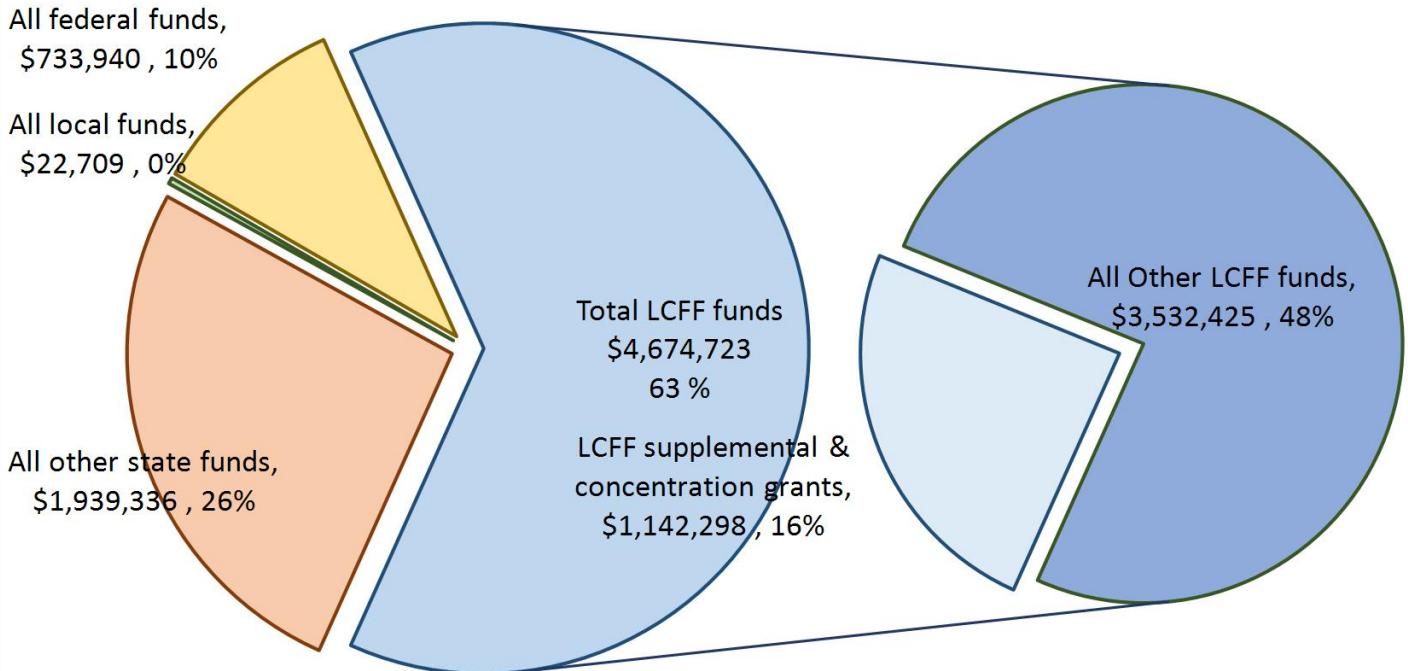

Projected Revenue by Fund Source

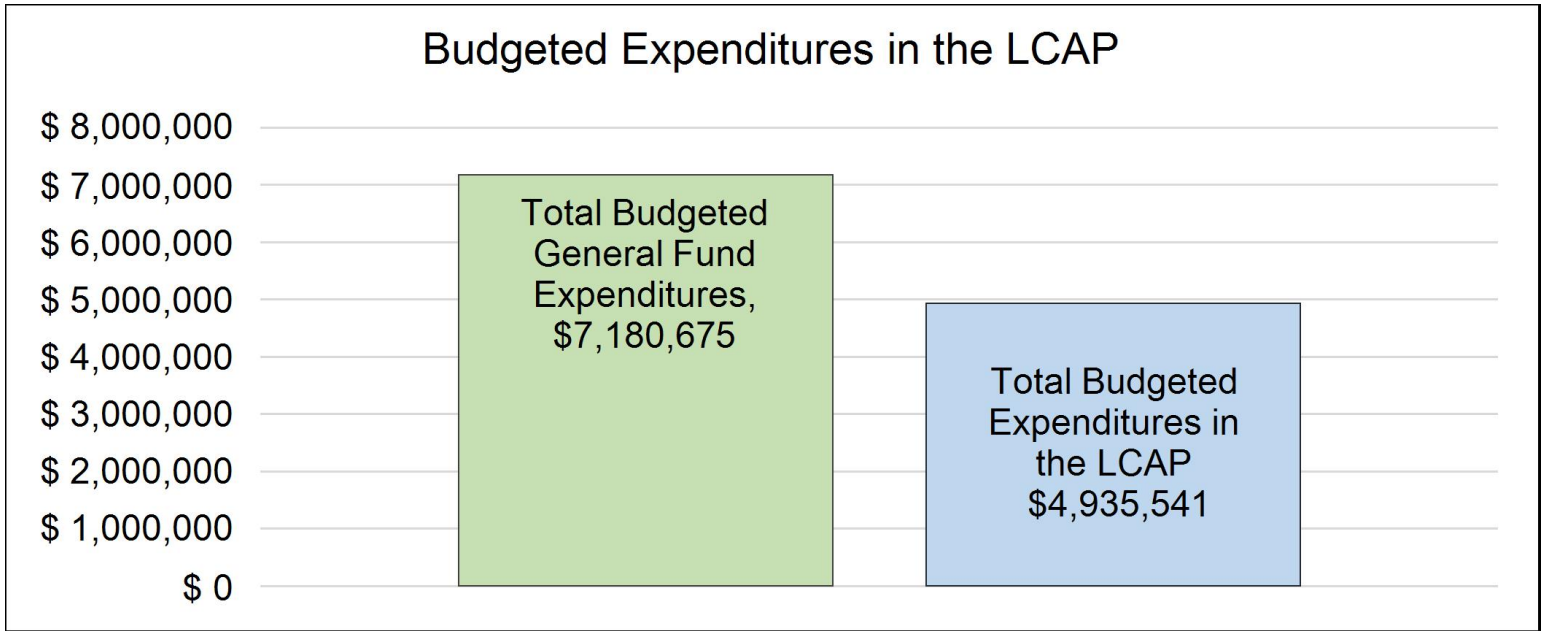


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Fenton STEM Academy expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Fenton STEM Academy is \$7,370,708, of which \$4,674,723 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1,939,336 is other state funds, \$22,709 is local funds, and \$733,940 is federal funds. Of the \$4,674,723 in LCFF Funds, \$1,142,298 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

