Sample Works Cited – begins on the FIRST line of a new page

Header – Add
after your works
cited is attached
to your paper.

1 inch
margins

Title is centered—NO bold,
underline, or italics

COPY/PASTE!*

All entries end
with a period

MLA date format:
day month year

Check for proper
capitalization of
all titles.

In-text citations will
include the first
word/words from the
entry—either the author's
last name OR the first
word(s) of the title
(through the first key
noun) with its proper title
formatting (" " or italics):
i.e., "Monitoring"

Databases provide you the works cited entry! 😊 When you copy and paste from a database, **check and correct** the following:

- italics
- Proper capitalization of titles (and that title is not cut off!)
- No http:// on URLs
 - No hyperlinks (unless your teacher asks for them)
- Punctuation
- MLA date format for ALL dates
 - Day month year
 - 9 Feb. 2019
 - Fall 2020
 - Include all portions of date given, including seasons
- Proper abbreviations
 - p. vs. pp.
 - p. 7
 - pp. 35-9
 - pp. 124+
 - months
 - Jan. Feb. Mar. Apr. Aug. Sept. Oct. Nov. Dec.
 - May June July

Fix this to proper title CAPs
"Books Are Often Banned."

Correct all errors with periods/commas and quotation marks. "...Banned."

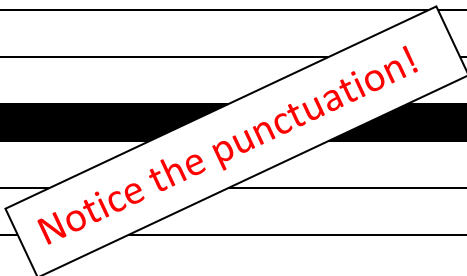
Be sure *italics* transfer to your works cited page! Some "paste" options remove them!

 - Proper spelling out of database title, for ex. *SIRS Discoverer*
 - Full information regarding original container (check actual source)
