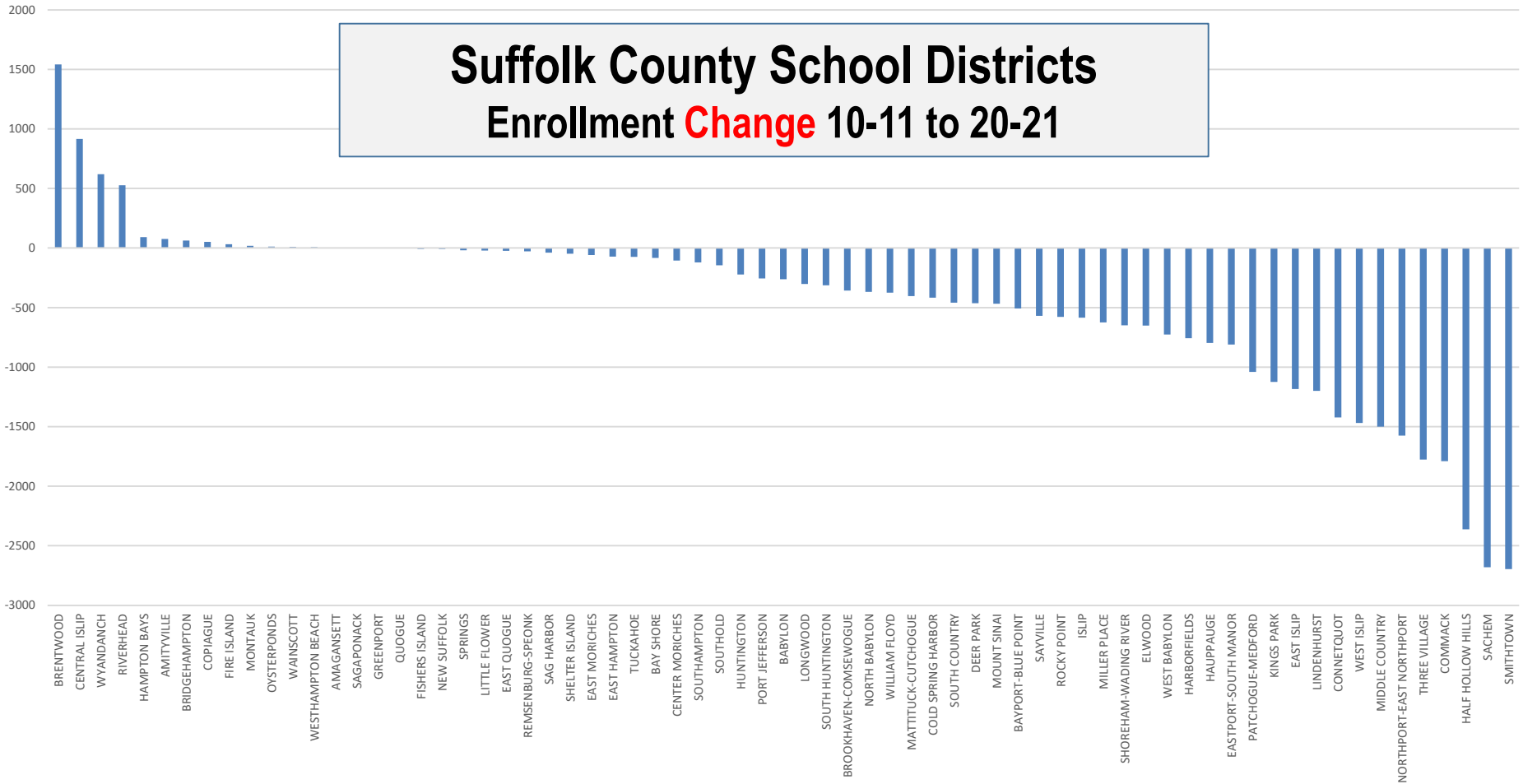

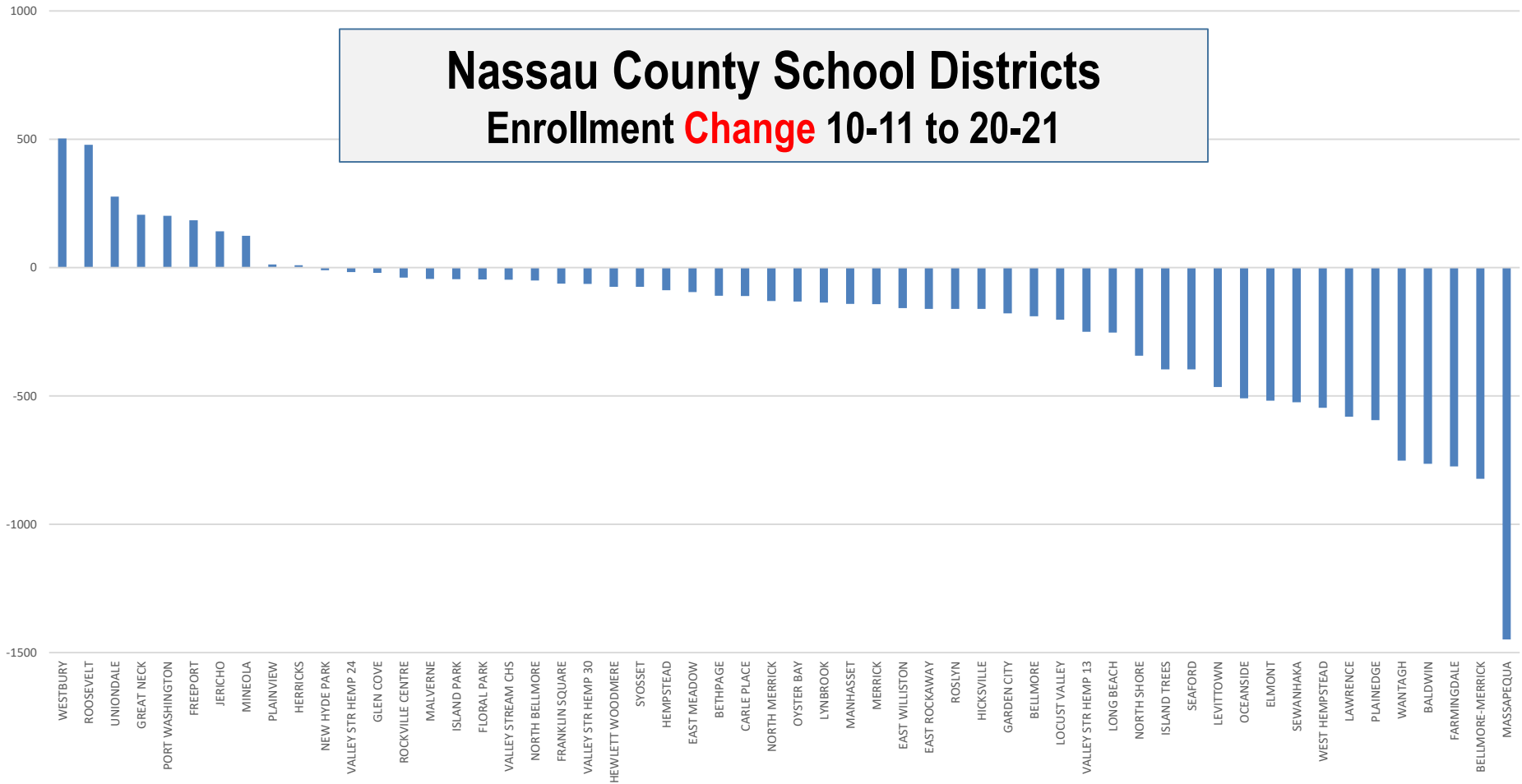

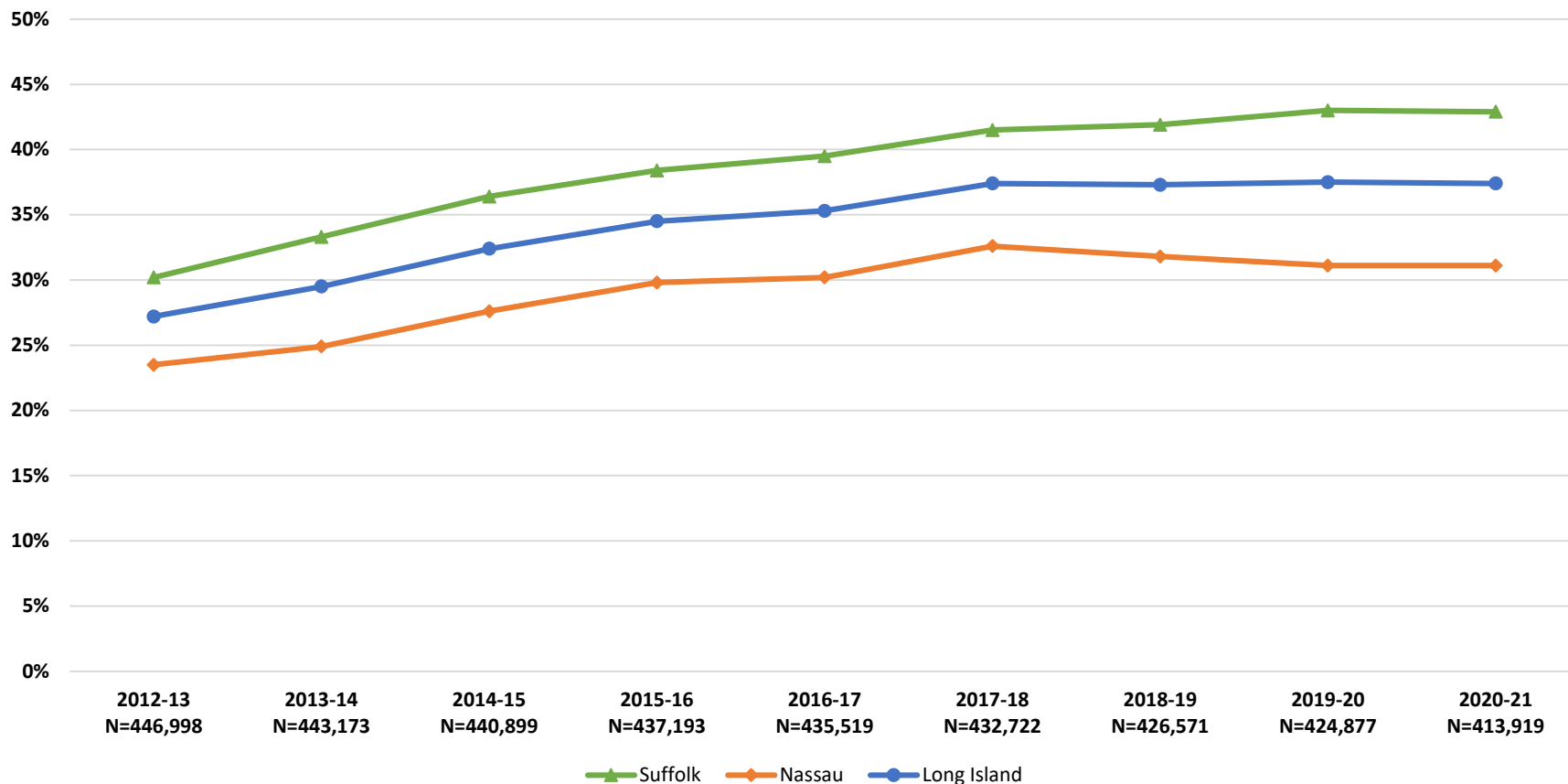

