## **FALL**

	What you want to accomplish in the next few years? <b>Set goals now.</b>		
	Meet with Mrs. Campbell to discuss course choices and how they align with your goals. Make sure you		
	know which courses majors or colleges require.		
	Get involved! Join or lead a club or activity. Meaningful involvement will enrich your high school		
	experience.		
	Consider your options after high school graduation: college (4-year and 2-year), military, gap year,		
	volunteerism, work. The more selective the college, the more thought should be given to your		
	planning.		
	Attend school events and college visits in the College Center to explore and gather information.		
	Begin your research about how to obtain financial aid and scholarships. Discuss and plan with your		
	parents about what you can and are willing to afford for college.		
	Search college websites for what colleges require for admissions – they are not all the same.		
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	Consider taking <i>concurrent enrollment courses</i> for college credit in high school.		
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	Thinking about playing sports in college? Check out NCAA eligibility requirements: www.eligibilitycenter.org		
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	perspective. ACT and SAT scores may be required for admission to certain colleges. Even if you apply		
	to test-optional colleges, test scores may be required for scholarships and need-based and merit awards. Each test offers free test questions.

	All sophomores take the PSAT 10 in April at high school

	Scouts, Girl Scouts, etc. This information will be useful when completing college applications.