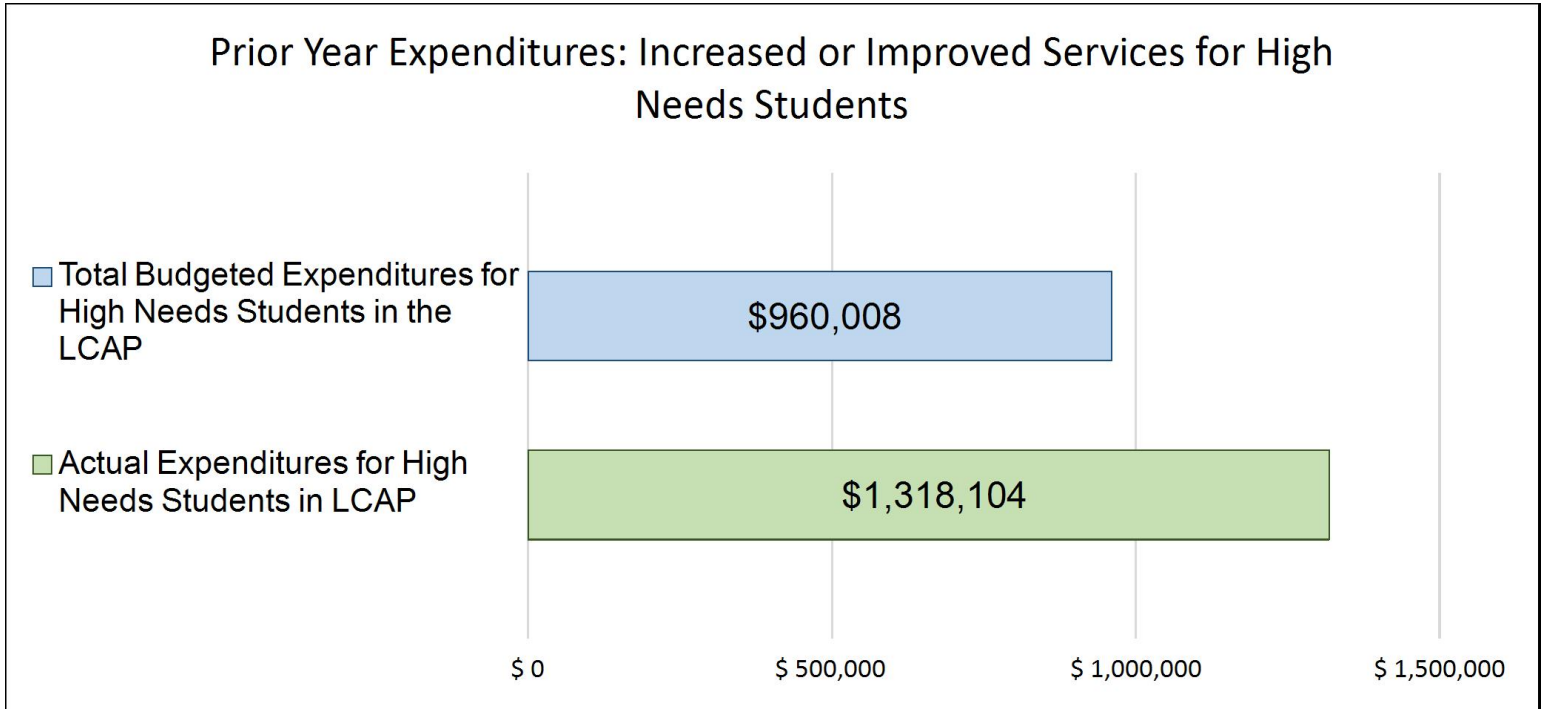

Plan Summary [2023-24]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA.

On August 17, 2015, Fenton STEM Academy opened in the east San Fernando Valley to serve students in grades kindergarten through fifth grades. Fenton STEM Academy (STEM) strives to become a catalyst for stimulating real world industry and college/university mentoring relationships. Building partnerships with colleges, universities, aerospace and engineering outreach programs continues to remain a schoolwide focus. These partnerships provide real-world learning experiences, creating a foundation of STEM content knowledge that will prepare and inspire generations of learners to meet the challenges of the global society through innovation, collaboration, and creative problem solving.

State reported demographics for STEM from the 2021-2022 school year shows 81.5% Hispanic, 10.6% White, 2.9% African American, .3% Asian and 2.3% Filipino. Of these students, approximately 18.5% are English Learners, 79.5% qualify for free or reduced price meals (socioeconomically disadvantaged), and .9% are identified foster youth. The Charter School is committed to serving a wide range of students that require a rigorous program that includes acceleration, differentiated instruction, and depth and complexity. As a conversion charter, the attendance area served by the school has remained constant with demographics reflective of the surrounding area.

The Charter School is a data-driven school that uses assessment data to understand and improve student and school performance. The assessment data (diagnostic, formative, and summative) helps the Charter School continuously plan, monitor, and improve academic programs. Staff reviews the previous spring’s state testing results to evaluate the school’s academic program and to chart a course for the new year based on students’ needs. Subgroups in need of intervention are identified and monitored. In addition to state testing, other assessments include publisher assessments, student work samples, and i-Ready Diagnostic assessments. Assessments are used to: Identify students and subgroups who need additional instruction or intervention; Prescribe a re-teaching or intervention focus for individual students; Identify professional development needs and target school resources.

