

Enrolled in the academic course, Stephanie is co-editor of The Falcon, a Maximi staff member, a Leader Corps member, and she had many main rolls in class plays.


Out of school she likes to water ski, to horseback ride, and to read. She eats any kind of food and "likes it all," and her favorite class is health.