% Economically Disadvantaged Students on Long Island



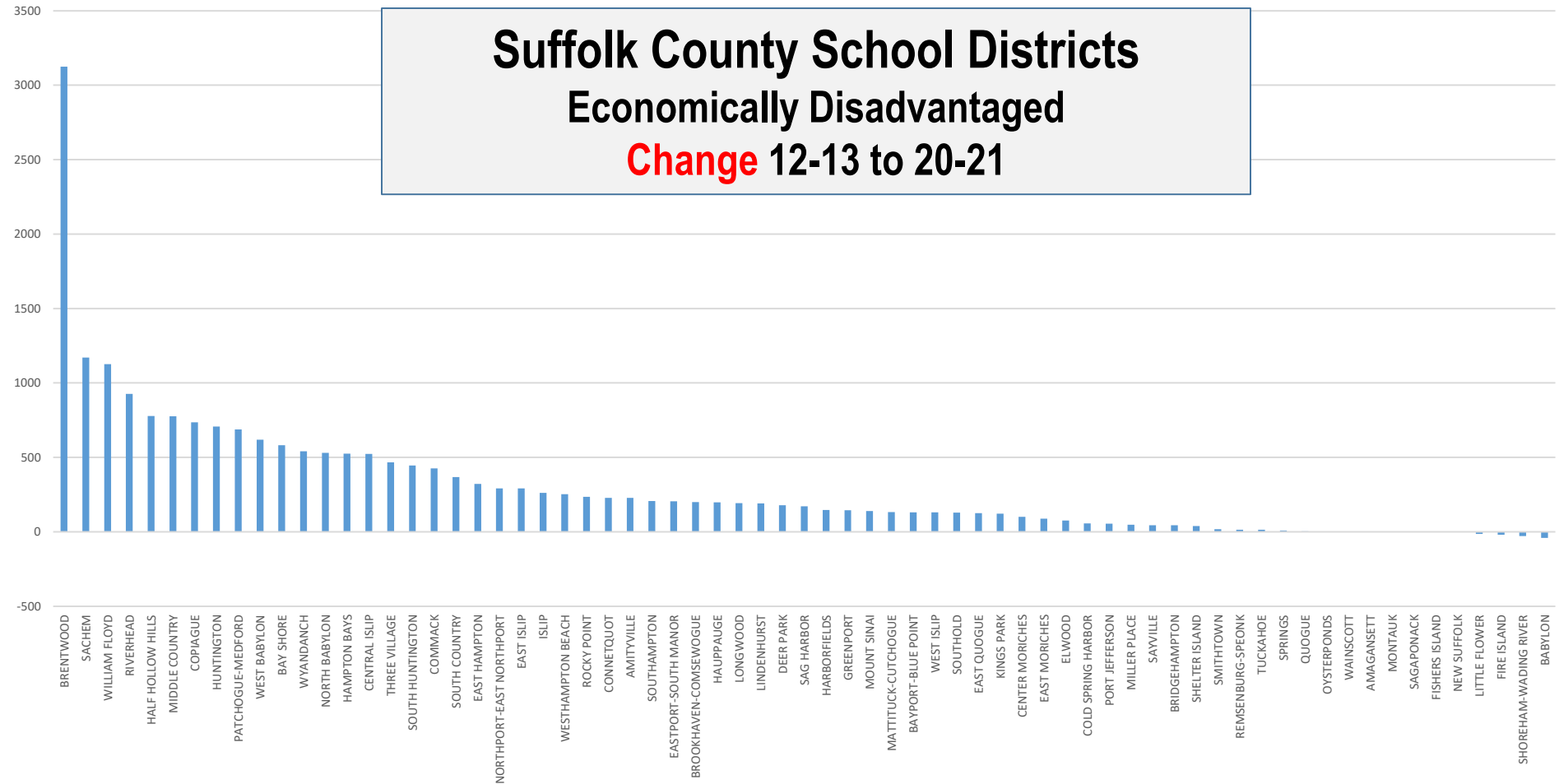

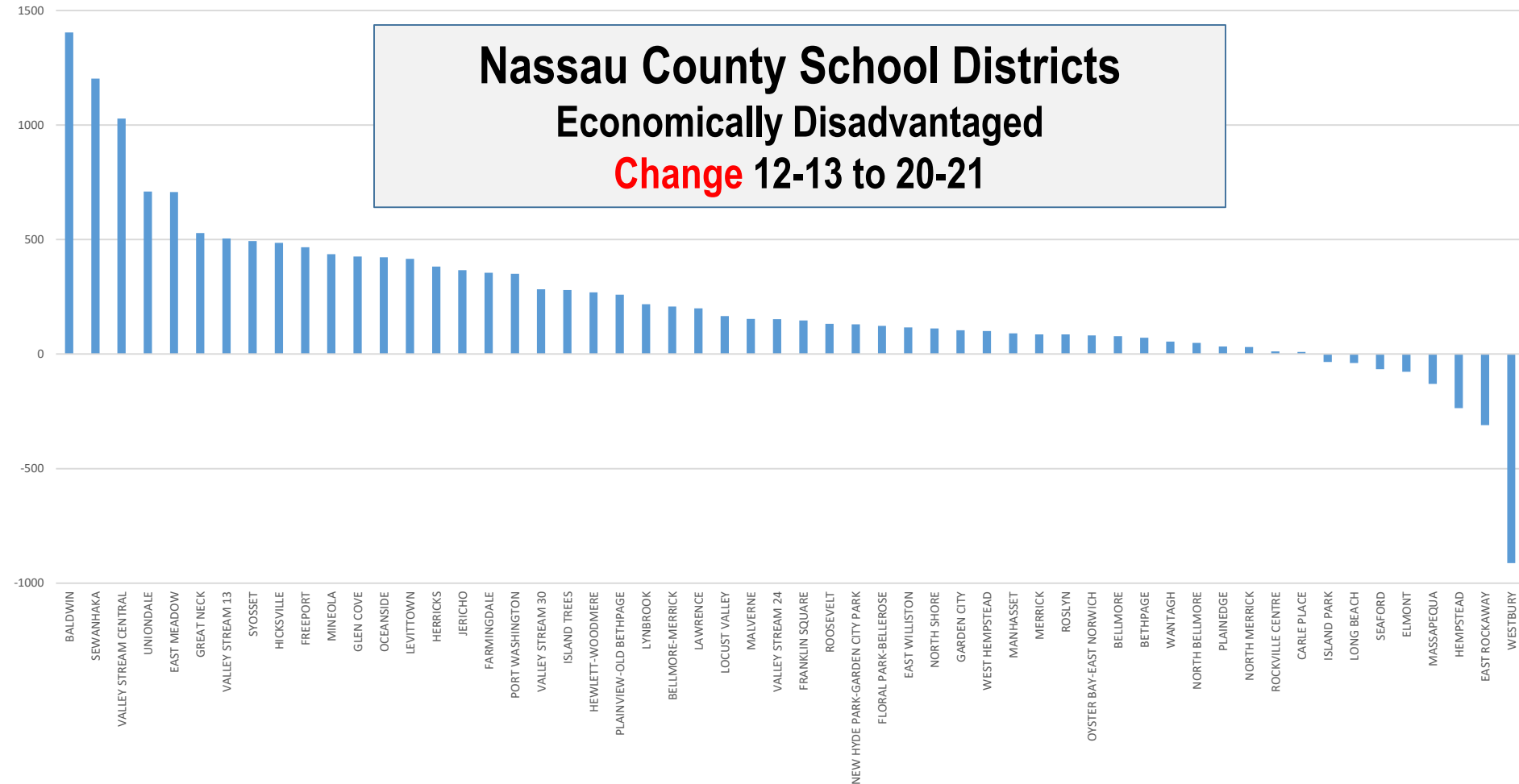