The Charter School's educators believe it is essential to take a multifaceted approach to meet the needs of its diverse population. The Charter School addresses the social and emotional needs of all students. Teachers analyze data to determine each student's unique talents and needs. Students who are on grade level and approaching proficiency are targeted in the critical instructional areas that propel them for advancement in all areas. Students struggling with basic skills are targeted for support by a wide range of experts including Education Specialists, school counselor, school psychologist, speech pathologist, classroom teachers and administrators.

The Charter School created its own culture of awareness with caring, dedicated, and hardworking teachers serving the needs of our students. Many visitors, including the LAUSD Charter Schools Division oversight committee, WASC visiting committee, and the CDE have recognized the positive culture at the Charter School.

Reflections: Successes

The Fenton Charter Public Schools were identified as a "Gap-Buster" in the latest CREDO Report (2023). CREDO, is the Center for Research on Education Outcomes at Stanford University, which aims to improve empirical evidence about education reform and student performance at the primary and secondary levels. According to the study, "Gap-busting" refers to schools that have been able to close the gap in achieved educational equity by ensuring minority and poverty students learn on par with or better than their White peers interrupts or reduces the achievement gap. On page 126 of this CREDO Report, Fenton is identified as significantly improving outcomes for students in both Reading and Mathematics.

California School Dashboard data reveals positive performance. The growth of students in ELA and Math on the CA Dashboard is in alignment with the percentage of students and subgroups scoring standard met or exceeded on the CAASPP. Distance From Standards (DFS) reveals a slight decrease in ELA and Math. The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is evident in the increase in Chronic Absenteeism.

The Charter School takes a collaborative and systematic approach to track progress in implementing the state academic standards adopted by the State Board of Education. The Charter School's approach consists of informal and formal student assessment data, teacher observations, qualitative data from teachers and school leaders, school climate surveys, overall professional development ratings, artifacts and evidence of implementation from professional development sessions, and overall stakeholder feedback.

Accelerated Instruction Model (AIM)

The COVID-19 global pandemic has had a significant impact on the academic and social/emotional needs of our students. The Charter School received a significant amount of one-time funds to address the needs of students by providing acceleration, enrichment, and expanded learning opportunities for our children. During the 2022 school year, the Charter Schools piloted an Accelerated Instruction Model, referred as the "AIM" program. This instructional model was developed in response to student need existent prior to the pandemic, but

significantly more evident with the return to in person learning. Under this model, students are provided a 40 minute daily Acceleration Instructional Model (AIM) from their classroom teacher and pulled out to work directly with the Acceleration Specialist in small groups.

An Acceleration Specialist ensures a schoolwide process to include frequent and repeated assessment of student performance, data based decision making, and the use of multi-tiered, research based supports. In January of 2022, the Fenton Academies opened up this position and interviewed several candidates to lead the AIM program.

AIM is a multidimensional program designed on the concept of high expectations for all students and just in time supports. Students are provided with access to effective, grade level, Tier 1 instruction focused on the essential skills and concepts for that grade level. Instructional supports are based on evidence of what a student knows and what they need. The acceleration block provides more exposure to grade level essential skills and concepts by aligning supports with current classroom instruction. Much of the program is based on the readings from two texts: "Taking Action: A Handbook for RTI at Work™ (How to Implement Response to Intervention in Your School)", by Austin Buffum and "Learning in the Fast Lane: 8 Ways to Put ALL Students on the Road to Academic Success," by Suzy Pepper Rollins. Staff received formal professional development throughout January and student participation in the program began February 7, 2022. The schools continue to review AIM data and monitor the effectiveness of this program. Student outcomes and staff surveys indicate positive trends and higher levels of teacher collaboration.

Professional Learning Community (PLC) Implementation

The Charter School began extensive work implementing our new PLC initiative. The FCLA/STEM Guiding Coalition has met consistently since mid August to develop and collaborate on the PLC Action Plan (Q1-Q2). This detailed roll out plan includes an actionable guide to implementing the PLC process in our using the framework from The Learning by Doing handbook.

