Rivals partnership offers more opportunities for students

C himacum and Port Townsend School Districts have created a sports team partnership, the Rivals, where student athletes from both districts practice and compete on the same team.

The Rivals were successful this year, mostly in individual sports. 396 students from both high schools and 80 students at the junior high/middle school level participated in sports this year. With 45 paid coaches and many more volunteering their time, our coaches are helping our student athletes become better humans both on and off the fields and courts. Beyond wins and losses, the athletes are learning life lessons such as teamwork, collaboration, and communication that will continue to serve them well into adulthood.

FALL

Swimming had 9 athletes compete at the state meet in Federal Way. Gillian McCracken ended up placing 2nd in both her events in the adaptive meet. Both boys and girls Cross Country teams competed at the state meet in Pasco: the girls placed 6th overall as a team and the boys placed 12th. The boys Tennis doubles team consisting of Reid Martin and Stuart Dow qualified for the state tournament, taking 5th place at state this spring.

WINTER

Wrestling sent 3 athletes to the state meet at the Tacoma Dome. MiAmada Lanphear Ramirez placed 3rd overall in her weight class. Both boys and girls Basketball teams competed in the postseason as well.

SPRING

Fastpitch Softball has gotten up and running again, after not having a team at either school for the last 4 years. Track and Field had several athletes medal at the state tournament including Ellise Gardner (2nd place, Javelin) and Aliyah Yearian (2nd place: 800, 1600 and 3200 meters).

Combining athletic programs has allowed student athletes to have many opportunities that may not have been available if remaining as individual teams. The Rivals has been and will continue to be an integral part of both communities.

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


Federal pandemic relief (ESSER) funds wind down

The Federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds were designed to support school districts through the pandemic. Chimacum has used those resources to pay for vital services, including keeping class sizes small, and nursing staff and counselors above what the state funds. Although the support needs remain, ESSER money will be expended by August 2024.

Here is a look at where Chimacum's revenue comes from and how those funding sources have fluctuated over the past two years.