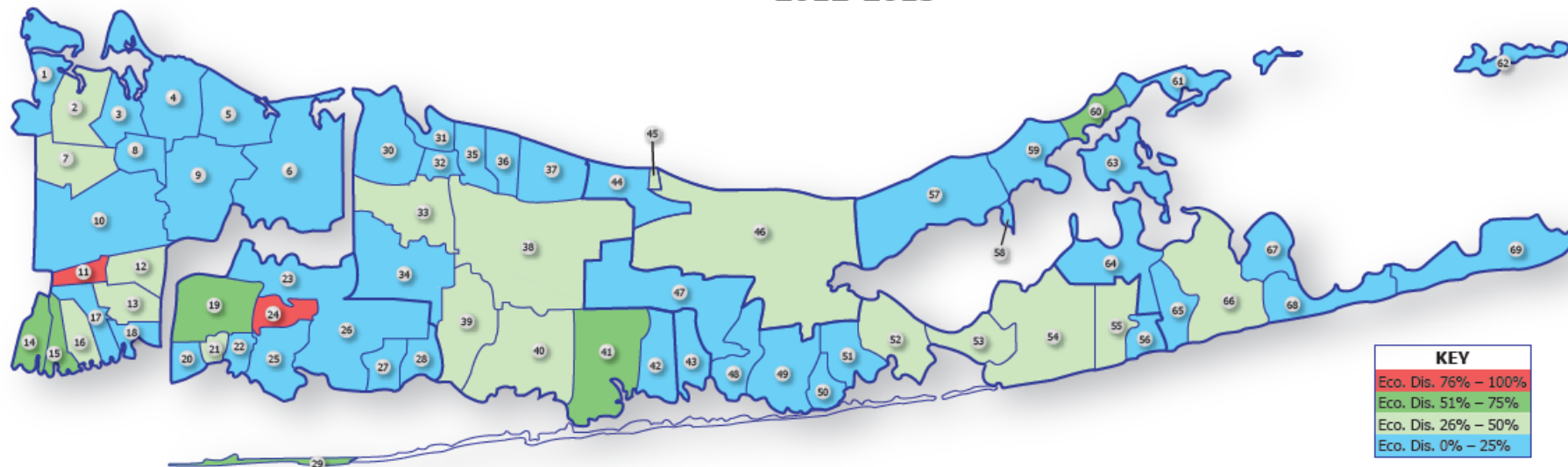

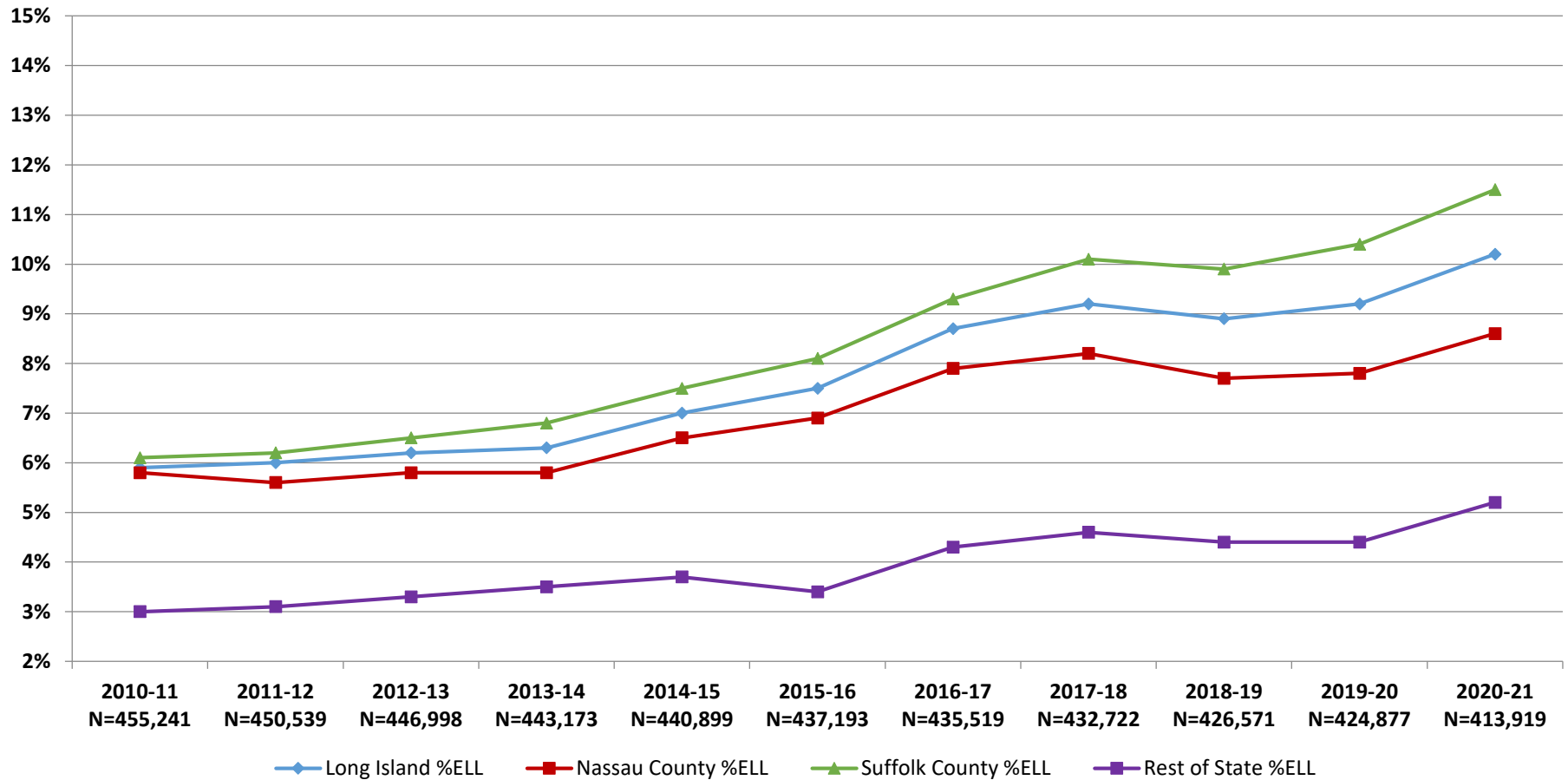