Teams at the Fenton Academies have been working on the following since August:

- *Defining the teams' purposes, attributes, norms and collective commitments;
- *Building consensus, collaborative discussions, and student centered tasks;
- *Reviewing 21-22 End of Year data, 22-23 Beginning of Year data, current Common Formative Assessment data ;
- *Development of grade level year long SMART goals;
- *Unpacking Essential Standards & Unit Planning;
- *Reviewing Acceleration Instruction Model (AIM) groupings, skills, lessons, and pre/post assessment data.

The Guiding Coalition meets often to review, discuss, and revise the various components of our school's action plan. Staff receive weekly professional development through staff meetings and grade levels are supported with the Acceleration Specialist (Elisa Vallejo) in attendance during weekly grade level PLC Collaboration meetings.

On Monday, January 9, 2023, staff participated in a full day of professional development dedicated to an PLC overview, Accelerated Instruction Model (AIM) update, a review of student progress, and next steps. The afternoon was dedicated to grade levels working in collaboration with one another for grade level needs. PD Day 5 Presentation to Staff (January, 9, 2023)

i-Ready Mathematics Program

The Fenton Charter Public Schools previously used “My Math” as the math curriculum. My Math was approved by the California Department of Education on January 15, 2014. This program was created and approved prior to the implementation of the Smarter Balanced Assessment Systems (SBAC), which started in the 2014-2015 school year. The current posted schedule anticipates that the next K-8 mathematics instructional materials adoption will be held in November 2024, which would delay the adoption of the next math curriculum until the 2025-2026 school year. During the 2021-2022 school year, the Fenton schools were invited to participate in the CalCurriculum Collaborative to develop a plan for the adoption of standards-aligned, high-quality mathematics instructional materials and articulate the role of instructional materials adoption and implementation as an adaptive change process centered on equitable student outcomes. A team of Fenton teachers, led by the Fenton Charter Public Schools Instructional Coach, piloted several math programs for several months. The team unanimously agreed the iReady Mathematics Curriculum would serve our students well and align with our existing iReady diagnostic assessments. The schools received board approval in April 2022 and began full implementation during the 2022-2023 school year. Preliminary results show an increase in mathematics growth. Teachers continue to receive professional development and support to better improve use of the program.

STEM Integrated Focus

STEM grade level challenges are featured weekly in the school newsletter. It is the vision of Fenton STEM Academy to implement a STEM infused instructional program which pairs with multiple subject matter. Providing students opportunities to connect Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics to daily lessons solidifies the interconnectedness of STEM concepts. 21st century jobs will mandate STEM skills.

In order to address specific areas of need, the Charter School analyzes data from stakeholders, student achievement, and culture through a variety of summative and formative tools. The Charter School uses Illuminate to collect, report, analyze, and interpret weekly data regarding student progress. All formative and summative classroom assessments are placed into Illuminate. State assessment data such as ELPAC and CAASPP are also imported into the database. Illuminate is an online platform that facilitates the collection, reporting, and analysis of periodic assessments. The ability to create custom reports allows educators to analyze data in a variety of ways. Common reports include measuring the progress of significant subgroups and using proficiency levels to guide MTSS decisions. The data can be analyzed by student, class, grade-level, or schoolwide to determine areas of strengths and needs.

The Charter School continues to use an inclusive governance structure that requires participation by all full-time employees and encourages participation by all part-time employees, parents, and community members. This unique governance structure has been sustained since the initial charter submitted as a conversion of the first Fenton Charter Public School, FACS, in 1993. This structure was designed to ensure the school community and all its stakeholders were well-informed, highly responsible, and knowledgeable. Four governing committees (Finance and Safety Committee; Instruction Committee; Personnel Committee; and Parent Advocacy Committee) review and recommend policies and programs for implementation to the final decision-making body, the Fenton Charter Public Schools Board of Directors. Most aspects of STEM's operations are guided by committee recommendations. The committees each have co-chairs that provide leadership of each committee, the majority of whom are classroom teachers. All full-time certificated staff are required to participate in at least one committee as a voting member. This allows for all staff to be well-informed and involved in current and future school policies, events, and planning. Parents and community stakeholders are welcome and encouraged to be voting members of any of the committees as long as they are consistent with their participation and adhere to the committee norms. The committees all follow similar rules found in Robert's Rules of Order.

