
STUDENT TEACHERS FROM URSINUS ARRIVE AT P. H. S. TO BEGIN TEACHING EXPERIENCE

Student Council Active In Dress Code Matter

On Friday, September 11, 1970, the annual Student Council Induction Assembly was held. Mr. Radel installed the following officers to serve for the 1970-71 school year; Lee Levengood, president; Bill VanBuskirk, vice-president; Janis Supco, secretary; and Polly Edleman, treasurer. Immediately following, the homeroom representatives and the representatives-at-large were installed. Mr. Davidson again accepted the responsibility of advisor.

The primary concern of the Student Council this year, as in past years, has been the dress code. The Student Council originally proposed a Statement of Purpose with six restrictions to take the place of the dress

code. The proposal was presented to the public at a community meeting early in the school year. The administration also supported this policy. After taking a vote, the faculty reached the decision to abolish the dress code entirely. The final and deciding vote was made by the school board members at the meeting on Tuesday, October 13, 1970. The school board passed four regulations regarding school attire which, in short, stated that the responsibility for a student's dress is placed upon his parents; there will be no restrictions placed on hair style or dress unless it causes a health hazard, a safety hazard,

Leader Corps A Big Activity

What started out last year as only an experiment has grown into one of the biggest activities at Pottsgrove. This club is Leader Corps. With over twice as many students in it this year, Leader Corps hopes to accomplish great things.

The Club's Purpose

The purpose of the club according to Rocco Liott, the club's president, is to bring out responsibility and leadership. Qualifications

Qualifications to be a Leader are: A "C" average in scholarship and a "B" average in citizenship.

Scheduled Gym Classes

Regular meetings are held every Monday, during activity period. During these meetings, spotting, dancing, and officiating techniques are demonstrated and discussed.

New Courses At Pottsgrove High

Pottsgrove is getting a whole new look this year. Bigger and better changes are being made all the time. There are many new and exciting courses being offered in the science department. For the seventh graders Life Science is their objective. Mrs. Duckett is the instructor.

The IPS (Introductory Physical Science) is offered to the eighth graders. This course is now used in place of the old General Science. It is taught by Mr. Edwards, Mr. Dybach, Mr. Dry, and Mrs. Duckett.

Another new course, which is offered to ninth graders, is the ESCP (Earth Science Curriculum Period). ESCP is mostly laboratory work. It is also a new approach to Earth and Space Science. ESCP is taught by Mrs. Mann and General Earth and Space is taught by Mr. Rutter, Mrs. Irey, Mr. Freedman, and Mrs. Mann.

This year an elective for seniors is HPP (Harvard Project Physics). This, too, is a new approach, which is lab-oriented. Mr. Rutter is the instructor of this course, for which \$2000 worth of equipment was purchased.


Intramural Hockey