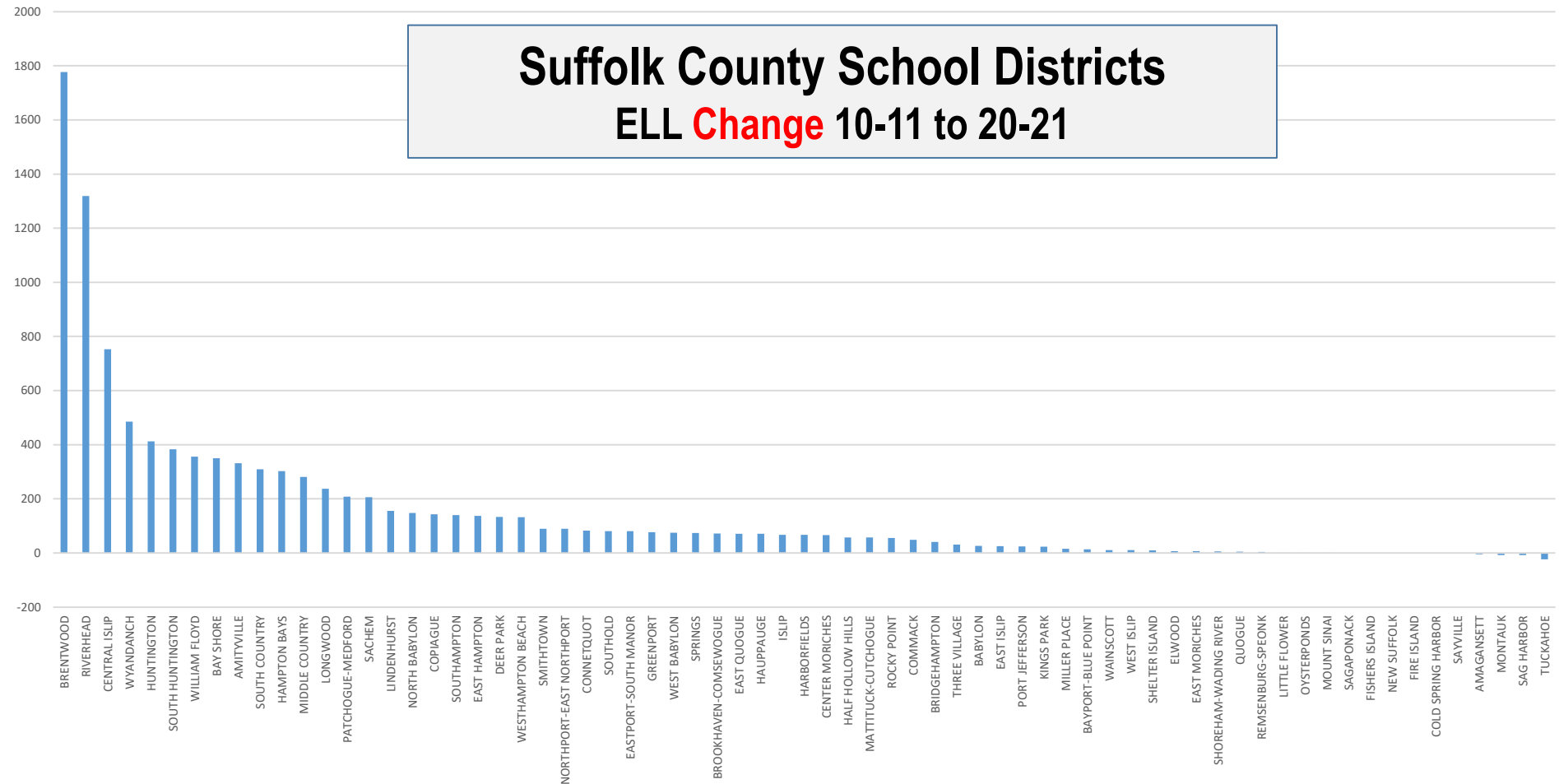

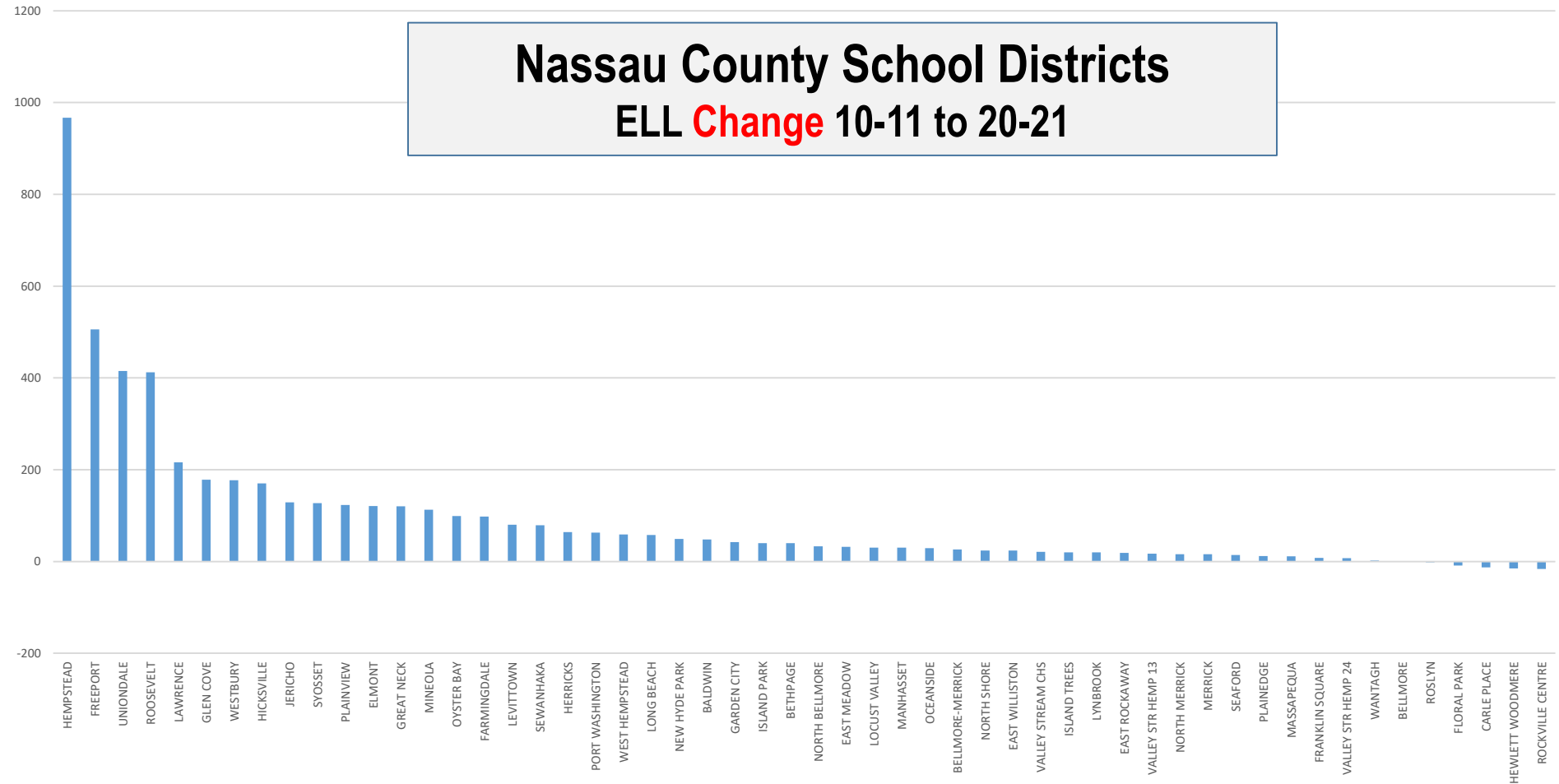

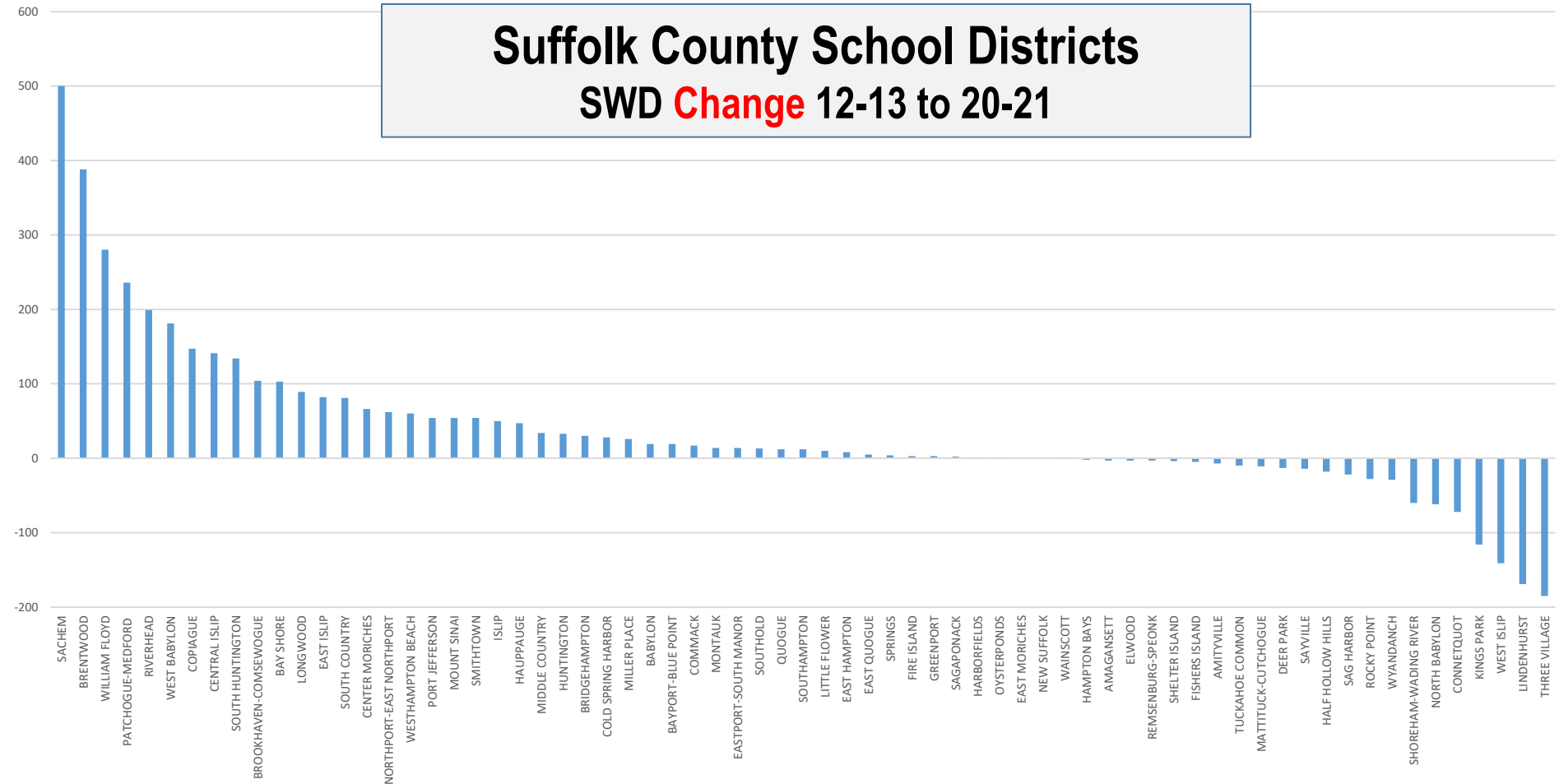