In addition to the four committees, the school also has the English Language Advisory Committee (ELAC) and the School Site Council (SSC). The ELAC is a committee formed to advise the instruction committee and SSC on all matters regarding the English Learners. The SSC reviews and approves the LCAP and any school plan updates including the school budget. Final recommendations are made to the committees and the FCPS Governing Board of Directors.

All school's committees consistently review, modify, and adopt school plans, new curriculum, materials, and school culture to improve student learning and overall success. All committee approvals are submitted via agenda and minutes to the FCPS Governing Board of Directors for approval. The process has been very successful and allows for a high level of well-informed stakeholders and provides time for collaboration.

A critical piece of collaboration at the Charter School are the roles and responsibilities of the Lead Teachers that are chosen for each grade level. The selection of Lead Teachers is part of the staff reorganization process. Lead Teachers are recommended by peers and voted by colleagues at the grade they will be serving. The Lead Teacher role is critical because those chosen will lead the grade level for the entire school year and are part of the leadership team of the school. Lead Teachers guide the grade level, participate and present on the Instruction Committee, and review schoolwide performance data collaboratively.

The minutes of the meetings are shared with the Board of Directors at each Board meeting. The following were the board meetings for the 2022-2023 school year.

This system of governance allows for a collaborative approach to decision-making and ensures that the Fenton Charter Public Schools Board of Directors is aware of the site-based decisions and needs. All full-time faculty and staff complete an annual preference survey to identify their top three committee preferences. Once the committee roster has been finalized, staff members with permanent status can be nominated to hold the position of chairperson. Then, a full-staff vote or a vote of confidence will take place to confirm the nomination. Finally, at the first committee meeting of the year, the committee chair will make a motion to identify and approve a secretary for the year. The secretary will keep minutes of each meeting, post the unapproved minutes at the school site, and share the minutes with all Fenton Charter Public School employees via email.

All school committees consistently review, modify, and adopt school plans, new curriculum, materials, and school culture to improve student learning and overall success. All committee approvals are submitted via agenda and minutes to the FCPS Governing Board of Directors for approval. The process has been very successful and allows for a high level of well-informed stakeholders and provides time for collaboration.

In addition, the school also has grade level lead teachers and focus lead teachers. Grade Level Lead Teachers are permanent status teachers who are nominated by fellow teachers to serve as the lead for each grade level team. Once a candidate has been nominated, they must accept the nomination, complete an application, and present their vision for the grade level to the grade level team. Finally, a grade level vote or vote of confidence will be held to identify the lead teacher for each grade level. These grade level leads meet with the administrative team on a weekly basis to identify needs and best instructional practices. Additionally, all lead teachers within the organization will meet multiple times per year with the Instructional Coach and Teachers on Special Assignment to identify essential standards for each grade level and plan each trimester's assessments to ensure alignment within the organization.

The Charter School sent out surveys and video recordings to staff, students and families to gather input on items to meet the unique needs of their children. Information sent to parents was translated into Spanish and made available on a number of platforms including Zoom, YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter. Surveys were sent out to families through email and text messages to ensure families were able to access the content.

CAASPP Assessments (Status and Growth)

English Language Arts (ELA)

The percentage of students and subgroups scoring standard met or exceeded in ELA appears to have flatlined at 48%. However, overall scores appear to remain above the state average (State Average: 47%). Students with Disabilities (SWD) have demonstrated growth compared to baseline testing in 2018-2019.

Mathematics

The percentage of students and subgroups scoring standard met or exceeded continues to increase since baseline testing during the 2018-2019. Despite the pandemic, the school has the highest percentages of students and subgroups scoring standard met or exceeded in math since baseline testing during the 2018-2019 school year. Students have grown by 10% comparing the 2022-2023 school year with the 2018-2019 school year.

CA Dashboard Data

The growth of students in ELA and Math on the CA Dashboard is in alignment with the percentage of students and subgroups scoring standard met or exceeded on the CAASPP. Distance From Standards (DFS) reveals a slight decrease in ELA and Math.

