What is AVID and what does it mean to be an AVID National Demonstration School?

AVID stands for Advancement Via Individual Determination. In short, AVID supports our students' drive to attend the best high school, university, and have the best career. Wilson

students are Wildcats with College Dreams and AVID is here to help them achieve all their goals.

Wilson is an AVID National Demonstration School and a Schoolwide Site of Distinction. This means that we are the best of the best. AVID has approximately 8,000 schools in their program and approximately 203 demonstration schools. So, to be a National Demonstration School, a school must be in the top 3% of all AVID schools – Wilson is one of them! Wilson is the best of the best!

Our Elementary students learn WICOR strategies which focus on writing, inquiry, collaboration, organization, and reading. AVID teaches the students the "hidden curriculum" of schools – how to learn. It supports them in all subject areas as students learn to be the spokesperson for their education. As our students enter Jr High, they take a class specifically designed to help them navigate more rigorous courses while receiving help through tutorials. When our students enter high school, they begin to research careers, universities, and scholarships. We want all our students prepared to enter a four-year university on a full scholarship! Human Resource Management for Community Groups

Community groups wishing to demonstrate leadership within their community will benefit from a comprehensive approach to managing their personnel, whether they have 10 or 1000 staff or volunteers working for them.

Not-for-profit organizations can invest in staff and secure long-term stability just as effectively as commercial businesses and should show leadership in this area. As employers they should look at retirement plans, health insurance, holiday plans, and maternity/paternity leave issues and devise plans to suit staff needs.

Employee rights should not only be maintained, but wholly endorsed. Consumers are increasingly more socially aware and are increasingly supporting organizations with a social conscience. This concern for ethics includes workers' rights. Companies endorsing sweatshop labor are fast falling out of favor with a more discerning consumer market, and

while these are extreme examples it is true to say that Australian companies that look after their employees well gain the reputation of an employer of choice and have less trouble hiring good staff. You should aim to be a community organization of choice.

Again, the same is true in relation to volunteer staff. Volunteers are not slaves and nor should they be exploited or used to replace jobs done by paid employees. Generally, the same rules apply in community groups and in business - happy, healthy, enthusiastic volunteers whose work is appreciated and respected tend to be your best marketing tools and have the ability to draw other people into your organization.

Having trouble thinking of what to pack for your children's lunches? Do you run out of time to pack lunches?

Save yourself some time and effort. Wilson offers a great food program offering both breakfast and lunch for your students. And, because Wilson Elementary School District continues to qualify for provisional assistance, we are able to offer free breakfasts and lunches every school day for your students.

Here's where we need you! For Wilson to continue to qualify, we need your help. Please fill out the Application for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program. Whether you and your student qualify has no effect on your student receiving a free breakfast and lunch on each school day.

However, if we do not receive these applications, then Wilson is at risk of not qualifying for various government sponsored programs and grants that allow Wilson to continue to offer free meals and receive additional grant opportunities to provide supplies, instruction and instructional aids for the students in their classrooms. When the federal food and nutrition program sees no applications come in for Wilson... they happily say, "oh, I guess Wilson doesn't need our assistance anymore!" If that is the case – that's wonderful! But, if in fact it helps your budget to have the District feed your students two meals a day for free, imagine how much more it helps Wilson schools' budget to continue to qualify for the federal food and nutrition provisional programs.

Child Find

Child Find, a component of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), enables states to locate, identify, and evaluate all children with disabilities, aged birth through 21, who need early intervention or special education services. Special education services are available for children of any age (birth through 21 years). Wilson School District is responsible for locating, identifying, evaluating, and serving all children with disabilities (ages 3-21) and referring children ages 0-3 to AzEIP for evaluation and appropriate services. AzEIP is the Arizona Early Intervention Program for infants and toddlers. Wilson provides free and appropriate public education that includes special education and related services to children at public expense, under public supervision and direction without charge to parents. For all

school-age students who are new to the district, the classroom teacher will complete screening activities within 45 days of enrollment. If any concerns are noted, the child will be referred for help. Parents who have concerns regarding their child's education may contact the Special Education Department at Wilson, (602) 683-2400, ext. 4205.

McKinney-Vento

Are you currently experiencing temporary living arrangements due to eviction, job loss or a traumatic event? Wilson School District offers services to families through the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act. Services such as enrollment and immunization assistance, uniforms or school supplies, community referrals and in some cases, transportation can be available. Your family may qualify due to living with another family or friend due to financial hardship or living in a shelter, transitional housing, or motel.
