Band Concert To Be Held At Pottsgrove









The Falcons have now beaten every basketball team in the Inter-County League at least once. If they can duplicate this feat in the second half of the season, they'll have their first basketball championship since 1961.

On Tuesday, January 26, the Falcons defeated their closest Inter-County foe, Upper Dublin, 64-52. Jack Hipple, playing with a bad back, and Dave Tillger led the team with 16 and 18 points respectively.

The Cardinals took a 18-13 lead at the end of the first quarter, but some fancy passing and shooting by Hipple and Rod Binczak (15 points) carried the Falcons to a 35-32 halftime bulge. Upper Dublin challenged in the second half but was not able to grab the lead.


Hipple Leads Win