The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is evident in the increase in Chronic Absenteeism.

CAST Assessment

The percentage of students and subgroups scoring standard met or exceeded appears to have declined during the 2022-2023 school year.

RFEP Rates

The reclassification criteria set forth in both California Education Code Section 313 and Title 5 California Code of Regulations Section 11303 changed reclassification criteria by requiring a student to obtain an overall Performance Level of 4 in order to be considered for reclassification. RFEP rates have decreased with the implementation of this criteria. It is difficult to determine the success of our RFEP rate as the state has not yet released RFEP rates for 2021-2022 and 2022-2023. The Charter School continues to reclassify students.

ELPAC

It is difficult to determine the outcomes of the performance of our students on the Summative English Language Proficiency Assessment for California (ELPAC) given changes to RFEP criteria, impacts of the pandemic, and the lack of state comparison data. The percentage of students that have advanced at least one performance level descriptor (PLD) on the ELPAC has increased over the past two years.

INTERNAL Data

i-Ready Assessments (Status and Growth)

Status

The percentage of students scoring at or above grade level has increased from baseline scores in ELA and Mathematics. The Charter School is experiencing the highest scores in ELA. Students appeared to score higher on the i-Ready assessments compared to the CAASPP.

Growth

The Charter School has met the Typical Growth Target rate of 50% and is showing gains in ELA and Mathematics for all subgroups. Typical Growth for students is above 60%.

The Charter School takes a collaborative and systematic approach to track progress in implementing the state academic standards adopted by the State Board of Education. The Charter School's approach consists of informal and formal student assessment data, teacher observations, qualitative data from teachers and school leaders, school climate surveys, overall professional development ratings, artifacts and evidence of implementation from professional development sessions, and overall stakeholder feedback.

Lead Teachers for each grade level, including special education, create pacing and assessment plans annually. Lead Teachers share assessment choices and data vertically to ensure consistency. Lead Teachers also meet with administration regularly to discuss grade level needs. The entire team also participates in monthly Instruction Committee meetings where topics are discussed, providing all stakeholders a “voice” and new plans are approved. The Instruction Committee provides monthly formal minutes to the Charter School staff, FCPS organization via email and the FCPS Board of Directors at the monthly Board meetings.

The chronic absenteeism rate is expected to decline sharply for the 2022-2023 school year based on internal estimates.

The Charter School analyzes data from stakeholders, student achievement, and culture through a variety of summative and formative tools. The Charter School uses Illuminate to collect, report, analyze, and interpret weekly data regarding student progress. All formative and summative classroom assessments are placed into Illuminate. State assessment data such as ELPAC and CAASPP are also imported into the database. Illuminate is an online platform that facilitates the collection, reporting, and analysis of periodic assessments. The ability to

create custom reports allows educators to analyze data in a variety of ways. Common reports include measuring the progress of significant subgroups and using proficiency levels to guide MTSS decisions. The data can be analyzed by student, class, grade-level, or schoolwide to determine areas of strengths and needs. It can also be analyzed over multiple years to follow trends. All of the reports are used to inform instruction and determine allocation of resources.

The Director writes a weekly newsletter to engage parents and families student integration. The Director also sends frequent phone and text message in an effort to maintain frequent and relevant communication.

Grade level parent orientation meetings are held during the first few weeks of school. These meetings are to provide information regarding instructional and behavioral expectations as well as form a clear line of communication between home and school.

Families attend parent/teacher conferences formally twice a year, and informally as needed. Parents are welcomed to chaperone field trips, assist with class parties, and host home visits. In addition, families are welcomed on campus on a monthly basis to attend award assemblies that celebrate student success.

