Jacob E. Dailey, Pottsgrove supervising principal, will introduce the speaker and members of the school board and school authority.


Open house will be held from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. Parents and friends are invited to inspect and tour the facilities.

The new organ was manufactured by the Allen Organ Company, Macungie, Pennsylvania.

The idea of purchasing an organ for the school was initiated when the class of 1959 donated money for this purpose. Last year's graduating class contributed to the fund also. The Parent-Teacher Association played the major part in the purchasing of the organ.

Gaeta To Be At Assembly

An assembly on falconry will be presented to the students of Pottsgrove on October 22 by Lou Gaeta and his falcon "Jezebel."

Mr. Gaeta, who is now the Zoo Director of Hiram House Summer Camp in Cleveland, was introduced to the sport of falconry while he was stationed as a soldier in Germany. This ancient sport, which centuries ago was primarily for kings and emperors, intrigued him so much that he brought to America the bird and its story.

In his program, which has won exceptional reviews, Mr. Gaeta shows at least six "Hunters with Wings." These hunters include falcons, eagles, hawks, vultures, and owls, and he always includes a surprise animal.

Falconry originated in the Far East and was rapidly spread across Asia to Europe. room wings of six regular classrooms, a kindergarten, and one special education room.

Other features of the new construction are a multi-purpose room that can be used as a gymnasium, auditorium, or cafeteria, a health suite, conference room, teachers' room, kitchen area and storage rooms.

The central elementary library for the Pottsgrove Jointure is located here.

Terazzo floors, florescent lighting, acoustical ceilings and sight saving pastel colored "blackboards" have been installed throughout the building.

Each classroom is equipped with a sink and drinking fountain; the special education and kindergarten rooms have private lavatory facilities also.

Seniors Get Merit Award

Arthur Jenkins and Michael Ulan, two Pottsgrove High seniors, have been named as semi-finalists in the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. They qualified for this honor by taking a test sponsored by this organization last year.

Each year juniors from high schools in the United States take these tests. Less than one percent of the top scorers from each state are chosen as semi-finalists. These students will take other tests from which the finalists will be picked. From these finalists the winners of the Merit Scholarships will be selected.

Susan Gohean and James Tallman were also recipients of awards. These students received Letters of Commendation. The commended students' names and addresses are sent to their first and second choice colleges with recommendation to increase their opportunities for other scholarships.

"Absolutely Murder," a three-act mystery-comedy, will be presented by the senior class on October 25. This spellbinding drama concerns itself with a deserted gunpowder mill on an island in Lake Champlain which dates from the Revolutionary War.

She has also called Dr. Harman "the best friend this school ever had."

The new county superintendent, Dr. Harman, is also well-known to Pottsgrove students as the man for whom the Pottsgrove chapter of the Future Teachers of America was named.

What Is A School Evaluation?

What is "evaluation?" This word seems to be tossed around so much these days, but does everyone really know what it means to us at Pottsgrove?

In November, we will have a group of 16 people visit our school. This group will be composed of personnel from all fields of education; college professors, administrators, and teachers.

They will evaluate our school in light of our philosophy and the needs of our community according to recognized standards for secondary schools. These standards were set up by a special committee of leaders in education. The visiting committee will inspect all aspects of our school life; classes, activities, the building, and grounds.

Pottsgrove has been preparing for this for a long time. Each department must evaluate itself in terms of the specifications set up by the committee. The evaluators will then rate their findings against those of our teachers and tell us if we rated ourselves too high or low.

This group will also ask to meet with student leaders. This means that they will meet with student representatives from all activities. They will ask the students questions concerning their activities. In addition to these students, they will pick other students at random. They will ask these students the same questions and compare the answers to form their own opinions.

When this three day period is over, the committee will give a brief oral report to the faculty and administrators.

At a later date, a more complete, written report will be sent to us. Both reports will commend us for the things that we are doing well and, likewise, recommend areas for improvement.

When questioned about each student's role in the evaluation, our principal, Miss Rosenberry, stated that each of us regard the evaluators as our guests, be as helpful as possible, and describe things as accurately and truthfully as we know how.



Falcons Top Blazers



Janet is a member of the academic course and is planning to be a practical nurse after graduation. She spent her summer working as a nurses aide at the Memorial Hospital in Pottstown.


