius Halted

The Falcons played one of their best games of the season thus far, as they edged St. Pius 55-46.

Led by the scoring of Dave Tillger (17 points) and John Psota (12 points), the Falcons built up a 28-21 halftime lead. The Lions threatened in the 3rd and 4th quarters, but some clutch foul shooting by Stan Plevyak helped preserve the victory.
