Metal Shop Vacancy Filled



As Valentine's Day arrives, let us remember that we are not the only ones who celebrate it, but so do many other people, in many different ways!



Two or three summers ago, five individuals with unique talents joined forces to form one very unique and different musical bag, The Pentangle.

Pentangle consists of Terry Cox, drums and glockenspiel; Bert Jousch, acoustic guitar; Jacqui Me-Shee, vocals; John Renbourn, acoustic guitar; and Dowy Thompson, double bass.

Of all groups now in existence, Pentangle is the first one I have heard that incorporates just about every type of music into their being-folk, blues, jazz, and classical. Their first and only album as of now, Sweet Child, has gone past the "group idea," giving each member a chance to break down all musical barriers and live the music.

Sweet Child, recorded live at the Royal Festival Hall in London, is a complete musical book. It contains numbers like La Rotto and The Earle of Salisbury, 14th century dances, and blues numbers such as "Turn Your Money Green," and "I've Got a Feeling." Pentangle does some very solid arrangements of Traditional English and Scottish ballads like the unaccompanied song by Jacqui, "So Early in the Spring." They also get into spirituals and jazz. Two of the best jazz cuts on the album are Haitian Fight Song in which Danny solos on bass, and Moon Dog. and without fail, go beyond these limits, surpassing goals they themselves thought impossible to reach. The Pentangle repertoire is moving and a must for all music lov-


Bad Losses

By JAMES EGELSTON Arthur Ashe Denied African Visa

Arthur Ashe, American Negro tennis star, has been refused a visa permitting him to compete in South Africa in the South African Open Tennis Championship in March. The announcement came not unexpectedly since South Africa had been banned from the Olympic Games and international sports as a result of their race segregation laws which forbid white and nonwhites to compete together.

Opinion against South Africa's ruling in the Ashe case arose quickly after the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association issued a strongworded statement citing "a clear case of racial discrimination."

The U.S. State Department had involved itself in the case by supporting Ashe's visa application through Secretary of State William Rogers. The State Department said, "We greatly regret the refusal of the visa to Ashe and we believe that it would be in the best interest of South Africa in terms of its international posture with other countries in the sports field to admit Ashe."

Sportsmen throughout South Africa fear that the visa refusal will not only lead to South Africa's expulsion from Davis Cup competi-

If South Africa wishes to compete world-wide with other countries, she must abide by international rules, and if she doesn't, her expulsion from world sports is clearly justified.


MRS. KEFFER

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


