The month of March marked the beginning of our "new normal". Within days, we mobilized as a district and made sure that our students had access to a device so they could be engaged during our new platform of remote learning. I'm very proud of our technology department for working so quickly to support children. At the same time, our instructional services department and student services department collaborated with their teams to make sure that a learning plan was in place for students, both from a curricular level as well as social emotional level--knowing full well that we had



no manual to follow as we navigated through this worldwide crisis for the very first time in our lives.

I was also very touched to see the volunteers that have come into place as we focused on food distribution for our families that began in mid-March. It definitely takes a village, and with that, I thank our Board members, staff and community members who have given their time to distribute food to our families with the support of Arbor Management. Safety Department as we focus on feeding our Orchard Place families at the Barry Recreational Center. We have been in constant communication with our neighboring school districts, local police and fire departments, offering support and assistance to one another when we have needed it most.

Our staff miss our students deeply. I have seen our staff jump in their cars and drive through neighborhoods to wish our students and families well which has lifted the spirits of so many in our community. Videos have been created and shared with families filled with messages of hope, care and compassion. Our teachers are connecting with students virtually and our principals are working very hard to make sure that the needs of our staff and students have been addressed. Our operations and maintenance team have been diligent about keeping our schools, classrooms and buildings clean while also supporting food distribution efforts.

I also would like to acknowledge the fact that while our Strategic Plan may look a bit different today in terms of our focus six



weeks ago, everything we are doing centers around our five goals. From our focus on student learning with the supports we are providing through remote learning (Goal 1) to ensuring that our students have the resources they need (Goal 2) to supporting staff during these uncertain times (Goal 3) to helping families by providing meals and necessities-with a little help from our friends

in the community (**Goal 4**) to making sure that the district has what it needs to operate and function even during these uncertain times (**Goal 5**).

While this is a temporary situation, this is our reality today. I've realized that during these uncertain times, it is easy to focus on the negative, which is why we wanted to intentionally share the good we have seen across our extraordinary school district. I will continue to promote the good that is happening in District 62 because I believe that positive energy is contagious.  After one day of food distribution at the Barry Recreational Center, Orchard Place families and community joined together. In mid-March, volunteers

from Algonquin Middle School and Orchard Place helped give out approximately 200 meals.

The movement grew and the week following spring break, Orchard Place staff and families coordinated pick-up for 60 meals to bring back to Rosemont for families without access to transportation. With support from the Rosemont Public Safety Department,

## Did you know?

Every District 62 student received a device to support learning in anticipation of Governor Pritzker's Stay at Home Executive Order. Remote learning materials with grade level learning standards are mailed home every week for those students without Wi-Fi access. Teachers make daily phone calls to support families.

District 62 has set up Wi-Fi in every school parking lot and provided hot spots for every home in need.
