DISTRICT HIRES GPD GROUP TO AID IN DEVELOPMENT OF NEW FACILITIES MASTER PLAN

The Lakewood City Schools has secured the services of the architectural firm GPD Group to conduct a facility study to assist in the assessment of the current use of District facilities and explore opportunities to maximize the use of those facilities

and resources. The study will include an assessment of existing conditions and use, a review of educational programming needs, a review of enrollment projections, and the facilitation of a Facility Study Task Force to provide feedback and develop

recommendations for facility improvements.

"As educational leaders, we have a responsibility to care for, protect, and maintain our facilities and buildings," said Superintendent Maggie Niedzwiecki. "Additionally, we have

the responsibility to periodically review the use of our facilities and the role each facility plays in helping us achieve our mission in ways that are financially responsible, sustainable, and provide the greatest opportunities for

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recognition. Students grades preschool-12 are encouraged to submit works in seven arts areas: literature, dance choreography, film/video production, musical composition, photography, visual arts and special artist. All entries must follow a chosen theme, which this year was "Show Your Voice!"

Trouts in the Classroom: Our Vision of a Lakewood Grad at Work



In early March, students from Lakewood High's AP Environmental and Biology classes experienced a hands-on, real-world lesson when they traveled to the Emerald Necklace Marina in the Metroparks and released young rainbow trout fingerlings into the Rocky River. From there, the fingerlings will make their way to Lake Erie, grow and come back in the fall to spawn. Prior to the release, the students tested the water using skills learned in class to make sure it was safe to release the fish.

The trout eggs were given to the school by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. The AP class raised them in a 60-gallon tank in the classroom until they were given permission by the ODNR to release them in March.

The release was made possible by the state

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) Program, which provided an opportunity for our students to witness the growth of trout from the egg stage to the fingerling stage (2-4 in.)

Said teacher Rita Chahda-Gonzalez: "The exciting thing was seeing them take ownership of all the testing and monitoring, and most importantly the release of the baby trout into a state-designated lake or stream, each one to face the hazards and challenges of life in the wild."

The program provided Lakewood students valuable real-world experience and was a great reflection of our global citizen and collaboration competencies of our Vision of a Lakewood Graduate!



BADAT NAMED NEW W. SHORE LEADER

Lakewood High House Principal Yakoob Badat has been named the next coordinator of career-technical education beginning Aug. 1. Badat will replace Bill DiMascio as the next leader of the West Shore Career-Technical District.

Badat has served as an LHS house principal since he joined the District in 2010. Before coming to Lakewood, Badat served as 9th grade principal at Cleveland's John Marshall High School, where he also served as an intervention specialist.

In addition to his work in secondary education, Badat brings a wealth of global experience to his position. He is a former Peace Corps volunteer and founder of the Nanze Children's Services in Malawi, Africa. Nanze's mission is to provide initiatives in education, water, and poverty reduction for Malawians.

NEW ELEMENTARY SPECIALS SCHEDULE TO BE IMPLEMENTED WITH 2023-24 SCHOOL YEAR

The District has announced that it will be making a change to the specials rotation at the elementary level next school year in order to provide a better balance of time with each special and to introduce two new specials that are important for 21st century learning.

The schedule was developed and put forth by a co-facilitated committee, led by the director of teaching and learning and a teacher, and comprised of a selection of teachers from each specialty area, classroom teachers and principals.

Currently, our elementary students have music class every other day all year, three grading periods of physical education opposite music, and one nine-week period of art on non-music days. This schedule has been in place for almost 20 years and was the result of trying to add some art to the elementary school day when two physical education teachers retired at that time. Since then, the learning needs and expectations of our students have grown and evolved.

With technology so readily available, digital and informational literacy, internet safety, and computer skills have become more important. In addition, our economy is driven by quicker advancements and an ever-changing job market making design process

thinking especially important for our students and their futures.

These needs and others have carved away from our instructional time. This, combined with an interest in exploring the possibilities of a more equitable split of time with our current specials (music, art, and physical education), drove the decision to explore a new specials schedule with a committee.

The group explored what other districts offered or were looking to provide for their students. Parents were surveyed (88% of respondents favored a new schedule), ideas were collected, discussed, and prioritized, which ultimately led to a

recommendation to provide our students in kindergarten through fourth grade a five-day rotation of specials that will include: music, art, PE, STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math), and library - information and digital literacy (taught by a certified teacher). Fifth grade students will still have two days of instrumental music along with art, physical education, and STEM.

The change will not cause any job loss. The District will hire additional staff to meet the needs of the new schedule. More detailed information about the transition including a list of FAQs can be found on the District website at lakewoodcityschools.org.
