## **Directors' Note**

TRACY: I'm all for integration – it's the New Frontier!

VELMA: Not in Baltimore, it isn't.

It's been a couple of years since our senior pupils have put on a musical as 'big and beautiful' as *Hairspray*, but when we look a little further – past the beehives, the spectroscopic costumes, those zany 60s colour palettes, and those irresistible toe-tapping numbers – we realise that this multi-award-winning musical is rooted in subject matter that is surprisingly hard-hitting: segregation, prejudice, racism and body image stereotypes. Somehow, a story set in 1960s Baltimore manages to feel just as profound for our modern-day context, doesn't it?

Perhaps this is the enduring quality of *Hairspray* that made it such a knockout success when it premiered on Broadway in 2002, winning the Tony Award for Best Musical, Best Book and Best Score: beyond all its period glitz and nostalgic glamour, this is show that has a very real and very admirable heart. Its 'heroes' are earnest and courageous; its 'villains' are deliciously detestable; and its ultimate message of inclusion, we hope, is one that you will find irresistible when we reach the show's famous final number.

The origins of *Hairspray* are not as widely known as the musical versions made famous by the likes of John Travolta and Michael Ball. Rather than being conceived as a musical, Hairspray instead began life as a 1988 film, written and directed by John Waters and starring Ricki Lake (yes, that Ricki Lake) and Debbie Harry (yes, Blondie) alongside Hollywood heavyweights such as Jerry Stiller and Michael St. Gerard. It would become much more of a cult success than a box office one: when the story was therefore adapted fourteen years later by Marc O'Donnell and Thomas Meehan, it already enjoyed a very faithful following. Once Marc Shaiman (most recently Oscar-nominated for Mary Poppins Returns) joined the team and added his sensational score in collaboration with lyricist. Scott Wittman. the musical was set for success. It was this Broadway version that would later be adapted for a return to the big screen in the 2007 Travolta-led film that perhaps most of us know best.

With a few Whitgift productions now under our collective belts, we jumped at the chance to take this production forward together, though of course this was not a two-person feat: Mr Bhatti and Mrs Binacchi have served as Artistic Directors for the production, sketching concept art, creating mood boards, and working on delivering the 'Sixties aesthetic' we needed: Mr Crook. Mr Jenkinson, Mr Hill and Mr Crestani transformed these concepts into stunning reality, working tirelessly (often long past everyone else had gone home for the night) to provide the cast with a 'West-End' experience; Mr Motley, as Musical Director, has guided the company with a natural confidence that belies the fact this is his debut musical: and Miss Seal, unseen though not unsung, has brought much-appreciated veteran leadership backstage.



Of course, this is a school production, and our greatest privilege has been to work alongside such a talented, funny and dedicated cast of pupils from across Whitgift, Old Palace and WAVPA, as well as a troupe of formidable musicians, who have helped to bring this production to life. Though the rehearsal process has been rigorous and demanding – certainly putting our stamina to the test – it has been a joy to see the cast embrace the challenge, tapping into seemingly-bottomless reserves of energy to deliver this show to you all.

And so, for the next two hours, we invite you to forget about a wintery Croydon evening, and instead backcomb your beehives, style your kisscurls, put on your Buster Browns, and come dance with us. After all – you can't stop the beat.
