

Highland Park First Grade Reading Curriculum

Standard Title: Literature

Course Information:

Course: First Grade Reading

Length: One Year - 90 minutes per day

Brief Basic Description: Literature at the first-grade level focuses on strengthening students' ability to ask and answer questions about key details, retell stories, describe characters, settings, and major events in a story. Students will do this by exploring a variety of books, and poems.

ESSENTIAL UNDERSTANDING:

First Grade Literature Curriculum is Designed to:

- *Ask and answer questions.
- *Retell stories, demonstrating understanding of the main lesson.
- *Describe characters, settings, and major events of a story.
- *Read poetry appropriate for grade level.
- *Identify who is telling the story.
- *Compare and contrast stories.

Course Objectives and Expectations:

1. Ask and answer questions about details in a reading selection.
2. Retell stories, including details.
3. Explain the differences between books that tell stories, and books that give information.
4. Compare and contrast stories, or poems, on the same topic.

Student Objectives:

- *I can ask and answer questions about text.
- *I can retell the main idea of stories.
- *I can describe characters, settings, and major events in stories.
- *I can find words that show feelings and create a picture in my mind.
- *I can explain the difference between fiction and non-fiction.
- *I can name who is telling the story.
- *I can explain how characters and their experiences are the same and different.

*With help, I can read grade-level stories and poems.

Pacing:
