

Career Infosheet Guide

The purpose of the Career Infosheets is to provide information about specific skills, related academic activities, courses, career personality traits, work-based learning opportunities, credential opportunities, and career pathways for each Great Oaks program. The information provided outlines recommended skills/abilities that a student currently possesses or can develop through instruction and lab activities. We want students to be successful in whatever Great Oaks career program they choose.

ESSENTIAL SKILLS

The Essential Skills listed on each Career Infosheet are derived from the O*Net OnLine that are divided into four primary ability categories:

Cognitive – abilities that influence the acquisition and application of knowledge and problem-solving

Psychomotor – abilities that influence strength, endurance, flexibility, balance and coordination

Physical – abilities that influence the capacity to manipulate and control objects

Sensory – abilities that influence visual, auditory and speech perception

Program-specific ability elements from each category are represented in Career Infosheet sheets to provide the overarching skills required for success in each career path.

ACADEMIC SKILLS

The Academic Skills listed on each Career Infosheet are derived from the ACT WorkKeys areas of:

Applied Mathematics – critical thinking, mathematical reasoning and problem-solving techniques

Workplace Documents – use of workplace documents to make job-related decisions to solve problems

Graphic Literacy – comprehension of graphical materials used to solve work-related problems

Career tech instructors provided specific examples of routine academic-related tasks and activities that students will encounter during lab and on the job.

COURSES

The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) provides a list of state-approved career and technical education courses used to organize a career tech program. Each Great Oaks campus-based lab is comprised of at least four courses taken over two years. Students are required to sit for end-of-course exams (WebXam) for each career tech course. These exams are similar to academic end-of-course exams like algebra I and English language arts. WebXam results along with work-based learning and post-program placement comprise the performance level in the Career Technical Education Quality Program Review.

WORK-BASED LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Federal law defines work-based learning opportunities as “sustained interactions with industry or community professionals in real workplace settings, to the extent practicable”. Students at Great Oaks have the opportunity to accumulate 250, or more, hours of work-based learning that aligns with the career path they chose. These experiences are designed to provide authentic learning opportunities that link academic, technical and professional skills. Collaboration between our career instructors and local businesses provide students experiential learning in their career area of choice.

CAREER & COLLEGE READY

Industry-recognized credentials/licenses are a great way to prepare students for success after high school. Great Oaks students have the opportunity to earn industry-recognized credentials/licenses in their program of choice. These credentials/licenses show that the student has met certain standards employers can use to verify their job-readiness. Additionally, some career technical education courses are eligible for career-technical credit transfer to Ohio public colleges and universities. Students who successfully complete certain career technical education courses, pass end-of-course exams, and in some cases, earn an industry credential are eligible to earn college credit while in high school. Career-Technical Assurance Guides (CTAGs) provide students a jump on their college career.

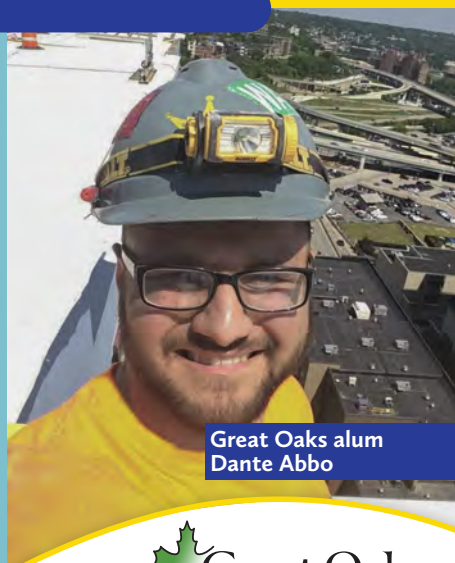

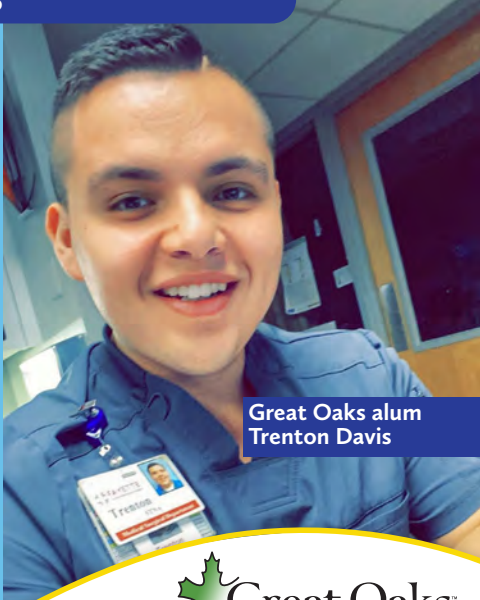

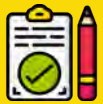
