Westerfeld was one of only 1,000 children the United States permitted to enter the country during the 1930's in order to escape Nazi Germany.

Schumer Chapman is a former reporter for The Chicago Tribune and Forbes magazine. She has written several books, all of which touch on her mother's story of her Holocaust survival. The event was made possible by a grant from the District 62 Education Foundation.

FinanceBits

The Board of Education adopted the 2021 tax levy in the amount of \$83,701,000. This is a 9.99% increase over the prior year and it is based on the increase in the 2020 Consumer Price Index, Urban (CPI-U) of 1.4% and the projected increase in new construction and the expiration of a TIF district within the district's boundaries. It should be noted that taxpayers on existing properties within the district will see an increase of approximately 1.4%. A public hearing was held on December 13, 2021 prior to the Board voting on the adopted levy.