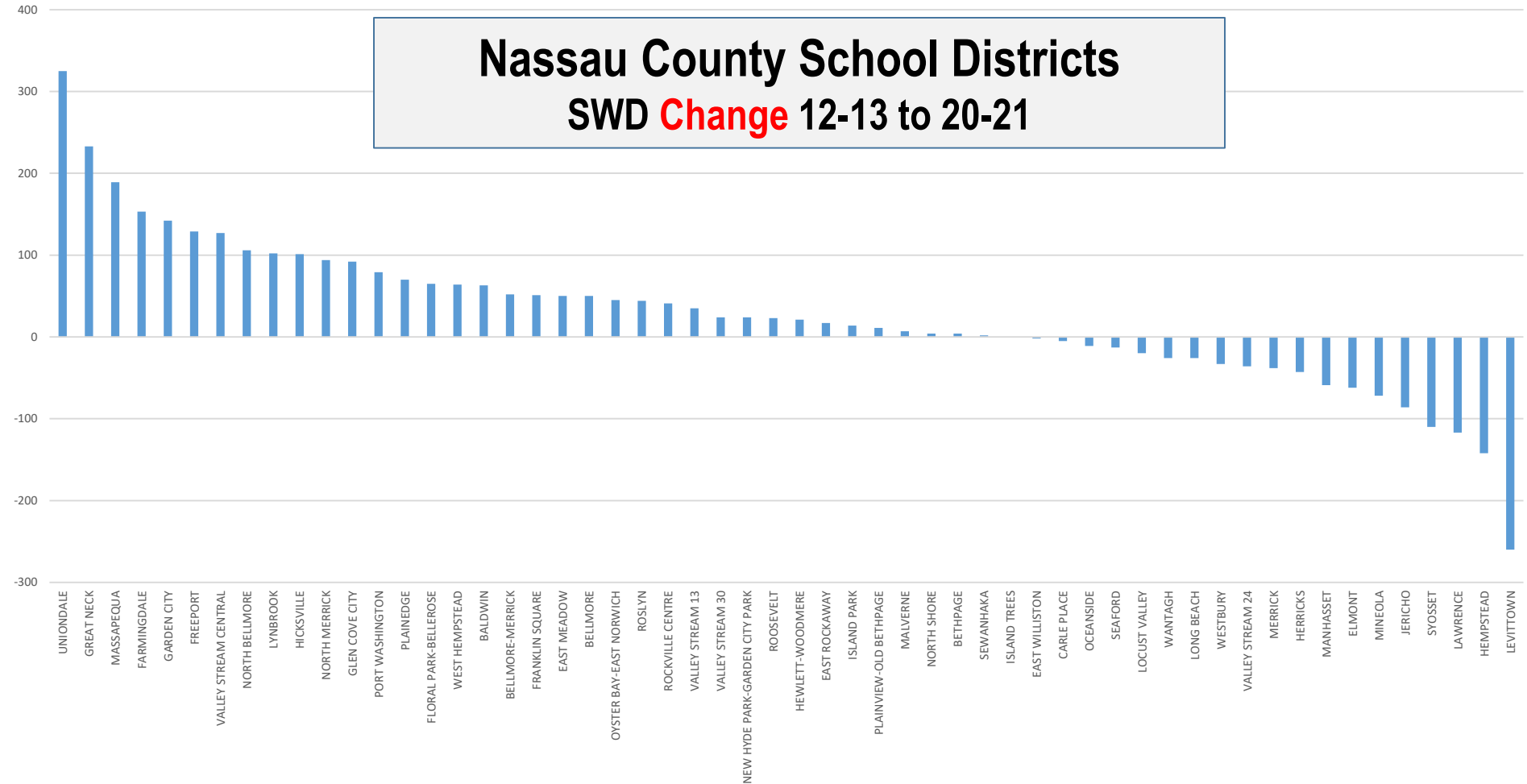

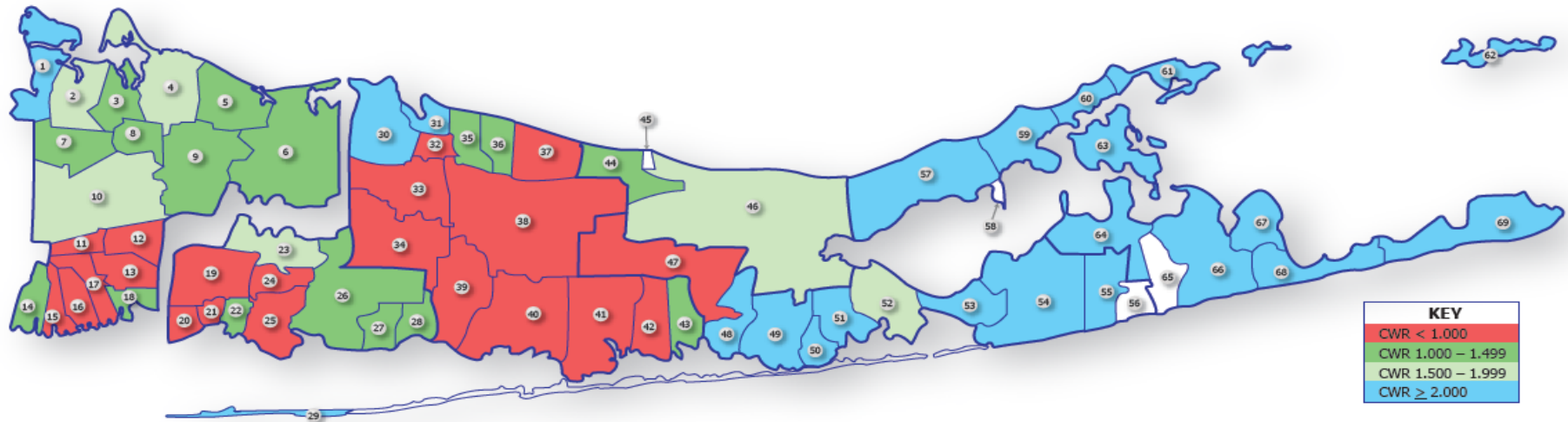

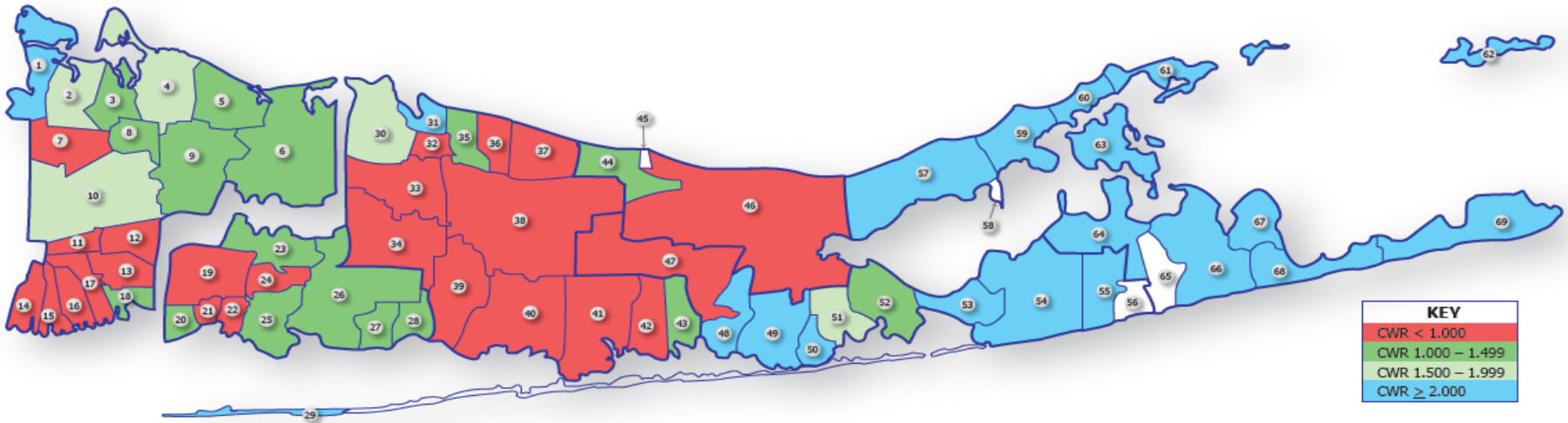

