

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS STUDENT COUNCIL POTTEGROVE HIGH SCHOOL

PREAMBLE

We, the students of Pottsgrove Junior-Cenior High School, in order to develop and promote better school spirit and interests in our school, and to insure a sincere respect for law and order, do herby establish this Constitution for the Student Body of Pottsgrove Junior-Senior High School.

ARTICLE I- NAME AND FUR POSE Section I- Name

The name of this organization shall be the Pottsgrove Junior-Senior High School Student Council.

Section II- Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to plan and conduct cooperatively with the principal and faculty, the activities and life of our school and promote such projects as well further the interest of the pupils and the school.

ARTICLE II THE COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

Section I- Membership

- A. The Council shall be composed of a president, one vice-president, One secretary, and one treasurer.
- B. There will be four representatives from each grade.
- C. The Council Adviser will be appointed by the Principal.

Section II- Representatives.

- A. Representatives in all grades Shall be elected for one year near the ending of the school year for the following year.
- B. The installation of members of Council shall take place in the auditorium, date set by prinvipal.

Section III- Qualifications of Officers and Representatives.

- 1. Shall have a scholarship rating of "C" or higher.
- 2. Shall possess executive ability and leadership.
- 3. Shall be approved by the principal

4. Shall have demonstrated a sense of responsibility.

5. Shall be dependable and tactful in dealing with other people.

ARTICLE III- OFFICERS

Section I-

The officers of Student Council shall be one president, one vice-president, one secretary, and one treasurer.

Section II-

Any 12 grade student in the Council shall be eligible for the office of president, secretary, or treasurer.

Section IIINo student may be chosen to any eleced office in the Student Council who
has not been registered upon the roll
of Pottsgrove High School at least
one school year prior to the time at
which the term of the office will begin, and who has not, been in the
Council at least one school term.

Cection IN

The president shall be a member of the 12 grade while in office. The vice-president, secretary, and the tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grade.

ARTICLE IV - CCMMITTEES

Section I -

The president with the approval of the sponsor and the council members shall appoint such committees as necessary.

ARTICLE V - AMENDMENTS

Section I -

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Council with the approval of the principal and sponsor.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE COUNCIL

Section I -

The Council shall have power to consider all matters brought before it by its members.

Section II -

The Council shall have the power to expel a member for failure to attend meetings or for any other just cause by a two-thirds vote of the total membership. Roll will be checked at every meeting.

Section III

The principal shall have power to veto all acts of the Council.

ARTICLE VII MEETINGS

Section I

The regular meeting of the Council shall be held at the time and in the place designated by the principal.

Section II

Special meetings may be called by the secretary, president, or upon the request of five members of the council. The purpose of the special meetings must be stated in the call. The only business discussed at that meeting shall be the matter for which it was called.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS

Section I-

Any member of the Pottsgrove Junior-Senior High School Student Council shall have the privilege to present in writing to the president a proposed amendment to the Constitution. There shall be a discussion and a vote on the amendment.

Section II-

Amendments shall be in force when ratified by a two-thirds vote of all members of the Conuncil present ata regular meeting.

ARTICLE IX - RATIFICATION

ection I-

The Constitution shall be ratified by a two-thirds vote of the Student Council and approved by the principal.

section II -

The Constitution shall go into effect on June 1, 1960.

BY - LAWS

All meetings shall follow parliamentary procedure.

Voting shall be by the raise of hands or secret ballot.

(a) The secretary shall have charge of committee reports.

(b) The secretary shall have charge

of the seating chart and shall take the roll.

4. The charirman of all committees shall be a member of the Council.

5. Minutes must be written by the secretary immediately and submitted to the office to be printed.

6. Copies of the minutes shall be given to each home room and to the principal.

7. All officers of the Student Council must have an average of "C" in all major subjects; failure to meet this requirement brings about automatic suspension of office.

8. Request for funds for charity or school enterprises will be considered

at regular meetings.

9. The president shall be the parliamentariam of the Council.

10. The By-Laws shall be subject to change at any time by a two-thirds vote of the Council.
