#### In Conversation with... Mr Aitchison, Head Science Technician

#### Tell us about your role and the wider department...

I look after the Science Technician team, we're responsible for preparing the materials and solutions needed for practical science lessons, as well as testing experiments in advance to make sure they will work correctly in lessons (and in the time allocated). We often help with suggestions for practical demonstrations and experiments that will fit a lesson theme. I also look after budgets and health and safety for the department, as well as care for our resident spiders!

As well as your role as Head Science Technician, you lead the World Challenge event that is happening over the Summer - can you tell us a bit more about that?

World Challenge happens every two years, and it is a trip for our Year 11, 12 and 13 students in various countries around the world - this year we are visiting eSwatini and Mozambique. World Challenge is not just a regular school trip; one of the things I like about it is that it is completely student-led. They are entrusted with every aspect of their trip, from fundraising for the trip itself, to budgeting once they are there, and even planning meals.



Once they are on location, the students embark on a community project - this year they are working on marine and savannah conservation projects - as well as taking part in some fun and challenging excursions. This will be my ninth World Challenge!

What would you say to any pupil who is considering taking part in World Challenge?

I would say definitely do it! It's a great experience, everyone who has taken part

has really enjoyed the experience and got a lot out of it. Even though you might be nervous at the start, you will soon find you grow in confidence and make some amazing memories.

#### What part of your job do you like the best?

Aside from World Challenge, I love when I get to take classes, such as microbiology, and enjoy working as a team with the teaching staff. It's such a nice feeling to see a theory click in a pupil's mind.

### Prize Giving

A real highlight of this half term was our Senior School Prize Giving Ceremony, where pupils from Years 7 - 10 and students from Year 12 in the Sixth Form were rewarded for their exceptional hard work and successes, both inside and outside of the classroom. ### Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

As the summer approaches, parents can be faced with the dilemma of appropriate supervision for their children during the holidays. Whilst there is no minimum legal age for a child to be left home alone, it is illegal to leave a child alone if it puts them at risk. As all children mature at different rates, the NSPCC has a helpful tool to help parents decide when the time is right for a child to be 'Home or out alone'.

The charity advises that children under the age of 12 should not be left home alone for a long period of time and that those children under the age of 16 should not be

left alone overnight.

The summer holiday also provides an opportunity for teenagers to have more freedom and 'let their hair down', but this age group is prone to risk taking behaviour, especially when egged on by their peers. It is important to speak to your child about the risks around alcohol and substance use, particularly near water as alcohol consumption reduces coordination, impairs judgement and affects the body's ability to regulate temperature. Open water swimming can pose further risks from harmful bacteria, pollution, strong currents, submerged rubbish and cold water

shock. The RNLI guidance for open water swimming encourages swimmers to prepare thoroughly, 'respect the water' and 'know your limits'. More information on water safety, including 'float to survive' can be found here. https://rnli.org/safety/chooseyour-activity/open-water-swimming#