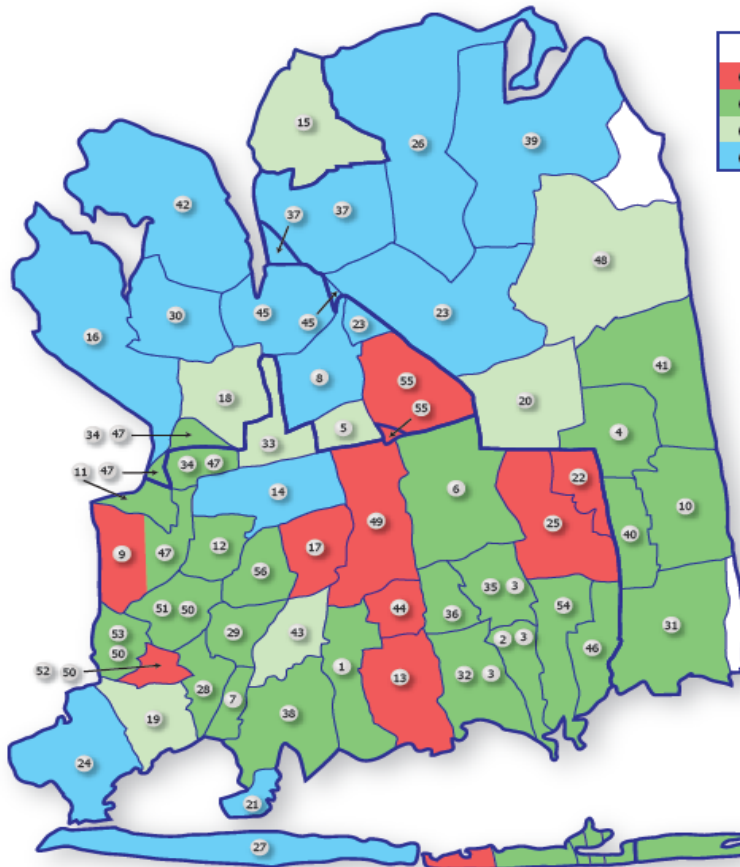

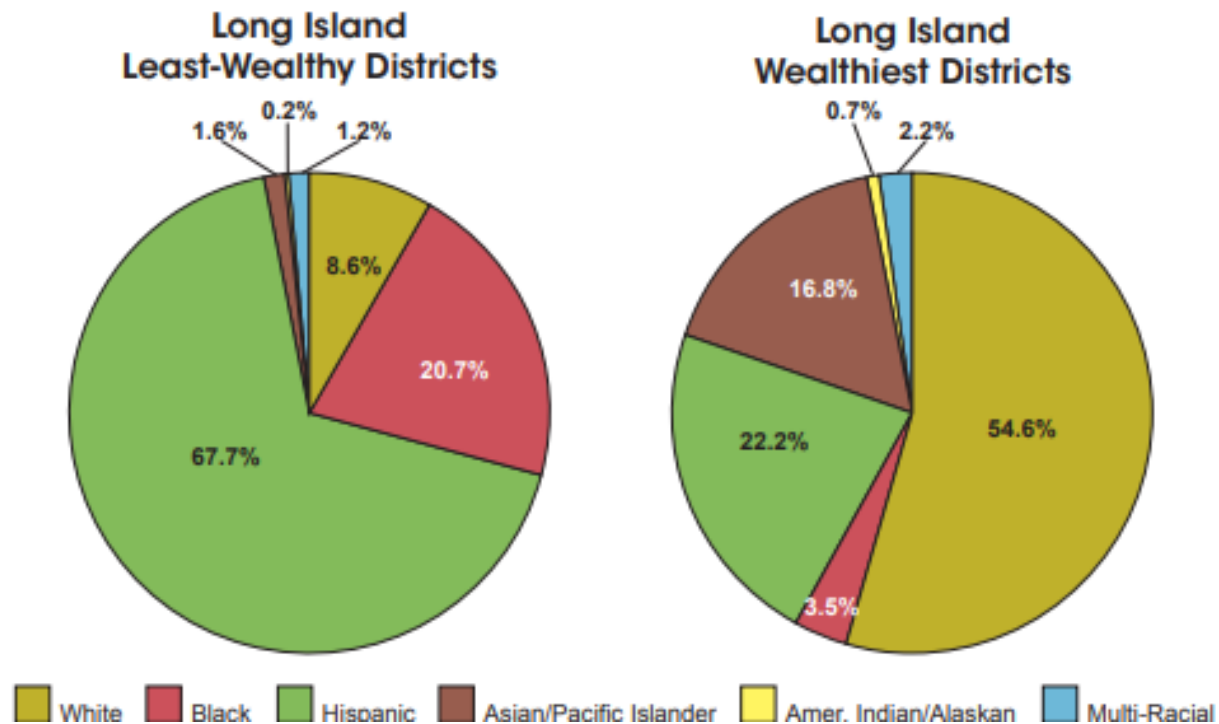

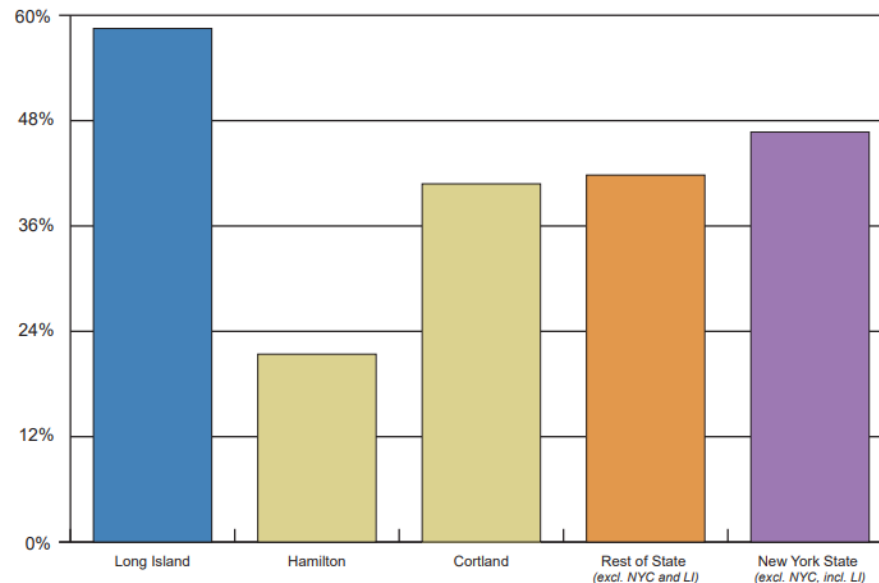

