



Partnerships

- Children's Literacy Initiative (CLI)
 - 3-year partnership that provides a full-time Early Literacy Specialist to support PAC and STEAM (Grades K-3)
 - Support with building teacher and instructional leadership capacity, focusing on best practices, small group instruction, and guided reading
- Teach for America (TFA) Ignite Tutoring
 - TFA Fellows (seniors in college) will provide small group virtual learning experiences for students in an effort to accelerate learning
 - o 10 Fellows Per Semester Each for 3 hours per week



Summer Opportunities

Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP)

- Ms. Murray worked with Newark Youth One Stop to establish MPTCS as a work site. She will serve as the site supervisor.
- SYEP site will employ 61 students (11 slots allocated for Students with disabilities).
- Over 45 students have already been confirmed to begin working in July and the others are currently finalizing their applications.
- SYEP Newark Youth One Stop Career Center

Princeton Blairstown Center

- Developed a partnership with the Princeton Blairstown Center Summer Bridge Program Combating Summer Learning Loss
- 60 students will participate in a one-week leadership and academic enrichment program that is designed to serve young people from historically marginalized communities, free of charge.
- Summer Bridge provides access and equity to transformative outdoor experiences and helps students with the following: summer learning loss and 21st Century skills like cooperation, communication, creativity, and critical-thinking; and develop climate and culture by forming positive, supportive relationships with peers and adults.





Attendance & Enrollment

- Average Daily Attendance (ADA)
 - O District 21-22 SY **87.10%**; 20-21 SY 81.06%
 - STEAM ADA 90.39%
 - High School ADA **86.91%**
 - PAC ADA **84.13%**
- Current Chronic Absenteeism Rate (Year to Date) 49.5%
 - Significantly lower than what the CMO presented last year, which was 72.4%
- We are doing far better than what was previously reported, but there is still <u>great</u> work to be done. COVID significantly impacted our numbers, which are transparent and authentic.

COVID-19 Updates

- Essex County is currently in the "medium activity" range according to the NJ Statewide Activity Report - Week ending June 23rd
- Since our last board meeting, we have had a total of 13 cases
 - 9 Staff Members
 - 4 Students

1. COVID-19 Community Levels used for Most Settings



Layered prevention strategies can help limit severe disease and reduce potential strain on the healthcare system. <u>CDC COVID-19 Community Levels</u> are a tool to help communities and individuals determine what prevention meeasures to take.

The COVID-19 community level is determined by the higher of the new hospital admissions and inpatient beds metrics, based on the current level of new cases per 100,000 population in the past 7 days. COVID-19 community levels are classified as low, medium, or high as follows:
