On behalf of the entire Lauralton community, I would like to express our deepest appreciation to Elizabeth and Kathy for their service to our School.



FLY LIKE AN EAGLE!

This inspiring picture, taken earlier this spring, is one of a pair of eagles, birds we are proud to claim as campus residents. In collaboration with a state wildlife biologist, National Geographic-Certified educator, Lauralton science teacher, and alumna Mrs. April Oberempt Kelley '85 has confirmed that the pair are likely 4 or 5-year-old first-time nesters. The bald eagle is currently listed as a threatened species in both the state and nation, so we celebrate Lauralton's designation as the 65th recognized bald eagle territory in Connecticut.

These thrilling and inspiring animals are an affirmation of the <u>Sisters of Mercy Critical Concern for the Earth</u>, which calls us to act in harmony with and sustain all creation. Over the course of several months, we have eagerly, sometimes anxiously, monitored the nest-building, egg-laying, and brooding of the majestic pair, and the successful hatching and growth of the two eaglets. Their success is familiar in many ways—a great deal of preparation, shared hard work, and commitment that our students make every day to reach their goals.

AN ITALIAN ADVENTURE

The following was adapted from contributions by Advanced Vocal Ensemble members Margo Katz '23 and Molly Ciuci '24.

Our travels in Italy technically began with our arrival at the airport in Milan, but it was the tolling bell of Venice's St. Mark's Clock Tower that was the first musical beat of our journey. In the Piazza San Marco, or St. Mark's Square, we toured the Palace of the Doge, the residence of the leader of the Republic of Venice before a united Italy, and St. Mark's Basilica. We were mesmerized by ornate, gold-plated ceilings, beautiful frescos, and dazzling buildings—testaments to the wealth and genius of Italian craftsmen. We enjoyed a special tour of the Murano Glass Factory where we were able to purchase souvenirs reminding us of the elegance of Venice.

After lunch and the first of many gelatos, we reconvened by the Two Columns of San Marco and San Tod for our first concert rehearsal. Then, there was still time to experience the city and culture—gondola ride? Check!

Three different groups performed at each concert: Concert Choir, Advanced Vocal Ensemble, and Chamber Choir. In Venice, an orchestra member and a vocalist volunteered to help us with accompaniment. Our voices echoed inside the Santa Maria della Pietà church, creating a quality of sound. After the concert, the ferry brought a boatload of exhausted, yet deeply content Lauralton girls back to mainland Italy.

Our next destination was Florence. At a scenic overlook of the entire city, we stopped for an awe-inspiring view and photos, a magical moment. We toured the Academy of Fine Arts; its museum is dedicated to Michelangelo and showcases the musical instruments of his time, his Prisoners statues, and, of course, his masterpiece, David. We learned of the development of art and techniques used by artists. That night, we were very thankful to the small parish community of Montecatini for allowing us to join their Easter Mass. Celebrating Easter in another country taught us a new perspective on the holiday. Although we picked up just a few Italian phrases, it is clear that Christians around the world are all part of the same community with the same beliefs. Jesus has risen, and He loves us so much.

The second day in Florence was filled with visits to many historic sites, including the Baptistry, the Duomo, the Ponte Vecchio, and Dante's birthplace. The cathedral, an exquisite place of worship, is the largest building in Florence. Florentine neighborhoods are characterized by quiet, narrow streets of cobblestone and hidden shops. Our tour ended in the plaza of Santa Maria at a local glass and leather store. The women working in the store showed us products unique to Florence, sentimental and memorable gifts for our family and friends. That night, we participated in our second concert at the Basilica di Santo Spirito.

The next morning, we said goodbye to our Montecatini hotel rooms. Enjoying aerial views of treetops and vineyards, we journeyed by bus up the mountain to Assisi. A guided tour through the quaint town shared the history and architecture. After some free time to clamber the cobblestones, pause for a prayerful moment, and browse the charming shops, we gathered again for the highlight – the Basilica of Saint Francis of Asissi. It was stunning! The Basilica is known for its extravagant stained-glass windows and double-level churches. Too soon, we were trekking back down the mountain and on to Rome

Our first day in Rome focused on the history of the region with visits to the Colosseum, revealing centuries of change, and the Roman Forum, full of beautiful gardens and ancient myths. However, regardless of the intriguing mystery of ancient Rome, all was quickly outshone by the Vatican. The privilege of singing Mass in St. Peter's Basilica is a lifetime highlight. As St. Augustine proclaimed, "Singing is like praying twice," so this Mass was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to unite with God through prayer and song. Our day concluded with our final performance at Chiesa di Sant'Ignazio di Loyola. Singing our Italian swan song was powerful, emotional, and fulfilling. It was the rawest, purest, and best performance of the tour.

Our final day in Rome was rooted in religion with the tour of the Vatican Museum. We were able to see the Hall of Maps and the Sistine Chapel, and we were guided through the Basilica of St. Peter. In the afternoon, we ran down the Spanish Steps. The group then visited the Trevi Fountain, where taking three coins in your right hand and throwing them over your left shoulder will grant you three wishes. One wish must be to return to Rome! God and His love echo through the streets of Italy, connecting us to our faith. We await our inevitable return (all Trevi fountain wishes must come true, after all).

Many people worked very hard to make this trip a success. Thank you, bus drivers and tour guides, for navigating, explaining, and teaching. Thank you, Lauralton, for providing us with this experience. Thank you chaperones for keeping us safe and on time. Thank you, Sarge, for coordinating the trip; we would never have made it to Italy, much less have made it back, without you. Lastly, thank you, parents, for supporting us through Lauralton, trusting us in Italy, and loving us across oceans. Thank you for an Italian adventure that we will never forget.