# Distribution of Aid vs. Percentage of Students

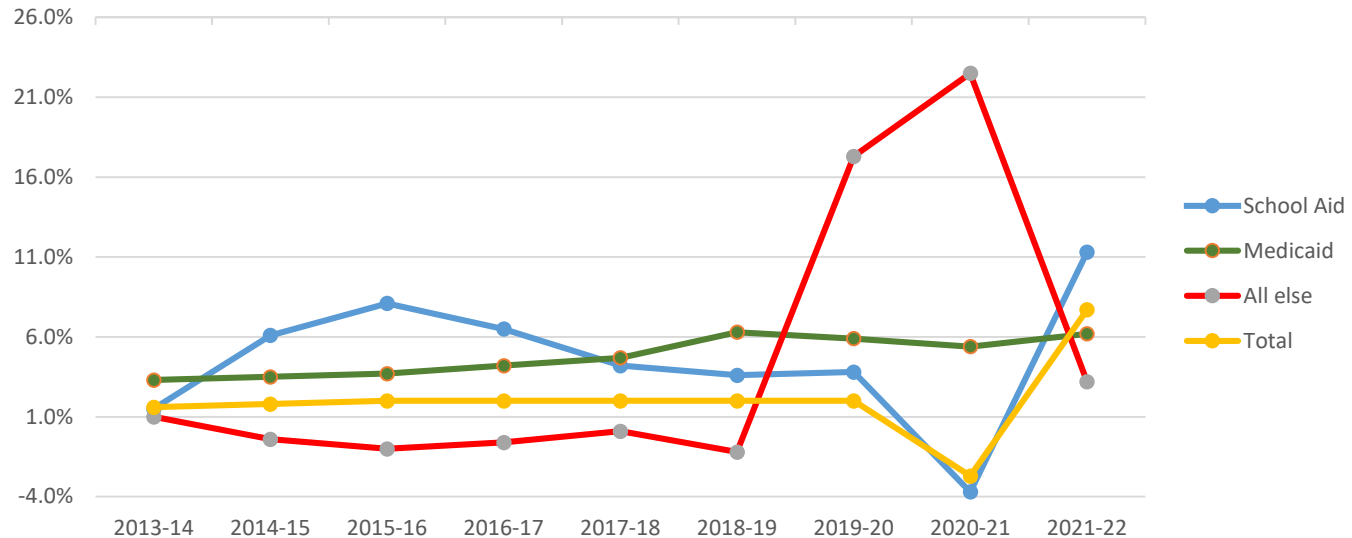

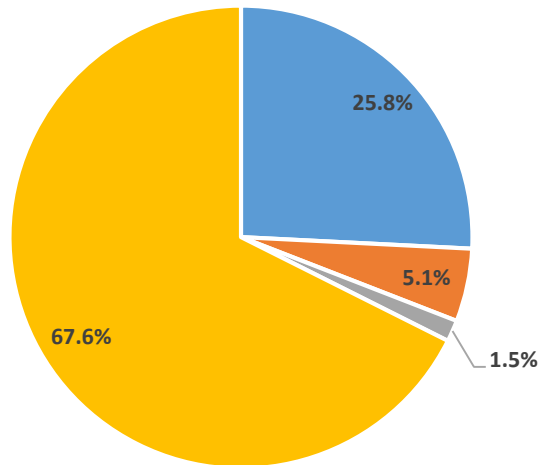

