Fiscal year 2020 (FY20) concluded at the of June, and much has happened over the last year in District 62. During the fall of 2019, the district retired \$28 million in bond debt, and refunded remaining outstanding debt, which will save taxpayers over \$11 million over the next five years. More recently, the district has had to respond to the challenges caused by Covid-19. Looking ahead to fiscal year 2021 (FY21), state and federal funding is expected to be consistent with FY20.