Professional development activities are determined by the advisory committees and are selected based on a review of student assessments, new programs and policies being implemented by the state or federal government, or the specific curricular needs of the student body. As needs overlap, professional development will overlap at the five Fenton schools. For example, there are often different needs for new hires, and one school may schedule a presenter who will present a topic that is most relevant to new hires. All schools will arrange to send their new teachers to the one site for that particular presentation. The same is true for a presentation on new adoptions. All Lead Teachers may attend a presentation at one site, or one grade level may gather at one site. This type of scheduling encourages faculty with similar needs and interests at different sites to meet, interact, and share resources and knowledge. It is also a better use of fiscal and material resources.

The Charter School involves all stakeholders in the monitoring process of students. The governance board receives reports of students' progress at the monthly board meetings. The staff looks at student data at grade-level meetings multiple times during the month. Parent orientation meetings are conducted at the beginning of every school year for all grade levels. Teachers conduct parent conference twice yearly to review student progress as well as monthly progress reports to report student progress toward mastery of standards. The school also has monthly student awards assemblies to recognize positive citizenship, achievement, work habits and attendance.

The Charter School provides ongoing trainings, professional development, and resources to support families to understand and exercise their legal rights and advocate for their own students and all students. The Charter School will continue to seek innovative and unique ways to increase and improve the engagement of underrepresented families.

The Charter School will implement the following goals and actions to meet the academic and social/emotional needs of our English learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged and Foster Youth.

Goal 1: Action 1 – Planned services for this action item include additional school psychologist and school counselor support, additional special education support, highly qualified instructional assistants, Lead Teacher stipends, Instructional Coach, Professional Development Days, 4 Extra Instructional Days, instructional materials for intervention and enrichment, and a reduction in class size to keep class sizes between 20-24 students. This smaller class size will ensure support staff are able to work in small groups to provide explicit instruction in English Language Arts, Mathematics, English Language Development, and differentiated instruction to increase or improve services for Foster Youth, English Learners, and Low-Income Students.

Goal 2: Action 1 – Planned services for this action item include a Parent Center Director.

Goal 2: Action 2 – Planned services for this action item include an Attendance Manager, Administrator focused on Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS), and a School Nurse.

Goal 2: Action 3 – Planned services for this action item includes funds for field trips and vendors to provide enhanced learning opportunities through enriching life experiences.

Goal 3: Action 2 - Planned services for this action item include professional development for all staff members on strategies to meet the academic and social/emotional needs of our English learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged and Foster Youth.

Goal 3: Action 4 – Planned services for this action item include enhanced technology to customize and individualize instruction.

The Charter School has a detailed plan to increase services for foster youth, English learners, and low-income students. The Charter School staff will take on a “triage” approach to screen student need, apply appropriate tiered instruction, monitor student achievement, and revise application of instruction as needed. Based on the analysis of summative and formative assessments, targeted intervention and acceleration will be provided. Targeted instruction will be provided to students at their level and address student specific needs, focusing on skills needed to master grade level content in language arts, mathematics, and English language development. This accelerated instruction will take place during the instructional day and enable a wide range of services from general education teachers, special education teachers, support staff, and administration. A strategic instructional program requires a multi-tiered model of instructional delivery responding to the individual need of each child.

The Charter School has provided all English learners, foster youth and low-income students with an iPad and a Mobile WiFi Hotspot to engage in distance learning. Teachers have incorporated Universal Design for Learning (UDL) into their distance learning plans for synchronous and asynchronous instruction. Teachers planned and implemented synchronous lessons through a co-teaching format to provide small group support and designated ELD. Students are provided opportunities to engage in Designated and Integrated ELD Daily. All certificated and classified staff worked in harmony to meet the needs of English learners, foster youth and low-income students. The Charter School has established a repository of web pages, web-based services, and other resources for teachers to support English learners, foster youth and low-income students.

The Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) requires local educational agencies (LEAs) to engage their local educational partners in an annual planning process to evaluate their progress within eight state priority areas encompassing all statutory metrics (COEs have 10 state priorities). LEAs document the results of this planning process in the LCAP using the template adopted by the State Board of Education.

The LCAP development process serves three distinct, but related functions:

 - This amount is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) subtracted from the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4)
- 5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (%)
 - This amount is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column
- 8. Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (%)
 - This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column
- Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8)

- 10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 + Carryover %)
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- 11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- 12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)