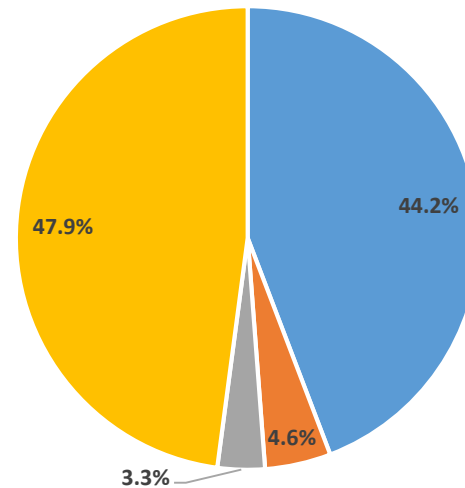

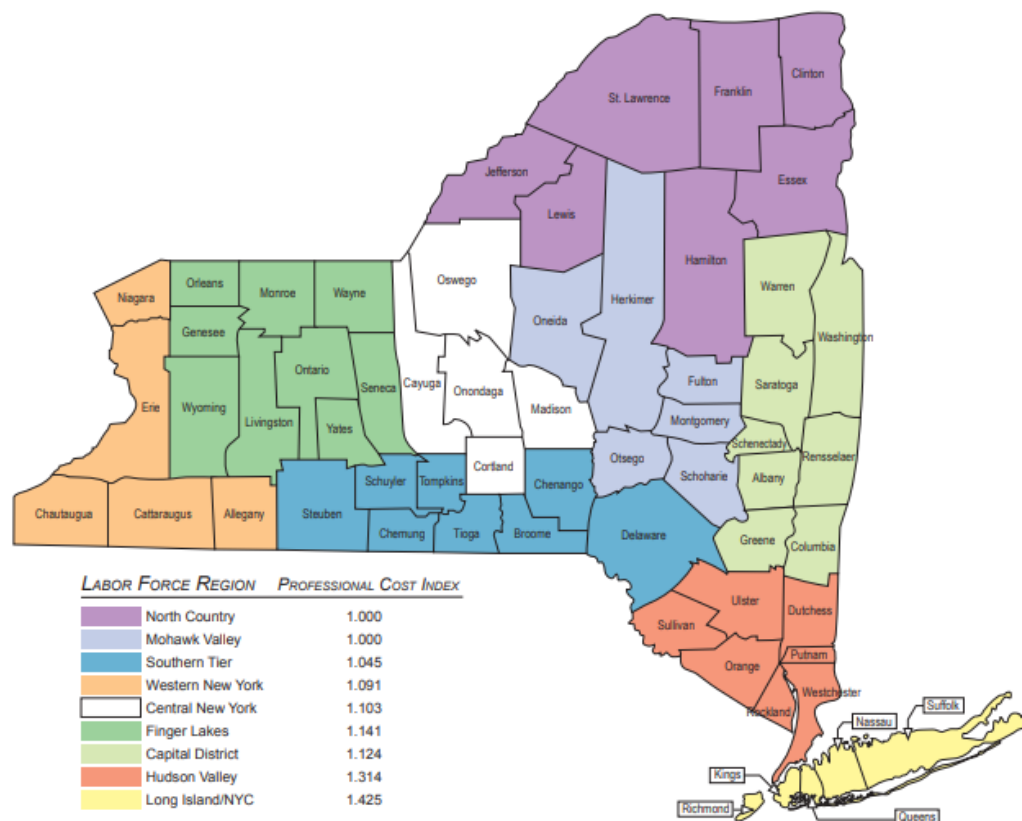

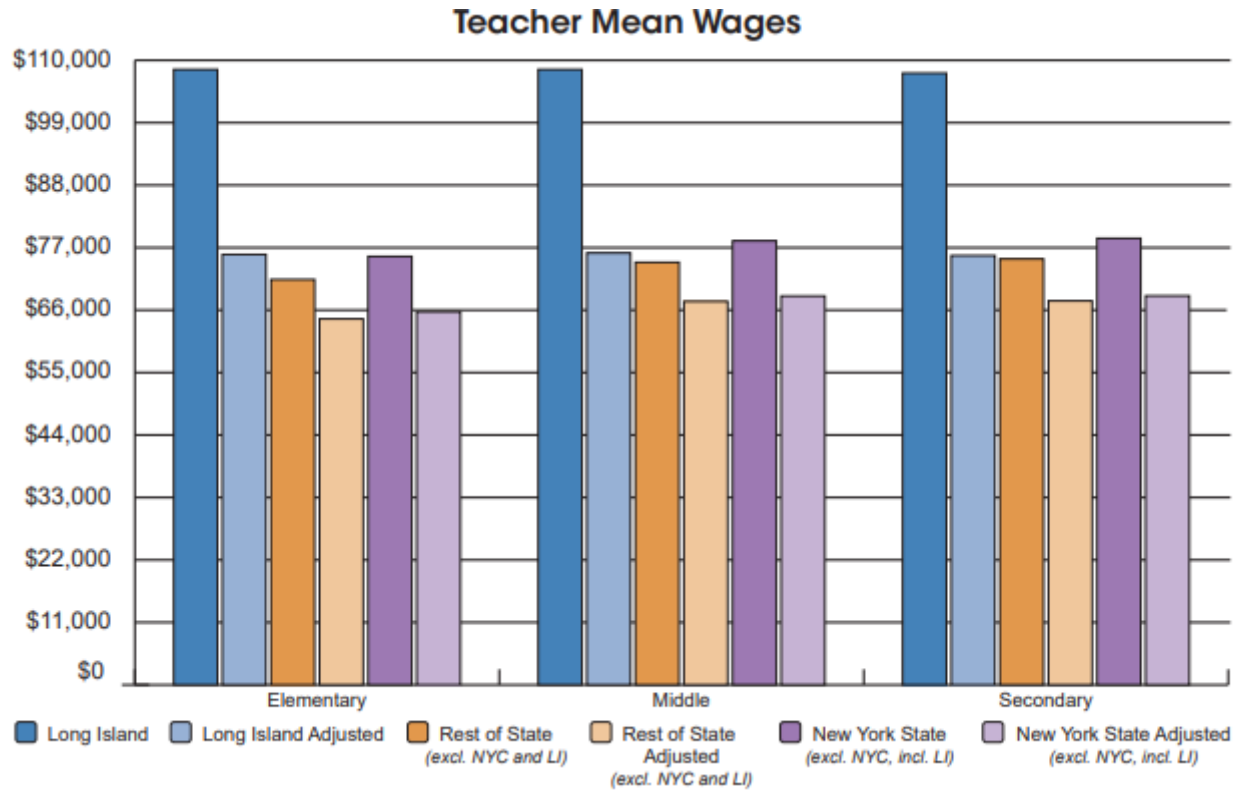
